To amend Section 36-25-1, Code of Alabama 1975, 1 2 relating to ethics; to further define the term "thing of value" by providing that gifts from a pupil or his or her 3 4 immediate family member to a principal, teacher, or other 5 person employed by a local school system of an insignificant economic value of less than \$100 if the aggregate value of the 6 7 gifts is less than \$250 during any one calendar year under circumstances which make it clear that no quid pro quo was 8 9 understood or implied. 10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 11 Section 1. Section 36-25-1, Code of Alabama 1975, is amended to read as follows: 12 "§36-25-1. 13 14 "Whenever used in this chapter, the following words 15 and terms shall have the following meanings: 16 "(1) BUSINESS. Any corporation, partnership, 17 proprietorship, firm, enterprise, franchise, association, 18 organization, self-employed individual, or any other legal 19 entity. 20 "(2) BUSINESS WITH WHICH THE PERSON IS ASSOCIATED. 21 Any business of which the person or a member of his or her 22 family is an officer, owner, partner, board of director 23 member, employee, or holder of more than five percent of the 24 fair market value of the business.

"(3) CANDIDATE. This term as used in this chapter
 shall have the same meaning ascribed to it in Section 17-22A-2.

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"(4) COMMISSION. The State Ethics Commission.

4 "(5) COMPLAINT. Written allegation or allegations
5 that a violation of this chapter has occurred.

6 "(6) COMPLAINANT. A person who alleges a violation 7 or violations of this chapter by filing a complaint against a 8 respondent.

9 "(7) CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. A complaint filed 10 pursuant to this chapter, together with any statement, 11 conversations, knowledge of evidence, or information received 12 from the complainant, witness, or other person related to such 13 complaint.

14 "(8) CONFLICT OF INTEREST. A conflict on the part of 15 a public official or public employee between his or her 16 private interests and the official responsibilities inherent 17 in an office of public trust. A conflict of interest involves 18 any action, inaction, or decision by a public official or public employee in the discharge of his or her official duties 19 20 which would materially affect his or her financial interest or 21 those of his or her family members or any business with which 22 the person is associated in a manner different from the manner 23 it affects the other members of the class to which he or she 24 belongs. A conflict of interest shall not include any of the 25 following:

"a. A loan or financial transaction made or
 conducted in the ordinary course of business.

3 "b. An occasional nonpecuniary award publicly
4 presented by an organization for performance of public
5 service.

6 "c. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and 7 necessary expenditures for travel and subsistence for the 8 personal attendance of a public official or public employee at 9 a convention or other meeting at which he or she is scheduled 10 to meaningfully participate in connection with his or her 11 official duties and for which attendance no reimbursement is 12 made by the state.

13 "d. Any campaign contribution, including the purchase of tickets to, or advertisements in journals, for 14 political or testimonial dinners, if the contribution is 15 16 actually used for political purposes and is not given under 17 circumstances from which it could reasonably be inferred that 18 the purpose of the contribution is to substantially influence a public official in the performance of his or her official 19 20 duties.

21

"(9) DAY. Calendar day.

"(10) DEPENDENT. Any person, regardless of his or her legal residence or domicile, who receives 50 percent or more of his or her support from the public official or public employee or his or her spouse or who resided with the public 1 official or public employee for more than 180 days during the 2 reporting period.

3 "(11) ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT FUNCTION. Any function 4 reasonably and directly related to the advancement of a 5 specific, good-faith economic development or trade promotion 6 project or objective.

7 "(12) EDUCATIONAL FUNCTION. A meeting, event, or activity held within the State of Alabama, or if the function 8 9 is predominantly attended by participants from other states, 10 held within the continental United States, which is organized 11 around a formal program or agenda of educational or informational speeches, debates, panel discussions, or other 12 13 presentations concerning matters within the scope of the participants' official duties or other matters of public 14 15 policy, including social services and community development policies, economic development or trade, ethics, government 16 17 services or programs, or government operations, and which, 18 taking into account the totality of the program or agenda, could not reasonably be perceived as a subterfuge for a purely 19 social, recreational, or entertainment function. 20

21 "(13) FAMILY MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC EMPLOYEE. The22 spouse or a dependent of the public employee.

"(14) FAMILY MEMBER OF THE PUBLIC OFFICIAL. The
spouse, a dependent, an adult child and his or her spouse, a
parent, a spouse's parents, a sibling and his or her spouse,
of the public official.

"(15) GOVERNMENTAL CORPORATIONS AND AUTHORITIES. 1 2 Public or private corporations and authorities, including but 3 not limited to, hospitals or other health care corporations, 4 established pursuant to state law by state, county or 5 municipal governments for the purpose of carrying out a 6 specific governmental function. Notwithstanding the foregoing, 7 all employees, including contract employees, of hospitals or other health care corporations and authorities are exempt from 8 the provisions of this chapter. 9

10 "(16) HOUSEHOLD. The public official, public11 employee, and his or her spouse and dependents.

12 "(17) LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER. A full-time employee 13 of a governmental unit responsible for the prevention or 14 investigation of crime who is authorized by law to carry 15 firearms, execute search warrants, and make arrests.

"(18) LEGISLATIVE BODY. The Senate of Alabama, the
House of Representatives of Alabama, a county commission, city
council, city commission, town council, or municipal council
or commission, and any committee or subcommittee thereof.

20 "(19) LOBBY or LOBBYING. The practice of promoting, 21 opposing, or in any manner influencing or attempting to 22 influence the introduction, defeat, or enactment of 23 legislation before any legislative body; opposing or in any 24 manner influencing the executive approval, veto, or amendment 25 of legislation; or the practice of promoting, opposing, or in 26 any manner influencing or attempting to influence the

enactment, promulgation, modification, or deletion of regulations before any regulatory body. The term does not include providing public testimony before a legislative body or regulatory body or any committee thereof.

"(20) LOBBYIST.

6 "a. The term lobbyist includes any of the following:
7 "1. A person who receives compensation or
8 reimbursement from another person, group, or entity to lobby.

9 "2. A person who lobbies as a regular and usual part 10 of employment, whether or not any compensation in addition to 11 regular salary and benefits is received.

12 "3. A consultant to the state, county, or municipal 13 levels of government or their instrumentalities, in any manner 14 employed to influence legislation or regulation, regardless 15 whether the consultant is paid in whole or part from state, 16 county, municipal, or private funds.

17 "4. An employee, a paid consultant, or a member of 18 the staff of a lobbyist, whether or not he or she is paid, who 19 regularly communicates with members of a legislative body 20 regarding pending legislation and other matters while the 21 legislative body is in session.

22 "b. The term lobbyist does not include any of the 23 following:

24 "1. An elected official on a matter which involves25 that person's official duties.

"2. A person or attorney rendering professional
services in drafting bills or in advising clients and in
rendering opinions as to the construction and effect of
proposed or pending legislation, executive action, or rules or
regulations, where those professional services are not
otherwise connected with legislative, executive, or regulatory
action.

8 "3. Reporters and editors while pursuing normal9 reportorial and editorial duties.

10 "4. Any citizen not lobbying for compensation who 11 contacts a member of a legislative body, or gives public 12 testimony on a particular issue or on particular legislation, 13 or for the purpose of influencing legislation and who is 14 merely exercising his or her constitutional right to 15 communicate with members of a legislative body.

16 "5. A person who appears before a legislative body, 17 a regulatory body, or an executive agency to either sell or 18 purchase goods or services.

19 "6. A person whose primary duties or 20 responsibilities do not include lobbying, but who may, from 21 time to time, organize social events for members of a 22 legislative body to meet and confer with members of 23 professional organizations and who may have only irregular 24 contacts with members of a legislative body when the body is 25 not in session or when the body is in recess.

"7. A person who is a member of a business,
 professional, or membership organization by virtue of the
 person's contribution to or payment of dues to the
 organization even though the organization engages in lobbying
 activities.

8. A state governmental agency head or his or her
designee who provides or communicates, or both, information
relating to policy or positions, or both, affecting the
governmental agencies which he or she represents.

10 "(21) MINOR VIOLATION. Any violation of this chapter 11 in which the public official or public employee receives an 12 economic gain in an amount less than two hundred fifty dollars 13 (\$250) or the governmental entity has an economic loss of less 14 than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250).

15 "(22) PERSON. A business, individual, corporation, 16 partnership, union, association, firm, committee, club, or 17 other organization or group of persons.

"(23) PRINCIPAL. A person or business which employs,
hires, or otherwise retains a lobbyist. A principal is not a
lobbyist but is not allowed to give a thing of value.

"(24) PROBABLE CAUSE. A finding that the allegations
are more likely than not to have occurred.

"(25) PUBLIC EMPLOYEE. Any person employed at the
 state, county, or municipal level of government or their
 instrumentalities, including governmental corporations and
 authorities, but excluding employees of hospitals or other

health care corporations including contract employees of those 1 2 hospitals or other health care corporations, who is paid in whole or in part from state, county, or municipal funds. For 3 4 purposes of this chapter, a public employee does not include a 5 person employed on a part-time basis whose employment is 6 limited to providing professional services other than 7 lobbying, the compensation for which constitutes less than 50 percent of the part-time employee's income. 8

9 "(26) PUBLIC OFFICIAL. Any person elected to public 10 office, whether or not that person has taken office, by the 11 vote of the people at state, county, or municipal level of government or their instrumentalities, including governmental 12 13 corporations, and any person appointed to a position at the 14 state, county, or municipal level of government or their 15 instrumentalities, including governmental corporations. For purposes of this chapter, a public official includes the 16 17 chairs and vice-chairs or the equivalent offices of each state 18 political party as defined in Section 17-13-40.

"(27) REGULATORY BODY. A state agency which issues
regulations in accordance with the Alabama Administrative
Procedure Act or a state, county, or municipal department,
agency, board, or commission which controls, according to rule
or regulation, the activities, business licensure, or
functions of any group, person, or persons.

"(28) REPORTING PERIOD. The reporting official's or
 employee's fiscal tax year as it applies to his or her United
 States personal income tax return.

4 "(29) REPORTING YEAR. The reporting official's or
5 employee's fiscal tax year as it applies to his or her United
6 States personal income tax return.

7 "(30) RESPONDENT. A person alleged to have violated
8 a provision of this chapter and against whom a complaint has
9 been filed with the commission.

10 "(31) STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS. A financial 11 disclosure form made available by the commission which shall 12 be completed and filed with the commission prior to April 30 13 of each year covering the preceding calendar year by certain 14 public officials and public employees.

"(32) SUPERVISOR. Any person having authority to 15 16 hire, transfer, suspend, lay off, recall, promote, discharge, 17 assign, or discipline other public employees, or any person 18 responsible to direct them, or to adjust their grievances, or to recommend personnel action, if, in connection with the 19 20 foregoing, the exercise of the authority is not of a merely 21 routine or clerical nature but requires the use of independent 22 judgment.

23

"(33) THING OF VALUE.

24 "a. Any gift, benefit, favor, service, gratuity,
25 tickets or passes to an entertainment, social or sporting
26 event, unsecured loan, other than those loans and forbearances

1 made in the ordinary course of business, reward, promise of 2 future employment, or honoraria or other item of monetary 3 value.

4 "b. The term, thing of value, does not include any
5 of the following, provided that no particular course of action
6 is required as a condition to the receipt thereof:

7 "1. A contribution reported under Chapter 5 of Title
8 17 or a contribution to an inaugural or transition committee.

9 "2. Anything given by a family member of the 10 recipient under circumstances which make it clear that it is 11 motivated by a family relationship.

12 "3. Anything given by a friend of the recipient 13 under circumstances which make it clear that it is motivated 14 by a friendship and not given because of the recipient's 15 official position. Relevant factors include whether the 16 friendship preexisted the recipient's status as a public 17 employee, public official, or candidate and whether gifts have 18 been previously exchanged between them.

19 "4. Greeting cards, items, services with little
20 intrinsic value which are intended solely for presentation,
21 such as plaques, certificates, and trophies, promotional items
22 commonly distributed to the general public, and items or
23 services of de minimis value.

24 "5. Loans from banks and other financial25 institutions on terms generally available to the public.

"6. Opportunities and benefits, including favorable
 rates and commercial discounts, available to the public or to
 a class consisting of all government employees.

4 "7. Rewards and prizes given to competitors in
5 contests or events, including random drawings, which are open
6 to the public.

7 "8. Anything that is paid for by a governmental 8 entity or an entity created by a governmental entity to 9 support the governmental entity or secured by a governmental 10 entity under contract, except for tickets to a sporting event 11 offered by an educational institution to anyone other than 12 faculty, staff, or administration of the institution.

13 "9. Anything for which the recipient pays full14 value.

"10. Compensation and other benefits earned from a non-government employer, vendor, client, prospective employer, or other business relationship in the ordinary course of employment or non-governmental business activities under circumstances which make it clear that the thing is provided for reasons unrelated to the recipient's public service as a public official or public employee.

22 "11. Any assistance provided or rendered in23 connection with a safety or a health emergency.

24 "12. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and
25 necessary transportation and lodging expenses, as well as
26 waiver of registration fees and similar costs, to facilitate

the attendance of a public official or public employee, and 1 2 the spouse of the public official or public employee, at an educational function or widely attended event of which the 3 4 person is a primary sponsor. This exclusion applies only if 5 the public official or public employee meaningfully 6 participates in the event as a speaker or a panel participant, 7 by presenting information related to his or her agency or matters pending before his or her agency, or by performing a 8 9 ceremonial function appropriate to his or her official 10 position; or if the public official's or public employee's 11 attendance at the event is appropriate to the performance of his or her official duties or representative function. 12

13 "13. Payment of or reimbursement for actual and 14 necessary transportation and lodging expenses to facilitate a 15 public official's or public employee's participation in an 16 economic development function.

17 "14. Hospitality, meals, and other food and 18 beverages provided to a public official or public employee, and the spouse of the public official or public employee, as 19 20 an integral part of an educational function, economic 21 development function, work session, or widely attended event, 22 such as a luncheon, banquet, or reception hosted by a civic 23 club, chamber of commerce, charitable or educational 24 organization, or trade or professional association.

"15. Any function or activity pre-certified by the
 Director of the Ethics Commission as a function that meets any
 of the above criteria.

4 "16. Meals and other food and beverages provided to 5 a public official or public employee in a setting other than 6 any of the above functions not to exceed for a lobbyist 7 twenty-five dollars (\$25) per meal with a limit of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) per year; and not to exceed for a 8 9 principal fifty dollars (\$50) per meal with a limit of two 10 hundred fifty dollars (\$250) per year. Notwithstanding the 11 foregoing, the lobbyist's limits herein shall not count against the principal's limits and likewise, the principal's 12 13 limits shall not count against the lobbyist's limits.

14 "17. Anything either (i) provided by an association or organization to which the state or, in the case of a local 15 16 government official or employee, the local government pays 17 annual dues as a membership requirement or (ii) provided by an 18 association or organization to a public official who is a member of the association or organization and, as a result of 19 his or her service to the association or organization, is 20 21 deemed to be a public official. Further included in this 22 exception is payment of reasonable compensation by a 23 professional or local government association or corporation to 24 a public official who is also an elected officer or director 25 of the professional or local government association or 26 corporation for services actually provided to the association

or corporation in his or her capacity as an officer or
 director.

3 "18. Any benefit received as a discount on
4 accommodations, when the discount is given to the public
5 official because the public official is a member of an
6 organization or association whose entire membership receives
7 the discount.

8 "<u>19. Gifts from a pupil or his or her immediate</u>
9 <u>family member to a principal, teacher, or other person</u>
10 <u>employed by a local school system of an insignificant economic</u>
11 <u>value of less than one hundred dollars (\$100) if the aggregate</u>
12 <u>value of the gifts is less than two hundred fifty dollars</u>
13 <u>(\$250) during any one calendar year under circumstances which</u>
14 <u>make it clear that no quid pro quo was understood or implied.</u>

15 "c. Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to 16 limit, prohibit, or otherwise require the disclosure of gifts 17 through inheritance received by a public employee or public 18 official.

19 "(34) VALUE. The fair market price of a like item if 20 purchased by a private citizen. In the case of tickets to 21 social and sporting events and associated passes, the value is 22 the face value printed on the ticket.

"(35) WIDELY ATTENDED EVENT. A gathering, dinner,
reception, or other event of mutual interest to a number of
parties at which it is reasonably expected that more than 12

1 individuals will attend and that individuals with a diversity
2 of views or interest will be present."

3 Section 2. This act shall become effective on the 4 first day of the third month following its passage and 5 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
