BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Section 30 of Act 2011-535, 2011 Regular Session, now appearing as Section 31-13-29, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:

"§31-13-29.

- "(a) For the purposes of this section, business transaction includes any transaction between a person and the state or a political subdivision of the state, including, but not limited to, applying for or renewing a motor vehicle license plate, applying for or renewing a driver's license or nondriver identification card, or applying for or renewing a business license. Business transaction does not include applying for a marriage license.
- "(b) An alien not lawfully present in the United States shall not enter into or attempt to enter into a business transaction with the state or a political subdivision of the state and no person shall enter into a business transaction or attempt to enter into a business transaction on behalf of an alien not lawfully present in the United States.
- "(c) Any person entering into a business transaction or attempting to enter into a business transaction with this state or a political subdivision of this state shall be required to demonstrate his or her United States citizenship, or if he or she is an alien, his or her lawful presence in the

1 United States to the person conducting the business 2 transaction on behalf of this state or a political subdivision of this state. United States citizenship shall be demonstrated 3 by presentation of one of the documents listed in subsection (k) of Section 31-13-28. An alien's lawful presence in the 5 6 United States shall be demonstrated by this state's or a 7 political subdivision of this state's verification of the alien's lawful presence through the Systematic Alien 8 Verification for Entitlements program operated by the 9 10 Department of Homeland Security, or by other verification with the Department of Homeland Security pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 11 12 1373(c). In lieu of providing a document listed in subdivision 13 (k) of Section 31-13-28, verification through the Systematic Alien Verification for Entitlements program, or other 14 15 verification by the Department of Homeland Security pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1373(c), a person may demonstrate eligibility to 16 17 enter into a business transaction with this state or a political subdivision of this state by presenting a valid 18 Uniformed Services Identification and Privilege Card, also 19 known as a United States Military ID or a Geneva Conventions 20 21 Identification Card, to the person conducting the business 22 transaction on behalf of this state or a political subdivision 23 of this state. 24 "(d) A violation of this section is a Class C

"(f) In Except as otherwise provided in this section, in the enforcement of this section, an alien's immigration status shall be determined by verification of the alien's immigration status with the federal government pursuant to 8 U.S.C. § 1373(c). An official of this state or political subdivision of this state shall not attempt to independently make a final determination of whether an alien is lawfully present in the United States."

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
