135704-1:n:01/18/2012:MCS/tan LRS2012-280 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 Currently, contributions made for 8 SYNOPSIS: 9 retirement for state policemen are based on 10 earnable compensation as defined by law, which does 11 not specifically include overtime payments. 12 This bill would amend current law to clarify 13 that overtime payments made to state policemen are 14 part of earnable compensation for purposes of 15 calculating retirement benefits. 16 17 A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 18 19 AN ACT 20 To amend Sections 36-21-4 and 36-27-1, Code of 21 22 Alabama 1975, relating to retirement benefits for state 23 policemen; to clarify that earnable compensation shall include 24 amounts paid as overtime payments to those officers; to 25 provide that the act is declaratory of existing law; to provide an effective date of September 1, 2011, and to allow 26

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contributions to be made not later than September 30, 2012, for any amounts not contributed after September 1, 2011. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

4 Section 1. Sections 36-21-4 and 36-27-1, Code of 5 Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:

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"§36-21-4.

7 "(a) Each state law enforcement officer in the 8 service of the state who is assigned to duty for more than 40 9 hours during the calendar week shall be paid time and one half 10 for such excess hours worked or he <u>or she</u> shall be given time 11 and one-half compensatory leave as herein provided, except as 12 hereinafter limited. <u>Such The</u> officers shall normally work a 13 40-hour work week.

"(b) Hours worked in excess of 40 hours in any 14 15 calendar week shall be compensated at the rate of one and 16 one-half times his or her regular rate of pay up to a maximum 17 of eight hours per week; however, compensatory time at the rate of one and one-half times regular time may be paid for 18 overtime worked. The decision of whether to accept overtime 19 20 pay or compensatory time shall be at the sole option of the 21 officer. For the time worked, when required by employee's 22 department, through September 30, 1977, hours worked in excess 23 of 48 up to 54 hours, the officer shall be given straight 24 compensatory time off. Time worked in excess of 54 hours per 25 week shall be compensated at a rate of one and one-half times 26 the regular pay or one and one-half times compensatory time at the discretion of the department. For the period October 1, 1977, and thereafter, all hours over 48 shall be one and one-half compensatory time or pay at the discretion of the department.

5 "(c) Overtime payments made to a state policeman as 6 defined in Section 36-27-1 who contributes to the State Police 7 Retirement Fund shall be considered to be earnable 8 compensation as that term is defined in Section 36-27-1 for 9 purposes of retirement benefits.

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"§36-27-1.

11 "When used in this article, the following terms 12 shall have the following meanings, respectively, unless the 13 context clearly indicates otherwise:

14 "(1) RETIREMENT SYSTEM. The Employees' Retirement
15 System of Alabama as defined in Section 36-27-2.

16 "(2) EMPLOYEE. Any regular employee of the State of 17 Alabama whose salary is paid by state warrant by the state, 18 except a member of the Legislature of the state, a person who is covered or eligible to be covered under the Teachers' 19 20 Retirement System of Alabama or any other retirement system to 21 which contributions are made by the state, an elective 22 official of the state government, and a temporary employee or 23 person engaged under retainer or special agreement. In all 24 cases of doubt the Board of Control shall determine who is an 25 employee within the meaning of this article. The term shall 26 include any regular employee of the Alabama state hospitals

and Partlow State School and Hospital and the Alabama State
 Port Authority, however paid.

3 "(3) EMPLOYER. The State of Alabama or any 4 department, commission, institution, or any other agency of 5 and within the state by which an employee is paid, including 6 employers as provided in Section 36-27-6.

7 "(4) MEMBER. Any employee included in the membership
8 of the system as provided in Section 36-27-4.

9 "(5) BOARD OF CONTROL. The board provided for in 10 Section 36-27-23 to administer the retirement system.

11 "(6) MEDICAL BOARD. The board of physicians provided 12 for in Section 36-27-23.

13 "(7) SERVICE. Service as an employee paid for by an14 employer.

"(8) PRIOR SERVICE. Service rendered prior to the
date of establishment of the retirement system for which
credit is allowable under Section 36-27-11.

18 "(9) MEMBERSHIP SERVICE. Service as an employee 19 rendered while a member of the retirement system and on 20 account of which contributions are made.

21 "(10) CREDITABLE SERVICE. "Prior service" plus
22 "membership service" rendered since last becoming a member.

"(11) BENEFICIARY. Any person in receipt of a
pension, an annuity, a retirement allowance or other benefit
as provided by this article.

"(12) REGULAR INTEREST. Interest compounded annually
 at the rate determined by the Board of Control in accordance
 with subsection (f) of Section 36-27-25.

4 "(13) ACCUMULATED CONTRIBUTIONS. The sum of all the
5 amounts deducted from the compensation of a member credited to
6 his or her individual account in the Annuity Savings Fund,
7 together with regular interest thereon, as provided in Section
8 36-27-24.

9 "(14) EARNABLE COMPENSATION. a. The full rate of 10 compensation that would be payable to an employee if he or she 11 worked the full normal work-time. In cases where compensation includes maintenance, the Board of Control shall fix the value 12 13 of that part of the compensation not paid in money. Earnable 14 compensation shall not exceed the limitations imposed by Section 401(a)(17) of the Internal Revenue Code for public 15 16 pension funds, except that any employee who was a member of 17 the Employees' Retirement System before the first plan year 18 beginning after December 31, 1995, shall not be subject to the earning limitations set forth in Section 401(a)(17). 19

"b. The term earnable compensation for retirement
 purposes shall include overtime payments that are made to a
 state policeman who contributes to the State Police Retirement
 <u>Fund.</u>

"(15) AVERAGE FINAL COMPENSATION. The average annual
 compensation of an employee, with respect to which he or she
 had made contributions pursuant to subsection (b) of Section

36-27-24 during the three years, in his or her last 10 years 1 2 of creditable service for which the average is highest or during his or her entire period of creditable service if less 3 4 than three years; except, that for any period prior to 5 November 1, 1959, the compensation used in computing the 6 average shall include compensation in excess of the maximum 7 amount with respect to which members were required to contribute. 8

9 "(16) ANNUITY. Payments for life derived from the 10 "accumulated contributions" of a member. All annuities shall 11 be payable in equal monthly installments.

"(17) PENSION. Payments for life derived from money provided by the employer. All pensions shall be payable in equal monthly installments.

15 "(18) RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE. The sum of the "annuity" 16 and the "pension."

"(19) RETIREMENT. Withdrawal from active service
with a retirement allowance or optional benefit in lieu
thereof granted under this article.

"(20) ANNUITY RESERVE. The present value of all
payments to be made on account of any annuity or benefit in
lieu of any annuity computed upon the basis of the mortality
tables adopted by the Board of Control and regular interest.

24 "(21) PENSION RESERVE. The present value of all25 payments to be made on account of any pension or benefit in

lieu of any pension computed upon the basis of the mortality
 tables adopted by the Board of Control and regular interest.

3 "(22) ACTUARIAL EQUIVALENT. A benefit of equal value
4 when computed upon the basis of the mortality tables adopted
5 by the Board of Control and regular interest.

6 "(23) STATE POLICEMAN. An employee in the classified 7 service under the Merit System Act approved by the State 8 Personnel Board to perform the duties of highway patrolman or 9 a beverage control agent or a crime investigator. The term 10 shall not include a member employed as a policeman under 11 Section 36-27-6."

Section 2. (a) The amendments made to Sections 36-21-4 and 36-27-1 of the Code of Alabama 1975, in Section 1 are declaratory of, and do not constitute a change in, the preexisting law, and shall be applied retroactively to September 1, 2011.

(b) For the period of time from September 1, 2011,
through September 30, 2012, a state policeman may make
employee contributions based on overtime payments to the State
Police Retirement Fund for any amounts not contributed on and
after September 1, 2011.

22 Section 3. This act shall be effective retroactively 23 to September 1, 2011, upon its passage and approval by the 24 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
