SYNOPSIS: Under existing law, to be licensed as a physician in Alabama, an individual must graduate from a medical school and receive additional training and education in a program known as residency training, and those individuals are not immune from civil liability as a result of their acts or omissions arising out of and in the course of working in a residency training program associated with the academic medical centers of the University of South Alabama or the Board of

Trustees of the University of Alabama.

This bill would provide that a graduate of medical school shall not be civilly liable to any person for damages as a result of any action taken or recommendation made within the scope of his or her function when working in residency training program associated with the academic medical centers of the University of South Alabama or the Board of Trustees of the University of Alabama.

3 AN ACT

Relating to immunity from civil liability; to provide that a graduate of medical school shall not be civilly liable to any person for damages as a result of any action taken or recommendation made within the scope of his or her function when working in a residency training program associated with academic medical centers of the University of South Alabama or the Board of Trustees of the University of Alabama.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. (a) It is hereby declared by the Legislature that an adequate supply of licensed physicians is of vital importance to assure that the citizens of this state receive appropriate and adequate medical care. In order to become licensed as a physician in Alabama, an individual must graduate from medical school and participate in additional training and education after medical school which is known as residency training. A resident is any physician in a graduate medical education program including interns, residents, and fellows. Residency training involves classroom education and supervised clinical training. The Legislature finds and declares that residency training is necessary for physicians to obtain advanced certification and licensure in Alabama and it should be the policy of this state that the participants in

the residency training programs should not be civilly liable to any person for damages as a result of any action taken or recommendation made within the scope of his or her function when working as a resident in training.

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(b) A graduate of medical school shall not be civilly liable to any person for damages as a result of any action taken or recommendation made within the scope of his or her function when working as a resident in training in a residency training program associated with the academic medical centers of the University of South Alabama or the Board of Trustees of the University of Alabama.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
