26	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA.

Section 1. Beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, if the Governor determines that proration of the Education Trust Fund budget will occur, he may reduce the number of instructional or professional development days for all K-12 education employees by up to five days. Such reduction shall occur only after the Governor has certified to the State Comptroller and notified the Legislature that proration will occur in the Education Trust Fund. Upon the certification by the Governor, and after all other sources available to be used to offset proration have been utilized, the reduction in instructional or professional development days may be made.

Section 2. Notwithstanding any provision of Section 16-13-231 of the Code of Alabama, 1975 and any other state laws, rules, regulations, or provisions relating to the number of instructional or professional development days of K-12 public school employees, any written or implied contract between K-12 public school employees and local boards of education beginning with the 2011-2012 school year shall be deemed to include a provision that the Governor can reduce the number of instructional or professional development days by up to five days, as provided by this act, when proration is declared.

Section 3. This act shall become effective immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
