18	To amend Section 40-23-210, Code of Alabama 1975,
19	relating to the annual sales tax holiday, to increase the
20	exempted amount for computers to \$1,500.
21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
22	Section 1. Section 40-23-210, Code of Alabama 1975,
23	is amended to read as follows:
24	"§40-23-210.
25	"As used in this article, the term "covered items"
26	means the following:

1 "(1) Articles of clothing with a sales price of one 2 hundred dollars (\$100), or less, per article of clothing. "a. "Clothing" means all human wearing apparel 3 4 suitable for general use including sandals, shoes, and sneakers. Clothing shall not include: 5 "1. Belt buckles sold separately. 6 7 "2. Costume masks sold separately. "3. Patches and emblems sold separately. 8 9 "4. Sewing equipment and supplies including, but not 10 limited to, knitting needles, patterns, pins, scissors, sewing machines, sewing needles, tape measures, and thimbles. 11 12 "5. Sewing materials that become part of "clothing" 13 including, but not limited to, buttons, fabric, lace, thread, 14 yarn, and zippers. 15 "b. In addition, clothing shall not include clothing 16 accessories or equipment, protective equipment, or sport or 17 recreational equipment; as defined herein. "1. "Clothing accessories or equipment" means 18 incidental items worn on the person or in conjunction with 19 "clothing." The following list contains examples and is not 20 21 intended to be an all-inclusive list. "Clothing accessories or 22 equipment" shall include: 23 "(i) Briefcases. "Protective equipment" means items for human 8 9 wear and designed as protection of the wearer against injury 10 or disease or as protections against damage or injury of other 11 persons or property but not suitable for general use. The 12 following list contains examples and is not intended to be an all-inclusive list. "Protective equipment" shall include: 13 14 "(i) Breathing masks. 15 "(ii) Clean room apparel and equipment. - "2. Handheld electronic schedulers, except devicesthat are cellular phones.

- "(3) Noncommercial purchases of school supplies, school art supplies, and school instructional material, up to a sales price of fifty dollars (\$50) per item.

Section 2. This act shall become effective
immediately following its passage and approval by the
Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
