BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, is proposed and shall become valid as a part thereof when approved by a majority of the qualified electors voting thereon and in accordance with Sections 284, 285, and 287 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended:

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Section 56 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 56 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. Members of the legislature shall, in all cases, except treason, felony, violation of their oath of office, and breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate made in either house, and such speech and debate shall not be questioned in any other place."

Section 2. An election upon the proposed amendment shall be held in accordance with Sections 284 and 285 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Sections 284 and 285 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of

Alabama of 1901, as amended, and the election laws of this 1 2 state. Section 3. The appropriate election official shall 3 assign a ballot number for the proposed constitutional 4 amendment on the election ballot and shall set forth the 5 following description of the substance or subject matter of 6 7 the proposed constitutional amendment: "Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of 8 Alabama of 1901, to eliminate legislative immunity from arrest 9 10 while attending legislative sessions and going to and from 11 such sessions. "Proposed by Act \_\_\_\_." 12 This description shall be followed by the following 13 14 language:

"Yes ( ) No ( )."
