8	To create the Alabama Interagency Council for the
9	Prevention of Elder Abuse; to provide for the membership and
10	duties of the council; to allow the council to adopt rules for
11	its internal operations; and to establish a lead agency for
12	the council.
13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
14	Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited
15	as the Elder Abuse Prevention Act.
16	Section 2. The Legislature hereby finds and declares
17	the following:
18	(1) Thousands of Alabama's elderly citizens are
19	victims of abuse. This includes psychological and sexual
20	abuse, financial exploitation, neglect, isolation and
21	abandonment.
22	(2) Tens of thousands of cases of abuse,
23	exploitation and neglect of the elderly remain unreported,
24	uninvestigated and unresolved each year.
25	(3) The elderly population of Alabama as in all
26	states, continues to be the most rapidly increasing segment of

the public, creating the immediate need for stronger plans for the health, safety, well-being, peace and dignity of this rising population.

- (4) The current responsibilities for elder safety and protection from abuse, exploitation and neglect is shared by multiple agencies and departments of the State of Alabama, including the executive, judicial and legislative branches of government.
- (5) There is a need for increased coordination, collaboration, communication, sharing, training and partnering between the state agencies and departments that have unique skills, research, scientific and technical capabilities and professional disciplines that will greatly enhance and create a much stronger, comprehensive system of care for the safety and protection of existing and of potential elder abuse victims.
- (6) These and other planned steps toward strengthening elder safety will prepare Alabama to aggressively seek and receive federal and private funds, for the purpose of protecting the elderly, providing justice for those who have been victims of elder abuse and protecting and enhancing the lives of Alabama's elderly.
- (7) Alabama's renewed efforts to create, coordinate and sustain a stronger system of care for its elder citizens' safety, protection and life services will provide, simultaneously, an affirmation of public policy which

recognizes, respects and values the safety and dignity of the 1 2 elderly and which will serve as a positive and proactive opportunity to prevent expensive, burdensome and prolonged litigation against the State over issues of elder safety and care, as has historically occurred in the areas of children's 5 foster care, mental health services and other vital State 6 7 programs.

- (8) The State of Alabama, in all of these actions, affirms and pursues the clear Biblical mandates of honor, reverence, mercy, peace and dignity of its elders.
- (9) There is an urgent and substantial need to develop and implement a statewide comprehensive, coordinated, multidisciplinary interagency system of care for individuals, who are at risk of elder abuse.

Section 3. The following words are defined for the purposes of this act.

- (1) ELDER ABUSE. The maltreatment of an older person, age 60 or above, by any person, including:
- (a) PHYSICAL ABUSE. The intentional use of physical force that results in bodily injury, pain, or impairment. Examples of physical abuse include beating, slapping, bruising, cutting, burning, pushing or shoving, excessively restraining, force-feeding, and physical punishment.
- (b) SEXUAL ABUSE. The non-consensual sexual contact of any kind with an elderly individual. Examples include

fondling of the breast or genitals, rape, coerced nudity, and sexually explicit photographing.

- (c) EMOTIONAL/PSYCHOLOGICAL ABUSE. The intentional infliction of mental or emotional anguish by threat, humiliation, intimidation, or other verbal or non-verbal abusive conduct. Examples of psychological abuse include name calling, insulting, ignoring for extended periods of time, frightening, intimidating, and isolating from friends and family.
  - (d) NEGLECT. The intentional or unintentional failure by the caregiver to obtain adequate goods or services for the elderly person's maintenance and well-being. Examples include a caregiver who fails to buy groceries or prescription medications.
  - (e) SELF-NEGLECT. Behaviors of an elderly person that threatens his or her own health or safety. Examples are failure to provide self with adequate food, clothing, shelter, medication, safety and proper hygiene.
  - (f) MATERIAL EXPLOITATION. The unauthorized use of funds or any resources of an elderly individual; the misuse of power of attorney or representative payee status for one's own advantage or profit. Examples include stealing jewelry or other property, obtaining the elderly person's signature for transfer of property or for a will through duress or coercion.
  - (2) COORDINATED SYSTEM OF CARE. The total effort in the state, inclusive of service coordination/case management,

1 that is directed at meeting the needs of individuals, who are at risk of elder abuse. (3) COUNCIL. The Alabama Interagency Council for the Prevention of Elder Abuse. (4) LEAD AGENCY. A participating agency designated 5 to be the lead agency for the council. 6 7 (5) PARTICIPATING AGENCY. A department, commission, council, board, division, community service provider, or an 8 9 office or other entity which may provide services to 10 individuals at risk of elder abuse and their families including, but not limited to, the following: 11 12 a. 5	(2) The membership of the Council shall be inclusive
6	and reflect the racial, gender, geographic, urban/rural, and
7	economic diversity of the state.
8	$\frac{(2)}{(3)}$ The chief executive officers of state
9	agencies serving on the council shall serve ex officio.
10	$\frac{(3)}{(4)}$ The council shall meet at least bi-monthly
11	and the meetings shall be open to the public.
12	$\frac{(4)}{(5)}$ No member of the council shall cast a vote
13	on any matter which would provide direct financial benefit to

22	Section 5. The council shall have the following
23	duties and authority:
24	(1) To make recommendations to the Chief Justice of
25	the Alabama Supreme Court regarding the designation of the
26	lead agency.

- 1 (2) To define the roles and responsibilities of all participating agencies.
- 3 (3) To adopt rules for the internal operation of the 4 council.

- (4) To recommend to the Chief Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court the appointment of additional members to serve on the Council as deemed necessary and appropriate.
  - (5) To develop a long-range plan, reviewed semi-annually, for a comprehensive statewide system of care, which, to the extent practical, is derived from scientific based research and nationally recognized best practices. The council shall provide a copy of the plan and a detailed summary of any progress toward implementation of the plan to the Chief Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court, the Governor and the Legislature on or before the 10th legislative day of each regular session. The plan should include, but not be limited to, all of the following:
  - a. The eliminating of barriers to identifying and reporting elder abuse such as duplicative or fragmented policies which may require modification.
  - b. The development of a coordinated program of services for victims of elder abuse to include the identification, intervention, prevention, and prosecution of the crime of elder abuse.

- 1 c. A comprehensive fiscal review, and analysis with
  2 recommendations for state spending on programs and services
  3 for elder abuse prevention.
- d. The identification of annual action steps toward implementation.

(6) To ensure interagency collaboration, public participation, and mutual sharing of information to facilitate policy decisions and the implementation of a plan for a comprehensive statewide system of care to those at risk for elder abuse.

Section 6. The lead agency shall be responsible for the general administration, supervision, and monitoring of all council activities.

Section 7. The implementation of this act shall be subject to the availability of appropriations to expand, intensify, and coordinate the activities of the council. The activities of the council shall include the expansion of council membership.

Section 8. The council shall be subject to the Alabama Sunset Law, Chapter 20, Title 41, as an enumerated agency as provided in Section 41-20-3, and shall have a termination date of October 1, 2015, and every four years thereafter, unless continued pursuant to the Alabama Sunset Law.

Section 9. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
