22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. (a) The Secretary of State shall commence
24	a proceeding to administratively dissolve a corporation if the
25	corporation has been convicted of violating Title 8, United
26	States Code Section 1324a(f), as amended, for actions of its

officers and directors constituting a pattern or practice of employing unauthorized aliens in this state.

- (b) Upon dissolution, the properties and affairs of the corporation shall proceed the same as under the corporate laws of this state.
- (c) A corporation that is administratively dissolved pursuant to this act shall not be eligible for reinstatement for a period of not less than one year.
- (d) Any corporation convicted under Title 8, United States Code Section 1324a(f), as amended, shall immediately report the conviction to the Secretary of State and file with the Secretary of State an authenticated copy of the judgment or record of the conviction.
- (e) Before entering an order to administratively dissolve a corporation pursuant to this act, the Secretary of State shall issue a notice to the corporation giving it an opportunity to be heard and show cause why the order to administratively dissolve the corporation should not be entered.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
