BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

5 Section 1. Section 36-12-41 of the Code of Alabama

1975, is amended to read as follows:

7 "\$36-12-41.

"Every public officer having the custody of a public writing which a citizen has a right to inspect is bound to give him the citizen, on demand, a certified copy of it, on payment of the legal fees therefor, and such the writing within five business days of the request. The public official may make reasonable charges not to exceed the actual cost incurred in accessing, duplicating, supplying, or searching for the requested writing. The duplication fee may not exceed the actual cost of duplication. Such copy is admissible as evidence in like cases and with like effect as the original writing."

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
