4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

5 Section 1. (a) For purposes of this section, the 6 term "household pet" shall mean any domesticated cat, dog, or 7 other domesticated animal normally maintained on the property 8 of the owner or person who cares for the animal.

9 (b) No later than 12 months after the effective date 10 of this act, the State Emergency Management Agency, in 11 consultation with local emergency management agencies, shall 12 formulate an emergency operation plan for the humane 13 evacuation, transport, and temporary sheltering of service 14 animals and household pets in times of emergency or disaster. 15 The plan shall:

(1) Enable persons with disabilities, as defined in the Americans with Disabilities Act, who utilize service animals to be evacuated, transported, and sheltered with those service animals and inform all facilities that provide shelter to persons with disabilities who are accompanied by their service animals of their legal obligation to shelter both the disabled person and the service animal.

(2) Identify shelters and other state facilities
that are designed and equipped to accept and temporarily house
household pets and assist in the development of guidelines for
such shelters including, but not limited to, criteria for
admission, health and safety standards, basic minimum animal

care standards regarding nutrition, space, hygiene, and
 medical needs, and protocols and procedures for ensuring
 adequate sheltering, management, and veterinary staffing for
 such shelters.

5 (3) Enable, wherever possible, pet and pet-owner 6 evacuations for disabled, elderly, special needs residents, 7 and all other residents whenever such evacuations can be 8 accomplished without endangering human life.

9 (4) Establish an identification system to enable 10 household pet owners who are separated from their pet during 11 an evacuation to locate and reclaim the pet.

12 (5) Allow household pets in cages or carriers that 13 safely and securely confine the pets and are specifically 14 designed for the containment and transport of pets to utilize 15 public transportation during an impending disaster when doing 16 so does not endanger human life.

17 (6) Implement a public information program to
18 provide guidance to household pet owners in formulating their
19 own evacuation plan for their household pets and service
20 animals and inform the pet owners of the resources available
21 to them.

(7) Require animal shelters, humane societies,
veterinary offices, boarding kennels, breeders, animal
hospitals, schools, and animal testing facilities to create
evacuation plans for their animals. The plan shall be filed
with the State Emergency Management Agency and shall be made
available for public inspection.

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(8) Coordinate the development and establishment of
 a volunteer worker training program to assist in the
 evacuation and sheltering of household pets and service
 animals.

5 Section 2. All laws or parts of laws which conflict6 with this act are repealed.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
first day of the third month following its passage and
approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
