SYNOPSIS: Under existing law, retired veterans who are recipients of the Medal of Honor or their surviving spouses and retired veterans who are former prisoners of war receive one distinctive license tag at no fee or tax. Retired veterans who are Purple Heart recipients may receive the distinctive tag at no additional fee, but must pay ad valorem tax on the vehicle. Additional distinctive license plates are available to these veterans upon payment of the regular license tax and registration fees, including ad valorem taxes.

This bill would provide that Purple Heart recipients and their surviving spouses could receive a distinctive license tag at no cost, including ad valorem tax.

This bill would also provide that retired veterans who are recipients of the Purple Heart or the Medal of Honor and their surviving spouses and retired veterans who are former prisoners of war and their surviving spouses could receive
distinctive license plates for additional vehicles without payment of the license tax and registration fees, including ad valorem taxes.

A BILL
TO BE ENTITLED
AN ACT

To amend Section 32-6-250, Code of Alabama 1975; to provide that retired veterans who are recipients of the Purple Heart and their surviving spouses may receive distinctive license tags without payment of the license tax and registration fee; to provide that retired veterans who are recipients of the Medal of Honor or their surviving spouses and retired veterans who are former prisoners of war or their surviving spouses may receive distinctive license plates for additional vehicles without payment of the license tax and registration fee.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
Section 1. Section 32-6-250, Code of Alabama 1975, is amended to read as follows:
"§32-6-250.
(a) A distinctive permanent license plate shall be issued to any resident of the state who is a recipient of the Medal of Honor or the surviving spouse of a recipient of the Medal of Honor, to any resident who is a recipient of the Purple Heart Medal or his or her surviving spouse, or to any
resident who shows by satisfactory proof that he or she was a duly recognized former prisoner of war or his or her surviving spouse, for use on a private motor vehicle registered in the name of the resident. There shall be no fee or tax, including ad valorem tax, for the ineense plate, except Purple Heart Hedal recipients shall pay ad valorem taves on vehicles for which the distinctive plates are issued, and no recipient shall receive a plate for more than one vehicle except as provid in susection (c) motor vehicle.
"(b) A former prisoner of war for purposes of this section is a person who, as a member of the United States Armed Forces, or while serving with a formal United States ally force, or as a United States civilian, was held as a prisoner of war during any armed conflict by forces hostile to the United States.
" (c) A person eligible to be issued a distinctive ticense plate under this section may be issued additional distinctive license plates, under any of the above license plate categories, if the person otherwise qualifies to receive the distinctive license plate, upon payment of all license tax and registration fees, including ad valorem tases, for the vehicles. Annual renewal decals shall be provided after payment, if required, of license fees and tases for the years during which a new tag or plate is not issued as provided in section 32-6-63. Upon request, Purple Heart recipients or their surviving spouses, Medal of Honor recipients or their surviving spouses, and former prisoners of war or their
surviving spouses shall receive additional distinctive license plates or renewal decals, as the case may be, without payment of registration fees or license taxes, including ad valorem tax, for the additional motor vehicle provided that the other requirements of this section are met."

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
