To amend Section 37-8-115 of the Code of Alabama 2 1975, relating to trains obstructing streets; to require 3 4 trains to be moved in certain circumstances; to place a time 5 limit on standing trains obstructing streets; and to provide civil penalties. 6 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: Section 1. Section 37-8-115 of the Code of Alabama 8 1975, is amended to read as follows: 9 10 "§37-8-115. "(a)(1) It shall be unlawful for any railroad train 11 12 in the state to obstruct any public street, road, or highway crossing-at-grade for more than 10 minutes. 13 14 "(2) After the initial 10-minute period, each 10-minute period or portion of a 10-minute period that the 15 crossing is obstructed by a standing train shall constitute a 16 17 separate offense. "(3) The railroad corporation or company that owns 18 or operates a train violating this subsection is liable for a 19 civil penalty not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for 20 21 each violation. 22 "(b) A train crew, yard crew, or engine crew of a train blocking a public crossing shall immediately take all 23 reasonable steps, consistent with safe operation of that 24 25 train, to clear the crossing upon receiving information from a law enforcement officer, member of a fire department, or 26

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<u>operator of an emergency vehicle that emergency circumstances</u>
 require the clearing of the crossing.

"(c) If a train is stopped on a railroad track and
is obstructing a public street, road, or highway
crossing-at-grade, the train crew, yard crew, or engine crew
shall exercise good faith judgment to determine how long the
train will be stopped on the track and shall inform the local
law enforcement agency, fire department, and rescue squads.

"(d) No member of a train crew, yard crew, or engine 9 10 crew of a railroad, which is a common carrier, shall be held personally responsible or found quilty of violating any law of 11 12 this state or any municipal ordinance regulating or intended to regulate the occupying or blocking of any street, road, or 13 14 highway crossing-at-grade by trains or passenger or freight 15 cars upon reasonable proof that the occupying or blocking of said the street, road, or highway crossing-at-grade was 16 17 necessary to comply with the orders or instructions either written or oral of his or her employer or its officers or 18 supervisory officials; provided, that the provisions of this 19 section. This subsection shall not relieve the employer or 20 21 railroad from any responsibility placed upon said the employee 22 or railroad by any such state laws or by such municipal 23 ordinances; provided further, that nothing contained herein shall affect any civil tortious responsibility of the agent, 24 servants, employees, and the railroad itself. 25

26 "(e) It is a defense to prosecution under this
27 section when a train has obstructed a street, railroad

1 crossing, or public highway due to an act of God, a breakdown
2 of the train, or acts of vandalism."

3 Section 2. This act shall become effective on the
4 first day of the third month following its passage and
5 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
