Relating to city boards of education; to amend

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Section 16-11-16 of the Code of Alabama 1975, is amended to read as follows:

8 "\$16-11-16.

"(a) The city board of education shall have power to establish and maintain a system of public schools including kindergartens and playgrounds for the benefit of children who are bona fide residents of and living within the corporate limits of such the city.

"(b) Such children who are six years of age and less than 19 years of age on the date school opens shall be entitled to admission to the elementary, junior and senior high schools.

"(c) (b) If a kindergarten is established and maintained, children from five to eight years of age may be admitted on such the terms and conditions as the city board of education may prescribe."

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
