6 (b) A public water system that fails to meet the 7 notification requirements of subsection (a) shall resume the 8 fluoridation of its water supply to its previous level until 9 proper notice is provided to the State Health Officer.

10 (c) The notification requirements of subsection (a) 11 do not apply to a temporary discontinuance of fluoridation 12 that is caused by equipment failure, maintenance, or 13 replacement; temporary chemical supply shortages; placing 14 water sources offline; or other similar unavoidable 15 circumstances.

16 Section 2. This act shall become effective on the 17 first day of the third month following its passage and 18 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
