This act shall be known and may be cited as Nick's Bill. 26

1 Section 2. (a) Notwithstanding Sections 32-6-64, 2 32-6-67, and 32-6-68, Code of Alabama 1975, upon application 3 to the judge of probate or license commissioner, compliance with motor vehicle registration and licensing laws, payment of 4 5 regular fees required by law for license plates for private passenger or pleasure motor vehicles, and payment of an 6 7 additional annual fee of ten dollars (\$10), owners of a motor 8 vehicle who are residents of Alabama and who possess a valid 9 Autism Spectrum Disorder certification card or are the parent 10 or guardian of a person who possesses a valid Autism Spectrum Disorder certification card, as provided in Section 22-1-15, 11 12 Code of Alabama 1975, shall be issued distinctive Person with 13 Autism license plates.

(b) These plates shall be valid for five years and
may then be replaced with either conventional, personalized,
or new Person with Autism tags or plates.

(c) Payment of required license fees and taxes for
the years during which a new plate is not issued shall be
evidenced as provided in Section 32-6-63, Code of Alabama
1975.

(d) The Department of Revenue shall design the
plates. The design shall be approved by the Legislative
Oversight Committee for License Plates prior to production.
Section 32-6-54, Code of Alabama 1975, shall not apply to the
plates designed pursuant to this section.

(e) The plates shall be issued, printed, and
 processed like other distinctive and personalized plates
 provided for in Chapter 6, Title 32, Code of Alabama 1975.

4 (f) The Department of Revenue may adopt any rules
5 necessary to administer this section.

6 (g)(1) The distinctive license plates are not
7 transferable between motor vehicle owners.

8 (2) If the owner of a vehicle bearing the 9 distinctive plates sells, trades, exchanges, or otherwise 10 disposes of the motor vehicle, the plates shall be retained by 11 the owner to whom issued and returned to the judge of probate 12 or license commissioner of the county, who shall receive and 13 account for the plates.

(3) If the owner of the distinctive license plates 14 15 acquires by purchase, trade, exchange, or otherwise, a vehicle for which no standard plates have been issued during the 16 17 current license period, the judge of probate or license 18 commissioner of the county, upon being furnished by the owner proper certification of the acquisition of the vehicle and the 19 20 payment of the motor vehicle license tax due upon the vehicle, 21 shall authorize the transfer of the distinctive license plates previously purchased by the owner of the vehicle, which plates 22 23 shall authorize the operation of the vehicle for the remainder 24 of the then current license period.

(4) If the owner of the distinctive license plates
acquires by purchase, trade, exchange, or otherwise, a vehicle
for which standard plates have been issued during the current

1 license year, the judge of probate or license commissioner, 2 upon proper certification of the owner and being furnished by the owner the standard plates previously issued for the 3 vehicle, shall authorize the owner of the newly acquired 4 5 vehicle to place the distinctive license plates previously 6 purchased on the vehicle and use the plates for the remainder 7 of the then current license period. The notice of transfer of ownership shall be recorded by the judge of probate or the 8 9 license commissioner.

10 (5) Any person acquiring by purchase, trade, exchange, or otherwise, any vehicle bearing the distinctive 11 12 plates, upon certification of the fact to the judge of probate 13 or license commissioner of the county and the payment of the fee now required by law, may purchase standard replacement 14 15 plates for the vehicle which shall authorize the operation of the vehicle by the new owner for the remainder of the license 16 17 period.

Section 3. This act shall become effective January
1, 2019, following its passage and approval by the Governor or
its otherwise becoming law.

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
