26	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

- Section 1. (a) In this section, the following words
 shall have the following meanings:
- 3 (1) DOMESTIC ANIMAL. A dog, cat, or other animal 4 that is domesticated and kept as a household pet.

- (2) MOTOR VEHICLE. A motor vehicle, as defined in Section 32-1-1.1, Code of Alabama 1975, that is enclosed.
- (b) A person is immune from liability for property damage or injury that results from his or her forcible entry into a motor vehicle if all of the following occur:
- (1) The actor knows a domestic animal is present in a motor vehicle and the actor has a good faith belief that the domestic animal is in imminent danger of suffering bodily harm unless the domestic animal is removed from the motor vehicle.
- (2) The actor determines that the motor vehicle is locked and that forcible entry is necessary to enable the domestic animal to exit or be removed from the motor vehicle.
- (3) The actor contacts law enforcement, emergency medical services, or animal control before the actor forcibly enters the motor vehicle.
- (4) The actor remains with the domestic animal until a law enforcement officer, emergency medical service provider, animal control officer, or other first responder arrives at the scene.
- (5) The actor uses no more force than he or she reasonably believes necessary to allow the domestic animal to exit or be removed from the motor vehicle.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
