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8	SYNOPSIS:	Under existing law, security personnel
9		employed by the House of Representatives and the
10		Senate are responsible for the security of the
11		fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth floors of
12		the Alabama State House; other areas in the
13		building used by the Legislature; and certain
14		legislative space in the State Capitol.
15		This bill would permit the House of
16		Representatives and the Senate to employ House and
17		Senate police officers whose operations would be
18		supervised and controlled by the Clerk of the House
19		of Representatives and the Secretary of the Senate
20		respectively.
21		This bill would provide that House and
22		Senate police officers would be responsible for
23		security in the entire Alabama State House,
24		surrounding grounds, parking lots, and curtilages,
25		and certain legislative areas of the State Capitol.
26		This bill would specify that House and
27		Senate police officers whose certification by the

Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training

Commission is current would have the powers of

peace officers and law enforcement officers in this

state, and this power could be exercised anywhere

in this state.

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This bill would provide, when authorized and as directed by House and Senate police officers, that part-time security employees could perform security duties at any location House and Senate police officers may perform such duties.

This bill would provide, when authorized and as directed by House and Senate police officers, that contract security employees may perform security duties in the Alabama State House and other specified locations.

This bill would permit House and Senate police officers, State Capitol police, state troopers, and other law enforcement officers, when authorized by a House or Senate police officer, to carry firearms and other deadly weapons in the Alabama State House.

This bill would provide that, in addition to the Legislature, when requested by the Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of the House of Representatives, or a House or Senate police officer or any combination thereof, every state department, agency, and bureau would assist in the

manner requested in assuring the security of the Alabama State House.

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This bill would also provide contempt and criminal penalties for disorderly or disruptive conduct in the State House or the disruption of legislative proceedings and would authorize House or Senate police officers to arrest, with or without a warrant, any person committing any offense on property under their jurisdiction.

Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general law whose purpose or effect would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds from becoming effective with regard to a local governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote unless: it comes within one of a number of specified exceptions; it is approved by the affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, the bill does not require approval of a local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to

become effective because it comes within one of the
specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

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Relating to House and Senate security; to amend Section 29-4-4, Code of Alabama 1975, to authorize the House of Representatives and the Senate to employ House and Senate police officers; to specify supervision and control, authority, jurisdiction, and powers; to restrict who may carry a firearm or deadly weapon in the Alabama State House and to specify criminal penalties for a violation; to amend Section 29-6-7, Code of Alabama 1975, to make conforming changes; to provide for contempt and criminal penalties for the disorderly conduct or disruption of legislative proceedings; to authorize House and Senate police officers to arrest any person committing any offense on property under their jurisdiction; to provide for pari materia construction; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

1	Section 1. Sections 29-4-4 and 29-6-7 of the Code of
2	Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:
3	"§29-4-4.
4	"(a) (1) House and Senate police officers may be
5	Security personnel employed by the House of Representatives
6	and the Senate.
7	"(2) The Clerk of the House of Representatives and
8	the Secretary of the Senate shall supervise and control the
9	operation of House and Senate police officers, respectively,
10	for each house. The Clerk and the Secretary shall adopt
11	necessary security procedures and regulations to be
12	administered by House and Senate police officers and ensure
13	that such procedures and regulations are appropriately
14	implemented and administered.
15	"(3)a. The Clerk of the House of Representatives and
16	the Secretary of the Senate, through their respective police
17	officers shall be responsible for the security of the fourth,
18	fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth floors of the entire Alabama
19	State House, surrounding grounds, parking lots, and curtilages
20	such other areas within the Alabama State House as are used by
21	the Legislature, and such other areas in accordance with this
22	section, Section 29-1-19, and other law.
23	"b. When authorized and as directed by House and
24	Senate police officers, part-time security employees may
25	perform security duties, including entry level screening, at

any location at which House and Senate police officers may

perform such security duties.

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1	"c. When authorized and as directed by House and	
2	Senate police officers, contract security employees may	
3	perform security duties, including entry level screening, in	
4	the Alabama State House, surrounding grounds, parking lots,	
5	and curtilages, and at any other location where the	
6	Legislature convenes.	
7	"(b) The security officers House and Senate police	
8	officers employed under this chapter whose certification by	
9	the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission	
10	is current shall have the powers of peace officers and law	
11	enforcement officers in this state and may exercise those	
12	powers only in the areas designated in subsection (a) within	
13	the State Capitol complex and anywhere in the state at	
14	meetings of legislative committees, meetings of the House,	
15	meetings of the Senate, and events and conferences hosted or	
16	sponsored by the Legislature or any national or regional	
17	legislative organization.	
18	"(c) House and Senate police officers shall serve	
19	such process and execute such orders issued by the House or	
20	the Senate as directed by their respective houses.	
21	"(d)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (2), a	
22	person may not carry or possess a firearm or other deadly	
23	weapon, as defined in Section 13A-1-2, in the Alabama State	
24	<u>House.</u>	
25	"(2) House and Senate police officers, State Capitol	
26	police officers, and state troopers may carry a firearm or	
27	other deadly weapon, as defined in Section 13A-1-2, in the	

Alabama State House. Additionally, other persons, when

authorized by House or Senate police officers, may carry a

firearm or other deadly weapon in the Alabama State House.

"(e) House and Senate police officers are entitled to those benefits provided to other law enforcement personnel pursuant to Sections 36-21-2 to 36-21-7, inclusive.

"(f) Every department, agency, and bureau of the State of Alabama shall assist in any manner requested by the Legislature, the Secretary of the Senate, the Clerk of House of Representatives, or a House or Senate police officer, or any combination thereof, in assuring the security of the areas of the Alabama State House designated in subsection (a).

"§29-6-7.

- "(a) In addition to the powers otherwise provided in this chapter, the Legislative Council shall:
- "(1) Approve budget requests, provide accounting services, make purchases, and provide mail distribution, property inventory, telephone service, electronic media services, recycling services, and building maintenance services for the Legislative Department, and all agencies and entities, respectively, therein.
- "(2) Allocate space in the Alabama State House, including to the Senate and the House of Representatives. In carrying out its responsibilities under this subdivision, the Legislative Council may charge and collect rent from any entity allocated space in the Alabama State House at a rate set by the council. The council may establish a special fund

in the State Treasury to receive funds from any source to maintain the State House property. Funds in the special fund are continuously appropriated for the exclusive use of the Legislative Council, shall be maintained separately, and shall be in addition to any other funds appropriated to the Legislative Council. Any unused funds collected by or appropriated to any entity for the maintenance of the State House property remaining at the close of the fiscal year in which they were collected or for which they were appropriated shall be transferred to the fund created pursuant to this subdivision.

- "(3) Maintain a website of legislative expenditures that includes, but is not limited to, the names, salaries, and expenses of the members, officers, and employees of the Legislative Department and any contracts entered into by the Legislative Council for the benefit of any entity or agency of the Legislative Department. This requirement may be met through publication of the required information on a site that discloses this information on a statewide basis for other state government entities.
- "(4) Maintain the computer operations of the
 Legislature, including management and control of the
 Legislative Data Center and employ a director of technology
 who shall oversee the operations of the Legislative Data
 Center and maintain all computer guidelines of the Legislative
 Department and all agencies and entities therein, except that
 production of legislative proceedings of the respective Houses

shall be under the control of the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives, respectively.

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"(5) After consulting with the Secretary of the
Senate and Clerk of the House, provide security for the
Alabama State House, the Senate, the House of Representatives,
and those portions of the State Capitol under the control of
the Legislature, the House of Representatives, or the Senate;
provided, however, that security for the Senate and House
chambers, their entrances, and galleries shall be under the
absolute supervision and control of the Secretary and Clerk,
respectively. The Legislative Council shall also establish
protocol for the cooperation between the persons providing
security for the Legislature and such other law enforcement
agencies as necessary.

"(6)(5) Reduce and contain the cost associated with the operation and maintenance of the Legislative Department to the fullest extent reasonably possible and practical. In accomplishing the reduction, the Legislative Council, to the fullest extent possible, shall look for methods to save public funds and contain costs.

" $\frac{(7)}{(6)}$ Annually review the performance of the Director of Legislative Services.

"(8)(7) Employ a director of human resources who shall handle the human resources related functions for the Legislative Services Agency. The Director of Human Resources shall provide services at the direction of the Legislative Council, including providing lists of applicants for open

positions and the written application for employment for each, providing assistance in the determination of salary schedules, benefits, and terms of employment, maintaining custody of records as requested, and providing consultation on employee discipline.

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"(b) In addition to the powers otherwise provided in this chapter, the Senate Legislative Council, upon the recommendation of the Director of Human Resources, shall establish the job classifications, salary schedules, and benefits for all employees of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate. Notwithstanding the foregoing, there shall be a position of chief of staff who shall serve at the pleasure of the President Pro Tempore, under terms and conditions set by the President Pro Tempore; provided further, persons who serve at the pleasure of the Senate Majority Leader and the Senate Minority Leader serve under terms and conditions set by the Senate Majority Leader and the Senate Minority Leader, respectively; and provided further, persons employed under this sentence shall be paid from funds appropriated to the Office of the President Pro Tempore at a salary or other compensation approved by the President Pro Tempore.

"(c) In addition to the powers otherwise provided in this chapter, the House Legislative Council, upon the recommendation of the Director of Human Resources, shall establish the job classifications, salary schedules, and benefits for all employees of the Speaker of the House.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, there shall be a position of

chief of staff who shall serve at the pleasure of the Speaker, under terms and conditions set by the Speaker; provided further, persons who serve at the pleasure of the House Majority Leader and the House Minority Leader serve under terms and conditions set by the House Majority Leader and the House Minority Leader, respectively; and provided further, persons employed under this sentence shall be paid from funds appropriated to the Office of the Speaker at a salary or other compensation approved by the Speaker.

- "(d) The salary schedules, benefits, and terms of employment for all staff of the Legislative Department shall be as uniform as practical.
- "(e) Employees of the Legislative Services Agency,
 Speaker of the House, and President Pro Tempore of the Senate
 shall be under the direction and control of the Director of
 the Legislative Services Agency, Speaker of the House, and
 President Pro Tempore of the Senate, respectively.
- "(f) The Director of the Legislative Services Agency shall annually review the performance of each employee subject to his or her supervision and report thereon to the Legislative Council.
- "(g) The Legislative Council, after considering in a timely manner persons recommended for hire by the Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House, shall hire joint employees of the Legislature. The Legislative Council shall utilize the services of the Director of Human Resources for all joint employees, including providing lists of applicants for open

positions and the written application for employment for each, providing assistance in determination of job classifications, salary schedules, benefits, and terms of employment, maintaining custody of records as requested, and providing consultation on employee discipline."

Section 2. (a) A person may be held in contempt of the Legislature for disorderly or contemptuous behavior in its presence or at any location where the Legislature or committee convenes in whole or in part, and, by warrant signed by the presiding officer of the house and countersigned by the Secretary of the Senate or the Clerk of the House, may be taken into custody by House and Senate police officers and committed to the Montgomery County Jail for imprisonment for the time which the person is committed to imprisonment or until the person is duly discharged.

(b) In addition to being held in contempt of the Legislature under subsection (a), a person who engages in disorderly or unseemly conduct, either in the Alabama State House or surrounding grounds, parking lots, and curtilages, or at any other location where the Legislature convenes in whole or in part, or who disturbs the deliberations of either House, including legislative committee meetings, shall be guilty of a Class C misdemeanor.

Section 3. The House and Senate police officers shall take proper measures to prevent interruption of deliberations of either House, including legislative committee meetings, and may arrest, with or without a warrant, any

person committing a violation under Section 2 or any other violation of law of this state on property under their jurisdiction as provided in Section 29-4-4, Code of Alabama 1975.

Section 4. This act shall be construed in pari materia with Sections 29-1-19, 29-1-19.1, and 32-2-100, Code of Alabama 1975, and other applicable laws.

Section 5. Although this bill would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime.

Section 6. This act shall become effective immediately following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
