11	Relating to the statewide 911 Board; to amend
12	Section 11-98-4.1, Code of Alabama 1975, to authorize the
13	statewide 911 Board to administer a statewide voice and data
14	system; to fund grants for the various 911 districts in the
15	state; and to publish an annual report on the status of 911
16	service in this state.
17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
18	Section 1. Section 11-98-4.1, Code of Alabama 1975,
19	is amended to read as follows:
20	"§11-98-4.1.
21	"(a) There is created a statewide 911 Board
22	comprised of 13 members that shall reflect the racial, gender,
23	geographic, urban/rural, and economic diversity of the state.
24	All appointing authorities shall coordinate their appointments
25	so that diversity of gender, race, and geographical areas is
26	reflective of the makeup of this state. The 911 Board shall be
27	created effective July 1, 2012, and until the effective date

of the statewide 911 charge pursuant to Section 11-98-5, with 1 2 cooperation of the CMRS Board, shall plan for the implementation of the statewide 911 charge and the 3 distribution of the revenues as provided herein. The 4 5 reasonable administrative expenses incurred by the 911 Board 6 prior to the implementation of the statewide 911 charge may be 7 deducted from the existing CMRS Fund. Upon the effective date of the new statewide 911 charge, the 911 Board shall replace 8 9 and supersede the CMRS Board formerly created pursuant to this 10 chapter, and the CMRS Fund shall be incorporated into, and considered part of, the 911 Fund. 11

12 "(b) The 13 members of the 911 Board, each of whom 13 shall serve for a term of four years, shall be appointed by 14 the Governor as follows:

15 "(1) Seven members recommended by the Alabama 16 Association of 911 Districts, one from each of the seven congressional districts, with each district representative 17 18 recommended selected by vote of the Alabama Association of 911 Districts members from that congressional district. The 19 20 initial appointments shall include the three district 21 representatives on the CMRS Board who shall serve through 22 March 31, 2014, and a member from the first, third, fifth, and 23 seventh congressional districts as provided herein. Following 24 the March 31, 2014, expiration of the terms of the district 25 representatives drawn from the CMRS Board, the Governor shall 26 appoint a member recommended by the Association of 911 Districts from each of the second, fourth, and sixth 27

congressional districts, it being the intent of this section
 that each of the seven district representatives on the board
 be from a different congressional district, as such districts
 exist on May 8, 2012.

5 "(2) Two members recommended by CMRS providers 6 licensed to do business in Alabama.

7 "(3) Two members recommended by incumbent local
8 exchange carriers operating in Alabama, who shall not be from
9 the same local exchange carrier.

10 "(4) Two members recommended by cable companies that 11 provide interconnected VoIP services in Alabama, who shall not 12 be from the same cable company.

13 "(c) For purposes of the initial board appointments, 14 (1) five members of the board shall be appointed for a 15 four-year term; (2) four members for a three-year term; (3) the three members of the CMRS Board who are appointed pursuant 16 17 to subdivision (1) of subsection (b) to terms ending on March 18 31, 2014; and (4) the remaining member for a two-year term. Thereafter, board members shall serve staggered terms of four 19 20 years. In the event of vacancy, the vacancy shall be filled 21 for the balance of the unexpired term in the same manner as 22 the original appointment. Any vacancy occurring on the 911 Board, whether for an expired or unexpired term, shall be 23 24 filled by appointment as soon as practicable after the vacancy 25 occurs, whether for an expired or unexpired term.

"(d) For all terms expiring after June 1, 2014, the
 governmental entities or industry groups identified in

1 subsection (b) shall recommend at least two different persons 2 for each board position for which they are charged with making 3 a recommendation, with the Governor appointing a member from among such recommended candidates. For all terms expiring 4 5 after July 1, 2015, appointments made by the Governor shall be 6 subject to confirmation by the Senate as provided in this 7 subsection. Appointments made at times when the Senate is not in session shall be effective immediately ad interim and shall 8 9 serve until the Senate acts on the appointment as provided 10 herein. Any appointment made while the Senate is not in session shall be submitted to the Senate not later than the 11 12 third legislative day following the reconvening of the 13 Legislature. In the event the Senate fails or refuses to act 14 on the appointment, the person whose name was submitted shall 15 continue to serve until action is taken on the appointment by the Senate. 16

17 "(e) The statewide 911 Board shall have the18 following powers and duties:

"(1) To develop and publish a 911 State Plan Annual 19 20 Report. In fulfilling this duty, the 911 Board shall monitor 21 trends in voice communications service technology and in 22 enhanced 911 service technology, investigate, and incorporate 23 Geographical Information Systems (GIS) mapping and other 24 resources into the plan report, and formulate include 25 recommended strategies for the efficient and effective 26 delivery of enhanced 911 service. In addition, the board, in 27 conjunction with the Permanent Oversight Commission and

1 utilizing the information developed by the Department of 2 Examiners of Public Accounts pursuant to Section 11-98-13.1, shall study the operational and financial condition of the 3 current 911 systems within the State of Alabama and publish a 4 5 report detailing the same; study the rates charged for wireline 911 services and make adjustments to the rates as 6 7 provided in this chapter; recommend a long-term plan for any statutory changes necessary to ensure the most efficient and 8 effective delivery of 911 services in Alabama over both the 9 10 long- and short-term; recommend any legislation necessary to implement the long-term plan; and report its recommendations 11 provide a copy of its 911 Annual Report to the Permanent 12 13 Oversight Commission no later than February 1, 2014 members of the boards of the districts in the state through the Alabama 14 15 Association of 911 District.

"(2) To administer the 911 Fund and the monthly
statewide 911 charge authorized by Section 11-98-5.

18 "(3) To distribute revenue in the 911 Fund in19 accordance with this chapter.

"(4) To establish policies and procedures, adopted in accordance with the Alabama Administrative Procedure Act, to fund advisory services, grants, and training for districts and to provide funds in accordance with these policies and procedures to the extent funds are available.

"(5) To make and enter into contracts and agreements
 necessary or incidental to the performance of its powers and
 duties under this chapter and to use revenue available to the

911 Board under Section 11-98-5 for administrative expenses to
 pay its obligations under the contracts and agreements.

3 "(6) To accept gifts, grants, or other money for the4 911 Fund.

5 "(7) To undertake its duties in a manner that is 6 competitively and technologically neutral as to all voice 7 communications service providers.

8 "(8) To administer the deployment and operation of a 9 statewide 911 voice and data system that utilizes emerging 10 communication technologies which are capable of connecting to 11 a 911 system and delivering 911 and emergency information to 12 districts. The board shall use its available revenue to pay 13 obligations under the contracts and agreements for a statewide 14 911 voice and data system.

15 "(8)(9) To adopt rules in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act to implement this chapter; to 16 establish the statewide 911 charge; and, in response to 17 18 technological changes, apply, collect, and remit the statewide 911 charge, without duplication, to the active service 19 20 connections of other originating service providers that are 21 technically capable of accessing a 911 system, subject to the 22 provisions applicable to voice communications service 23 providers under this chapter. Any proposed rule extending the 24 application of the 911 charge beyond those voice communication 25 services defined in paragraphs a. to c., inclusive, of 26 subdivision (18) of Section 11-98-1, upon approval by the 911 27 Board shall be submitted to the Permanent Oversight Committee

1 which, by an affirmative vote of six of its members, may 2 disapprove the action. If not disapproved by the Permanent Oversight Committee within 15 days of submission, the proposed 3 rule shall be deemed adopted by the 911 Board on the fifteenth 4 5 day after submission and shall be certified to the Legislative Reference Service in accordance with the Administrative 6 7 Procedure Act. This authority does not include the regulation of any 911 service, such as the establishment of technical 8 9 standards.

10 "(9)(10) To take other necessary and proper action 11 to implement this chapter."

12 Section 2. The Executive Director of the statewide 13 911 Board shall prepare an annual report detailing the 14 training provided and administered by the 911 Board for 911 15 dispatchers. The report shall be submitted to the President 16 Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of 17 Representatives on February 1, 2020, and by February 1 each 18 year thereafter.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
