This bill would allow law enforcement 16 17 agencies to use license plate scanners on public 18 highways in certain circumstances. 19 This bill would also provide for the 20 confidentially of information collected and would 21 provide for the destruction of the information 22 after a specified time frame. 23 Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama 24 of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the 25 Official Recompilation of the Constitution of 26 Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general 27 law whose purpose or effect would be to require a

1 new or increased expenditure of local funds from 2 becoming effective with regard to a local governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote 3 unless: it comes within one of a number of 4 5 specified exceptions; it is approved by the affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates 6 7 funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to 8 the entity for the purpose.

9 The purpose or effect of this bill would be 10 to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. 11 However, the bill does not require approval of a 12 13 local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 14 vote to become effective because it comes within 15 one of the specified exceptions contained in the 16 amendment.

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Relating to license plate scanners; to provide for the limited use of license plate scanners on public highways by law enforcement agencies; to provide for the confidentially of information collected; to provide for the destruction of information collected; to require law enforcement agencies to adopt and publish public policies relating to license plate

scanners; to provide criminal penalties for certain 1 2 violations; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased 3 expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 4 5 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the 6 Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended. 7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 8

9 Section 1. (a) For the purposes of this section, the 10 following terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) LICENSE PLATE SCANNER. A device, used by itself 11 or in conjunction with another device, that is principally 12 13 designed and primarily used for determining the ownership of a motor vehicle, the mileage or route traveled by a motor 14 15 vehicle, the location or identity of a motor vehicle, or the identity of the occupants of the motor vehicle on public 16 17 highways through the use of a camera or other imaging device, 18 including, but not limited to, a transponder, cellular telephone, global positioning satellite, automated license 19 20 plate recognition system, or radio frequency device.

(2) CAPTURED LICENSE PLATE DATA. The global
positioning device coordinates, date and time, photograph,
license plate number, and any other data captured by or
derived from a license plate scanner or any other source.

(3) LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY. The Alabama State Law
Enforcement Agency, the Alabama Department of Transportation,
and any other federal, state, or local agency that is

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responsible for the prevention and detection of crime and the
 enforcement of penal, traffic, toll violation, regulatory,
 game, or controlled substance laws.

4 (4) LAW ENFORCEMENT PURPOSE. The investigation of an
5 criminal offense or activity initiated by a law enforcement
6 agency.

7 (b) Law enforcement agencies may collect captured 8 license plate data. All captured license plate data shall be stored immediately upon collection and may not be accessed 9 10 except for a law enforcement purpose. All captured license plate data collected shall be destroyed no later than 30 11 months after the captured license plate data was originally 12 13 collected unless the captured license plate data is the 14 subject matter of a toll violation or for a law enforcement 15 purpose.

(c) Law enforcement agencies may exchange or share
 captured license plate data with other law enforcement
 agencies for law enforcement purposes.

(d) A law enforcement agency that uses a licenseplate scanner shall do all of the following:

(1) Adopt and publicize a written policy governing
its use prior to it becoming operational. The policy shall
address all of the following:

a. The use of any database to compare data obtainedby the license plate scanner.

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b. The retention of data obtained.

c. The sharing of the data with another law
 enforcement agency.

3 d. The training of the operators of the license4 plate scanner.

5 e. The access to and the security of the data6 obtained.

f. Any other subjects related to the use of license
plate scanners by law enforcement agencies.

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(2) Maintain a record of users who access data.

(e) (1) Any individual who knowingly requests, uses,
obtains, or attempts to obtain captured license plate data
under false pretenses or for any purpose other than for a law
enforcement purpose, upon conviction, shall be guilty of a
Class C misdemeanor.

15 (2) Nothing in this section shall preclude a law 16 enforcement agency from contracting with a third party to 17 maintain captured license plate data for a law enforcement 18 agency. All individuals employed by the third party shall be 19 subject to subdivision (1).

20 (f) This section does not prohibit a county or city
21 board of education from using electronic devices to detect
22 school bus violations.

(g) The information collected or stored in any
database under this section is not a public record and is not
subject to public disclosure under Section 36-12-40, Code of
Alabama 1975.

Section 2. Although this bill would have as its 1 2 purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased 3 expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621, now 4 appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of 5 the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the 6 bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an 7 existing crime. 8

9 Section 3. This act shall become effective on the 10 first day of the third month following its passage and 11 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
