1 SJR11 2 3 4 ENROLLED, SJR11, MEMORIALIZING THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES TO 5 6 APPROVE THE UNITED STATES-MEXICO-CANADA AGREEMENT. 7 8 WHEREAS, it is of great importance to memorialize 9 the Congress of the United States to approve the United 10 States-Mexico-Canada Agreement, USMCA, in order to ensure 11 continuity in trade among the three North American economic 12 partners; and 13 WHEREAS, the imposition of artificial barriers to 14 free and open trade is harmful to American economic interests; 15 and 16 WHEREAS, together, the United States, Canada, and 17 Mexico promote a shared belief in freedom, representative democracy, and market principles, as recognized in the U.S. 18 19 Constitution; and 20 WHEREAS, a longstanding, close trilateral 21 relationship, codified in the North American Free Trade 22 Agreement, NAFTA, has existed between the United States, 23 Canada, and Mexico for more than twenty years, and has proven 24 economically, culturally, and strategically important for all

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parties, and this relationship will continue with ratification of USMCA; and

3 WHEREAS, since NAFTA entered into force in 1994, 4 trade with Canada and Mexico has nearly quadrupled to 1.3 5 trillion dollars, and the two countries buy more than 6 one-third of U.S. merchandise exports; and

7 WHEREAS, for 43 states in the United States, Canada 8 and Mexico represent their first or second largest export 9 market, and all but one U.S. State counts Canada or Mexico as 10 a top three trading partner; and

WHEREAS, NAFTA has contributed to a 350 percent increase in U.S. agricultural exports to Canada and Mexico; and

WHEREAS, the United States ran a cumulative trade surplus in manufactured goods with Canada and Mexico of more than 79 billion dollars over the six-year period from 2008-2014, with a surplus in services over 41 billion dollars in 2014 alone; and

WHEREAS, NAFTA has been a boon to competitiveness of U. S. manufacturers, which added more than 800,000 jobs in the four years after NAFTA entered into force, with Canadians and Mexicans purchasing 478 billion dollars of U.S. manufactured goods in 2014, generating nearly 40,000 dollars in export revenue for every American factory worker; and SJR11

1 WHEREAS, U.S. service exports to Canada and Mexico 2 have tripled, rising from 27 billion dollars in 1993, to 92 3 billion dollars in 2014, thanks to new market access and 4 clearer rules afforded by NAFTA, which will be continued under 5 USMCA; and

6 WHEREAS, Canada and Mexico are the two top export 7 destinations for U.S. small and medium-sized enterprises, more 8 than 125,000 of which sold their goods and services in Canada 9 and Mexico in 2014; and

10 WHEREAS, trade among the North American trading 11 partners is made up predominantly of intellectual property 12 IP-intensive goods and services that employ millions of 13 Americans in high paying jobs, and generate billions of 14 dollars in economic output; and

15 WHEREAS, trade agreements are the most appropriate 16 mechanism to harmonize and strengthen IP rights protections, 17 ensuring domestic and foreign businesses are on the same equal 18 footing before the law; and

19 WHEREAS, many of the IP-intensive goods, services, 20 and exchanges through which trade is facilitated in the NAFTA 21 bloc did not exist when the agreement was drafted, and this 22 situation has resulted in uneven and weak IP enforcement; and

WHEREAS, stringent enforcement of IP rights has been
found to correlate closely with greater household income,
Foreign Direct Investment, and Gross Domestic Product; and

1 WHEREAS, the IP provisions found in the USMCA are 2 the most comprehensive of any multilateral U.S. trade 3 agreement, and they are vastly superior to those included in 4 NAFTA; now therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA, BOTH 5 6 HOUSES THEREOF CONCURRING, That by this resolution, we memorialize the Congress of the United States to approve the 7 8 United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement, USMCA, in order to 9 ensure continuity in trade among the three North American 10 economic partners; upon adoption, an official copy of this 11 resolution shall be prepared and presented to the President of 12 the United States, to the chairs, ranking members, and all other members of the U.S. Senate Finance and the U.S. House 13 14 Ways and Means Committees, to the members of the Senate and 15 House Advisory Groups on Negotiations, to the U.S. Trade 16 Representative, to the U.S. Secretaries of Commerce, State, 17 and Labor, to the Director of the Office of Management and the Budget, and to the Intellectual Property Enforcement 18 19 Coordinator.
