- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. (a) In Class 8 municipalities, an elected official of the municipality who is an ex officio member of a state or local agency, board, commission, or other entity pursuant to law, may designate a person to serve in his or her place, who shall assume all duties of the elected official relating to the entity, including all voting rights and who shall be counted as a member for the purpose of conducting business. Provided, that the elected official may not appoint a convicted felon to serve in his or her place unless that person has had his or her civil rights restored.

- (b) A designee under subsection (a) shall serve at the pleasure of the elected official and for the duration of the elected official's term of office.
- (c) This section applies to a general or local law enacted prior to, on, or after the effective date of this act.

Section 2. This act shall become effective immediately following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
