| 25 | BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:                   |
| 26 | Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations             |
| 27 | heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a   |

total of \$15,089,140 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement and Technology Fund to the public institutions of higher education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017. This appropriation shall be expended for equipment and/or deferred maintenance. This appropriation shall be distributed as follows:

1 Section 2. In addition to all other appropriations 2 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a total of \$41,297,782 from the Education Trust Fund Advancement 3 4 and Technology Fund to the Department of Education for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2017. This appropriation 5 shall be expended to: (1) provide funds to complete the goal 6 of providing wireless networks in all public schools or (2) 7 8 provide E-Rate matching funds to local school systems that 9 apply to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) E-Rate 10 program for funds to accomplish the goal of providing wireless networks in all public schools or (3) provide funds to 11 implement the local school system's state-approved technology 12 13 plan for any local school system with wireless networks in 14 place that meet required standards.

Section 3. (a) The Department of Education shall ensure that each local school system receive the designated funds under the following restrictions:

(1) Any system participating in this program that
does not have wireless networks in place that meet the
standards established herein, but are able to do so using
their allotted funds, may use these funds for this purpose.

(2) Any system participating in this program that
does not have wireless networks in place that meet the
standards established herein, and which is unable to meet
these standards using their allotted funds alone must apply

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for E-Rate funds if such funds are available and if they meet
 all other applicable conditions of the E-Rate program.

3 (3) Any system participating in this program that
4 has wireless networks in place that meet the standards
5 established herein, may use their allotted funds to implement
6 their local school system's state-approved technology plan.

7 (b) The Department of Education shall utilize the 8 standards established in the Wireless Infrastructure Renovation for Education (WIRED) Plan for determining which 9 10 systems meet the goal of implementing high speed, standards-based Wireless Local Area Networks (WLAN) in all 11 12 schools. Such WLANs are the first priority of this program. 13 The funds provided for each system shall be based on a distribution formula based on enrollment and founded on the 14 WIRED cost model. 15

16 Section 4. The Department of Education shall allo-17 cate the funds appropriated herein to the local school systems 18 as follows:

Section 5. (a) The school systems participating in this program shall pursue obtaining additional funding from the FCC E-Rate program in order to help complete these wireless networks, wherever practicable. Therefore, distribution of and use of the allocated funds will be subject to the following provisions:

7 (1) For school systems that have met the standards established herein or that are in the process of installing 8 9 the equipment necessary to fully meet these standards and 10 which have approved 2015 Category 2 E-Rate applications which included in their funding request, in whole or in part, the 11 12 establishment of these wireless networking in schools. If local funds were used as the match for these Category 2 E-Rate 13 applications to accomplish this goal, then the funds allotted 14 15 herein may be used, in whole or in part, to reimburse local 16 school systems that moved forward with local funds. Any funds not applied to that purpose may be used to implement their 17 18 local school system state-approved technology plan.

19 (2) For school systems that have not met the 20 standards established herein and which have pending Category 2 21 E-Rate applications which will either advance or complete the 22 wireless networks according to the standards established 23 herein. If systems were not able to provide the local match 24 for these E-Rate applications once approved, then the funds 25 allotted herein may be used for the local match required by E-Rate to the extent that the amount of funds used for the match are in proportion to the cost of the wireless equipment contained in the E-Rate application. Any remaining funds may be used as matching funds for additional E-Rate applications to meet the standards described in the WIRED Plan.

(3) For school systems that do not fully meet the 6 7 WIRED standards, but which are able to do so using their allotment without obtaining additional funding from the E-Rate 8 program. Upon approval by the Department, these systems may 9 use their allotment to complete their wireless networks 10 11 without applying for E-Rate funding and may use remaining 12 funds to implement their local school system state-approved 13 technology plan.

(4) For school systems that do not fully meet the 14 15 standards established herein which cannot complete the goal 16 without additional funding, and which are eligible to apply 17 for E-Rate funds to this purpose. These systems must submit an 18 E-Rate application for Category 2 funding to assist in the 19 establishment of the wireless networks and shall provide 20 evidence of this application in the form of an E-Rate Form 471 21 application certification notice from the FCC to the 22 Department of Education prior to expending funds from this program. The E-Rate 471 application must include WLAN 23 24 equipment that meets or exceeds the standards established 25 herein and which is also covered under the E-Rate Category 2 26 program. Program funds issued under these conditions shall be 27 used for the E-Rate local match for the applicable E-Rate

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funding cycle. Any amount of program funding that exceeds the amount needed for the E-Rate match may be used to implement the local school system's state-approved technology plan, provided that the wireless networks established with the E-Rate funds meet the standards established herein.

6 (5) For school systems that have met the standards 7 established herein. Upon verification of submission of 8 purchase orders or any other supporting documents to the State 9 Department of Education, funds will be approved and released 10 to the school systems. These funds shall be used to implement 11 the local school system's state-approved technology plan.

12 (6) In all cases where program funds will be 13 required to be used as an E-Rate local match these funds must 14 be held available by the local school system until the E-Rate 15 application is approved and the purchasing has begun.

Section 6. The Alabama Ahead Oversight Committeeshall approve the implementation of Sections 2 through 5.

Section 7. All funds not expended in the current fiscal year shall not revert but shall be carried forward for the purpose appropriated.

21 Section 8. This act shall become effective 22 immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or 23 upon its otherwise becoming law.

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
