BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

2 Section 1. Section 20-1-6, Code of Alabama 1975, is 3 amended to read as follows:

"§20-1-6.

- "(a) When used in this section, the words and terms defined in this subsection shall have the meanings herein ascribed to them, unless it clearly appears from the context that some other meaning is indicated The following terms shall have the following meanings:
- "(1) CANNED FOOD. Any food commercially processed and prepared for human consumption  $\div$ .
- "(2) PERISHABLE FOOD. Any food which that may spoil or otherwise become unfit for human consumption because of its nature, type or physical condition. This term includes, but is not limited to, fresh and processed meats, poultry, seafood, dairy products, bakery products, eggs in the shell, fresh fruits and vegetables, and foods which that have been packaged, refrigerated or frozen, and foods prepared at a food service establishment required to obtain a food service permit through the Alabama Department of Public Health.
- "(b) All laws to the contrary notwithstanding, a good faith donor of canned or perishable food, which is apparently fit for human consumption at the time it is donated, to a bona fide charitable or nonprofit organization for free distribution, shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability arising from an injury or death due to the condition of such the food unless such the injury or death is

a direct result of the gross negligence, recklessness, or intentional misconduct of such the donor.

"(c) All laws to the contrary notwithstanding, a bona fide charitable or nonprofit organization which that in good faith receives and distributes food, which is apparently fit for human consumption at the time it is distributed, without charge, shall not be subject to criminal or civil liability arising from an injury or death due to the condition of such the food unless such the injury or death is a direct result of the gross negligence, recklessness, or intentional misconduct of such the organization.

"(d) The provisions of this section shall govern all good faith donations of perishable food which that is not readily marketable due to appearance, freshness, grade, expiration date, spoilage, recall, surplus, or other conditions. Provided, however, that nothing in this section shall restrict the authority of any appropriate agency to regulate or ban the use of such food for human consumption."

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
