1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. (a) The owner or lessee of a private reef, bed, or bottom shall have a right of action against a person who takes oysters, shells, cultch, or clams in a private reef, bed, or bottom, or who damages, by pollution or otherwise, the private reef, bed, or bottom of the owner or lessee. The owner or lessee may recover treble damages and attorney's fees as the jury may assess.

- (b) In calculating damages, the jury may consider any of the following:
 - (1) Whether the defendant acted knowingly or willfully.
 - (2) Whether the defendant acted in reckless disregard of whether the reef, bed, or bottom was privately owned or leased.
 - (3) Except in an action for pollution under this section, whether the privately owned or leased reef, bed, or bottom was clearly marked and defined pursuant to Section 9-12-32, Code of Alabama 1975, at the time of the defendant's act or omission.
 - (c) It shall be an affirmative defense to an action for pollution under this section if the defendant acted in compliance with rules promulgated by the Alabama Department of Environmental Management at the time of defendant's act or omission.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
