- 9 Section 3. Sections 20-2-190, 22-1-12, 22-23A-3,
 10 24-10-2, 24-10-4, 24-10-5, and 41-23-23, Code of Alabama 1975,

- "(a) Any person who manufactures, sells, transfers,
 receives, or possesses a listed precursor chemical violates
 this article if the person:
- 16 "(1) Knowingly fails to comply with the reporting 17 requirements of this article;
- 18 "(2) Knowingly makes a false statement in a report 19 or record required by this article or the rules adopted 20 thereunder;
- "(3) Is required by this article to have a listed precursor chemical license or permit, and is a person as defined by this article, and knowingly or deliberately fails to obtain such a license or permit. An offense under this subsection shall constitute a Class C felony.
- "(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of Section
 20-2-188, a person who possesses, sells, transfers, or

otherwise furnishes or attempts to solicit another or 1 2 conspires to possess, sell, transfer, or otherwise furnish a listed precursor chemical or a product containing a precursor 3 4 chemical or ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, their salts or 5 optical isomers, or salts of optical isomers commits an offense if the person possesses, sells, transfers, or 6 7 furnishes the substance with the knowledge or intent that the substance will be used in the unlawful manufacture of a 8 controlled substance. An offense under this subsection shall 9 10 constitute a Class B felony.

11 "(c)(1) It shall be unlawful for any person, 12 business, or entity to knowingly sell any ephedrine or 13 pseudoephedrine, their salts or optical isomers, or salts of optical isomers unless sold from a pharmacy licensed by the 14 15 Alabama Board of Pharmacy. Any ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, 16 their salts or optical isomers, or salts of optical isomers 17 sold within a pharmacy must be sold by an individual licensed 18 as a pharmacist, a pharmacy technician licensed by the Alabama 19 Board of Pharmacy, or by an employee of the pharmacy under the 20 direct supervision and control of a licensed pharmacist.

"(2) Products whose sole active ingredient is ephedrine or pseudoephedrine in strength of 30 mg. or more per tablet cannot be offered for retail sale loose in bottles, but must be sold only in blister packages.

"(3) All packages of tablets containing ephedrine orpseudoephedrine shall be stored by a pharmacy by placing the

products behind a counter, within the pharmacy where the
 public is not permitted.

3 "(4) No person shall deliver, sell, or purchase
4 products sold over-the-counter that contain a combined total
5 of more than 3.6 grams per calendar day or more than 7.5 grams
6 per 30 days, of ephedrine base or pseudoephedrine base. It
7 shall not be a defense under this subdivision if no money was
8 exchanged during a transaction that would otherwise be
9 unlawful under this subdivision.

10 "(5)a. Each pharmacy selling an over-the-counter 11 product in compliance with paragraph b. of this subdivision 12 shall require the purchaser of the product or products to be at least 18 years of age, to provide a valid, unsuspended 13 driver's license or nondriver identification card issued by 14 this state, a valid, unsuspended driver's license or nondriver 15 16 identification card issued by another state, a United States 17 Uniformed Services Privilege and Identification Card, or a 18 United States or foreign passport, and to sign a record of each transaction. A record of each transaction shall include 19 20 the magnetic transfer or electronic entry of information data from the identification card into the system, as well as the 21 22 type of identification card used, including the number, name, 23 date of birth, and current, valid address of the purchaser, 24 the date and time of the sale, the name of the product being 25 sold, as well as the total quantity in grams, of ephedrine or 26 pseudoephedrine being sold. The system required pursuant to 27 this section shall be available to the state and to pharmacies

accessing the system without cost. Effective January 1, 2011, 1 2 provided a system is available to the state without cost to the state or pharmacies for accessing the system, before 3 completing a sale of a product covered by this section, a 4 5 pharmacy shall submit the required information to the electronic sales tracking system established under subdivision 6 7 (1) of subsection (i). The seller shall not complete the sale if the system generates a stop sale alert except when the 8 seller follows the procedure described under subsection (i) 9 10 for overriding the stop sale alert when the seller has fear of 11 bodily harm. Any seller who fails to comply with this 12 subdivision shall be quilty of a Class A misdemeanor upon a 13 first offense, and a Class C felony on a second or subsequent offense, except that sellers who exercise the override feature 14 described under subdivision (3) of subsection (i) when a stop 15 16 sale alert is generated shall not be subject to misdemeanor or 17 felony charges. Absent negligence, wantonness, recklessness, 18 or deliberate misconduct, any retailer maintaining the 19 electronic sales tracking system in accordance with this 20 subdivision shall not be civilly liable as a result of any act or omission in carrying out the duties required by this 21 22 subsection and shall be immune from liability to any third 23 party unless the retailer has violated any provision of this 24 subsection in relation to a claim brought for such violation. 25 Any excessive or suspicious sales of such a product by any 26 wholesaler, manufacturer, or repackager as defined in Section 27 34-23-1 shall be reported to the Alcohol Beverage Control

Board and the Board of Pharmacy. Any person who fails to comply with this subdivision shall be guilty of a Class A misdemeanor upon a first offense, and a Class C felony upon a second or subsequent offense.

5 "b. If a pharmacy selling an over-the-counter product in compliance with subdivision (3) experiences 6 7 mechanical or electronic failure of the electronic sales 8 tracking system and is unable to comply with paragraph a. of this subdivision, the pharmacy shall maintain a written log or 9 an alternative electronic recordkeeping mechanism that 10 11 complies with all identification and documentation 12 requirements of Act 2012-237, until the pharmacy is able to 13 comply with paragraph a. of this subdivision.

14 "(6) This subsection does not apply to products15 dispensed pursuant to a legitimate prescription.

"(7) This subsection shall preempt all local
 ordinances or regulations governing the sale or purchase of
 products containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine.

19 "(8) A pharmacist who is the general owner or 20 operator of an establishment where ephedrine or 21 pseudoephedrine products are available for sale shall not be 22 penalized pursuant to this section for conduct of an employee if the retailer documents that an employee training program 23 24 was conducted by or approved by the Alabama Drug Abuse Task 25 Force (ADATF), pursuant to subsection (h). As provided in 26 subsection (h), the Alabama Board of Pharmacy shall develop or 27 approve all training programs for those pharmacy employees

referenced in subdivision (1) and submit such programs to the ADATF for approval. The ADATF must review any training programs submitted by the Alabama Board of Pharmacy at its next subsequent called or scheduled public meeting and within Adays, report its decision in writing to the Alabama Board of Pharmacy.

7 "(9) A violation of subdivision (1), (2), (3), or
8 (4) shall constitute a Class A misdemeanor on a first offense
9 and a Class C felony on subsequent offenses. The violations
10 shall be punishable as provided by law.

11 "(d) Any person who resides within any state that 12 requires a prescription for any purchase of ephedrine or 13 pseudoephedrine, their salts or optical isomers, or salts of optical isomers, or who presents a valid identification as 14 provided in subdivision (5) of subsection (c) from any state 15 16 that requires a prescription for any purchase of ephedrine or 17 pseudoephedrine, their salts or optical isomers, or salts of 18 optical isomers, may purchase those products only upon 19 presentation of a valid prescription for the ephedrine or 20 pseudoephedrine, their salts or optical isomers, or salts of 21 optical isomers. The electronic system established in Act 22 2012-237 shall generate a stop sale and block any purchase in 23 violation of this subsection, absent a valid lawful 24 prescription.

"(e) Beginning October 1, 2005, any wholesaler,
manufacturer, or repackager of drug products as defined in
Section 34-23-1, other than a wholesaler, manufacturer, or

repackager licensed by the Board of Pharmacy, shall obtain a 1 2 registration annually from the Alcoholic Beverage Control 3 Board which may promulgate and implement administrative rules for the registrations. Beginning October 1, 2010, any 4 5 wholesaler, manufacturer, or repackager shall keep complete records of all sales and transactions involving a listed 6 7 precursor chemical or a product containing a precursor chemical including the names of all parties involved in the 8 transaction, the name of the products being sold, as well as 9 10 the total quantity in grams, of the precursor chemical or 11 product involved. Any wholesaler, manufacturer, or repackager 12 selling a listed precursor chemical or product to an 13 individual shall require the purchaser of the product or products to be at least 18 years of age and to provide 14 15 government-issued photographic identification of himself or herself. The records shall be maintained for at least 36 16 17 months and the records shall be available for inspection by 18 any law enforcement officer or inspector of the Board of 19 Pharmacy during normal business hours. Failure to comply with 20 subsection (d) and this subsection shall be a Class A misdemeanor for a first offense and a Class C felony for a 21 22 second or subsequent offense.

"(f) Beginning October 1, 2005, every retailer of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, or a product containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, is required to be registered with the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board to lawfully sell ephedrine or pseudoephedrine products to consumers.

"(g) In addition to any other penalty that may be 1 2 provided, a sale of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine by a wholesaler, manufacturer, repackager, or retailer without a 3 license as required by subsection (e) and (f) is a Class A 4 5 misdemeanor for a first offense and a Class C felony for a second or subsequent offense. In addition to any other penalty 6 7 that may be provided, a sale of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine 8 in violation of this section by a wholesaler, manufacturer, repackager, or retailer who is licensed as required by 9 10 subsection (d) or (e) or (f) shall result in cancellation of 11 the required registration and forfeiture of the right to sell 12 the products for at least two years or longer as determined by 13 the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board.

14 "(h)(1) The Alabama Drug Abuse Task Force (ADATF) is 15 established and given the authority to do all of the 16 following:

17 "a. Approve or develop drug awareness, enforcement, 18 education, prevention, and training programs. The programs 19 shall be designed to curb the abuse of all dangerous, illegal, 20 or abused drugs, including but not limited to, methamphetamine precursors, other key, critical, common ingredients used to 21 22 make methamphetamine, or other illegal or abused drugs in the State of Alabama. These programs may be targeted for, but not 23 24 limited to, employees of establishments where ephedrine or 25 pseudoephedrine products or other key or critical or common 26 ingredients in the illegal manufacture of methamphetamine or 27 other illegal or dangerous drugs are available for sale.

Education, prevention, and training programs also may be 1 2 targeted to law enforcement, prosecutors, the judiciary, 3 students, or that may further serve to protect, educate, and 4 inform the public. The programs may be administered by the 5 Alcoholic Beverage Control Board in conjunction with its program to restrict access to tobacco products by minors 6 7 pursuant to Chapter 11, Title 28. The programs may be further administered by any law enforcement drug abuse and violent 8 crime task force, the Alabama Department of Education, a 9 10 licensed private drug education or prevention entity approved 11 by the ADATF, or any other governmental or quasi-governmental 12 agency or entity partnering with the ADATF to serve the 13 purposes of this article. The Alabama Department of Public Health, ADATF, and the Alabama State Board of Education, shall 14 15 enter into a memorandum of understanding to develop and 16 implement the training, education, or prevention programs 17 referenced in this section, and are authorized to expend any 18 funds necessary to further the requirements and objective of 19 the ADATF and this subsection or any other legitimate drug 20 abuse prevention or law enforcement purpose for the protection of the citizens of this state. 21

"b. Advise the ABC Board, the Alabama Board of Pharmacy, Alabama law enforcement, prosecutorial entities, or other governmental or quasi-governmental agency or entity partnering with the ADATF regarding its responsibilities prescribed in this article.

"c. Report to the Legislature by the 10th day of 1 2 each legislative session, on the state of illegal drug abuse, 3 trends in the use, distribution, and manufacture of illegal or synthetic drugs, and the use and misuse of related precursors 4 5 in Alabama. The ADATF may only gather such information from legitimately verifiable sources or in a public forum. The 6 7 report may include recommendations with regard to public policy, potential legislation, allocation of resources, or 8 other recommendations which may aid in the curbing of drug 9 10 abuse and drug crime or would best serve the safety and well 11 being of the state. The report may include, but is not limited 12 to, all of the following: 13 "1. Statistical data involving drug abuse, drug crime, or drug related crime. 14 15 "2. Efforts within the state involving education, 16 prevention, and treatment of drug addiction. "3. Critical needs of law enforcement. 17 18 "4. Organized crime efforts in the area of drug 19 distribution, trafficking, manufacturing, or related criminal 20 activity. "5. Critical needs for prisons. 21 22 "6. Prosecution entities and the courts. 23 "7. Other critical threat assessments involving the 24 safety of the State of Alabama. 25 "(2) The task force shall consist of the following 26 members: "a. The Attorney General, or his or her designee. 27

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"b. The President of the Alabama State Board of 1 2 Pharmacy, or his or her designee. 3 "c. A representative appointed by the District Attorney's Association. 4 5 "d. A member of a regional county drug task force as appointed by the District Attorney's Association. 6 7 "e. The Director of the Department of Public Safety, or his or her designee. 8 "f. A representative appointed by the Chiefs of 9 10 Police Association. "g. A member of a regional county drug task force as 11 12 appointed by the Chiefs of Police Association. 13 "h. A representative appointed by the Sheriff's Association. 14 15 "i. A representative appointed by the Narcotics 16 Officers Association. 17 "j. A representative of the Alabama Association of 18 Pharmacists. 19 "k. The Director to the Alabama Department of 20 Revenue, or his or her designee. "1. A member or director of the Alabama Sentencing 21 22 Commission. 23 "m. The Chair of the Alabama Assistant District 24 Attorneys Association. 25 "n. The Director of the Alabama Department of Human Resources, or his or her designee. 26

"o. A representative of the Alabama Retail 1 2 Association. "p. A representative of the Alabama Administrative 3 Office of Courts. 4 5 "q. The Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Corrections, or his or her designee. 6 7 "r. The State Superintendent of Education, or his or her designee. 8 "s. A representative of the Commission of 9 10 Environmental Management. 11 "t. The Director of the Alabama Department of 12 Forensic Sciences, or his or her designee. 13 "u. The State Health Officer, or his or her 14 designee. 15 "v. The Director of the Alabama Department of 16 Homeland Security, or his or her designee. 17 "w. A representative of the mental illness and 18 substance abuse services of the Alabama Department of Mental 19 Health. 20 "x. The Director of the Office of Prosecution 21 Services, or his or her designee. 22 "y. A representative of the Alabama Criminal Justice 23 Information Center. 24 "z. A representative of the Board of Dental 25 Examiners. 26 "aa. A representative of the Alcoholic Beverage 27 Control Board.

"(3) The membership shall select a chair on a
 bi-annual basis.

3 "(4) The membership of the task force shall be
4 inclusive and reflect the racial, gender, geographic,
5 urban/rural, and economic diversity of the state.

6 "(5) The chair of the task force shall be 7 responsible for the conduct of the meetings and any 8 correspondence or reports derived therefrom.

9 "(6) The chair of the task force shall call an 10 organizational meeting of the task force within 60 days of 11 July 1, 2010, and the task force shall report its meeting 12 schedule and procedural rules to the Clerk of the House of 13 Representatives and the Secretary of the Senate within 10 days 14 of the meeting. The task force shall instruct the Alabama 15 Criminal Justice Information Center regarding the creation of 16 a drug abuse information system, as well as a drug offender 17 tracking system pursuant to Section 20-2-190.2, to further the 18 mission of the task force and assist law enforcement in the 19 prevention of illegal drug activity. This system shall 20 include, but not be limited to, data regarding illegal drug manufacture, trafficking, distribution, and usage trends 21 22 across the state. This information shall be made available and 23 be in a form and method which will enable the task force to 24 have an accurate and detailed understanding of the nature of 25 drug abuse and the geographical impact of the various abused drugs in Alabama. 26

"(7) The task force may expend any funds from any 1 2 source, including, but not limited to, donations, grants, and appropriations of public funds received for purposes of this 3 subsection. 4 "(8) No function or duties of the Drug Abuse Task 5 Force shall be the responsibility or under the purview of the 6 Governor of Alabama. 7 "(9) The task force shall not be obligated to fund 8 the development of programs described in subdivision (1) 9 10 unless the Legislature appropriates funding to the task force 11 for this purpose. 12 "(10)a. A subcommittee shall be created within the 13 task force to study the availability of ephedrine and ephedrine products. Members of the subcommittee shall include: 14 "1. The Attorney General. 15 16 "2. A member of the Legislature appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives. 17 18 "3. A member of the Legislature appointed by the 19 President Pro Tempore of the Senate. 20 "4. A district attorney, or his or her designee, 21 appointed by the Alabama District Attorneys Association, from 22 a jurisdiction with a significant and statistically verifiable 23 number of methamphetamine laboratory seizures. 24 "5. A sheriff appointed by the Alabama Sheriff's 25 Association, from a jurisdiction with a significant and 26 statistically verifiable number of methamphetamine laboratory 27 seizures.

1	"6. A chief of police appointed by the Alabama
2	Chiefs of Police Association, from a jurisdiction with a
3	significant and statistically verifiable number of
4	methamphetamine laboratory seizures.
5	"7. The Director of the Alabama Department of
6	Forensic Sciences, or his or her designee.
7	"8. The Chairman of the Alabama Drug Abuse Task
8	Force.
9	' b. On the tenth day of the next regular session of
10	the Legislature, the subcommittee of the task force shall
11	report to the ADATF and the Legislature a full and detailed
12	assessment of all efforts to limit or ultimately eliminate the
13	availability of ephedrine or ephedrine products to persons
14	with the intent to use them for manufacturing methamphetamine.
15	"c. The subcommittee of the task force shall
16	evaluate and report the effectiveness of the electronic drug
17	offender tracking system created in Section 20-2-190.2, as
18	well as statutory provisions to track or block any illegal or
19	inappropriate sales of ephedrine products. This evaluation and
20	report shall include consideration of criminal statutes
21	regarding the trafficking and manufacture of methamphetamine,
22	industry efforts to prevent improper usage of ephedrine
23	products, as well as other pertinent laws. Where possible, the
24	task force shall also endeavor to project future capabilities
25	to sustain or improve efforts to limit illegal access to
26	ephedrine products for purposes of manufacturing
27	methamphetamine.

1	"d. The subcommittee of the task force, in its
2	effort to provide a complete and accurate report, may utilize,
3	but is not limited to, the use of the following resources:
4	"1. Reports from any governmental or
5	quasi-governmental entity.
6	"2. Statistical data or reports from Alabama
7	Criminal Justice Information Center, National Precursor Log
8	Exchange, Alabama Fusion Center, Drug Enforcement
9	Administration, or any entity that has membership on the task
10	force.
11	" 3. Other appropriate law enforcement, drug
12	treatment, drug prevention, or medical entities that gather
13	verifiable data regarding drug usage, abuse, or any drug crime
14	or drug related crime.
15	"4. Relevant public hearings by the ADATF.
16	"5. Anecdotal information from named and
17	legitimately verifiable sources.
18	"6. All data or information must be sourced and
19	verifiable.
20	"e.1. Any report of the ADATF subcommittee to any
21	governmental entity shall first be submitted to the Alabama
22	Department of Public Health. The department shall evaluate the
23	report. In its review, the department shall evaluate the
24	quality and authenticity of the underlying sourced data. The
25	department shall also determine if the data contained within
26	the report is verifiable and if the ADATF or subcommittee of

the task force followed generally accepted scientific or
 statistical methods in the compilation of the report.

3 "2. In making its determination, the department may
4 consider, but is not limited to, evaluating any method,
5 process, research, calculations, design, control, analysis,
6 hypothesis, or program utilized in the report.

7 "3. In the event that the department determines that 8 the proper methods were not followed, it shall notify the task 9 force or subcommittee of the task force of any deficiencies in 10 the report and allow the task force or subcommittee to revise 11 the report to correct the deficiencies. Otherwise, the report 12 shall contain a notation of the findings of any deficiencies 13 by the department.

"(i)(1) The Alabama Criminal Justice Information 14 15 Center shall implement a real-time electronic sales tracking 16 system to monitor the over-the-counter, nonprescription sale 17 of products in this state containing any detectable quantity 18 of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, their salts or optical 19 isomers, or salts of optical isomers, provided that such 20 system is available to the state without cost to the state or 21 retailers for accessing the system. The electronic sales 22 tracking system shall have the technological capability to 23 receive ephedrine and pseudoephedrine sales data from retail 24 establishments submitted pursuant to this subsection. The 25 electronic sales tracking system shall be capable of bridging 26 with existing and future operational systems used by retail at no cost to such retail establishment. The Alabama Criminal 27

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Justice Information Center may enter into a public-private partnership, through a memorandum of understanding or similar arrangement, to make the system available to retailers and law enforcement in the state.

5 "(2) The information contained in this electronic 6 sales tracking system shall be available to:

7 "a. Any law enforcement agency or entity as
8 authorized by the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center;

9

"b. Pursuant to a subpoena.

10 "(3) This database established pursuant to this 11 subsection shall be capable of generating a stop sale alert, 12 which shall be a notification that completion of the sale 13 would result in the seller or purchaser violating the quantity limits set forth in subdivision (4) of subsection (c). The 14 system shall contain an override function for use by a 15 16 dispenser of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine who has a reasonable fear of imminent bodily harm. Each instance in which the 17 18 override function is utilized shall be logged by the system.

19 "(j)(1) Upon conviction for any violation of Section 20 13A-12-260 or 20-2-190, or any violation of a controlled substance or illegal drug crime under Title 13A or this title 21 22 and in addition to restitution and other costs that may be 23 ordered pursuant to Section 15-18-67, the primary 24 investigative law enforcement or prosecutorial entity shall be 25 entitled, upon request of the district attorney and an order 26 of the court, to recover restitution from any defendant for

any legitimate cost incurred in the course of the
 investigation or prosecution.

3 "(2) Restitution may include, but shall not be
4 limited to, any cost incurred by the primary investigative law
5 enforcement entity of any hazardous material or environmental
6 cleanup of substances related to the manufacture of a
7 controlled substance.

"(3) Any real property owner that demonstrates to 8 the court that he or she had no knowledge of, or had no reason 9 10 to have knowledge of, any illegal manufacturing of controlled 11 substances on his or her property by a defendant convicted of 12 a violation of Section 13A-12-260 or 20-2-190, or any 13 violation of a controlled substance or illegal drug crime under Title 13A or this title, through the district attorney, 14 15 may request a court order requiring the defendant to pay to 16 the real property owner all reasonable costs, if any, 17 associated with any legitimate environmental cleanup or 18 remediation or repair of the real property where the defendant had committed a controlled substance crime. 19

"§22-1-12.

"(a) The Department of Public Health shall establish
a comprehensive cardiac arrest survival plan for the training,
credentialing, and certification of primary cardiac care
providers in the use of semiautomatic external defibrillators
based on national guidelines for life-saving interventions of
persons suffering sudden, non-traumatic cardiac arrest

promulgated by the National Institutes of Health and the
 National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute.

"(b) All funds from the appropriation in Act 99-372
of the 1999 Regular Session shall be used to assist in the
purchase or acquisition of semiautomatic external
defibrillators and training for emergency medical care
providers. To be eligible for assistance, emergency medical
care providers shall meet standards established by the
department.

10 "(c) A Cardiac Arrest Survival Commission consisting 11 of the State Health Officer, the State Emergency Medical 12 Director, three members appointed by the Senate President Pro 13 Tempore, three members appointed by the Speaker of the House, 14 two members appointed by the Governor, and one member 15 appointed by the Alabama Chapter of the American Heart 16 Association shall make all awards of assistance by majority vote. The State Health Officer shall serve as chair of the 17 18 commission. Assistance may be in the form of equipment awarded 19 outright or purchased with matching funds from the provider. 20 The commission shall establish by majority vote the 21 methodology for making awards to eligible providers.

"The Governor, the Director of the Department of Economic and Community Affairs, the Director of Finance, one member of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker, and one member of the Senate appointed by the Lieutenant Governor may become a public corporation to be

known as the Alabama Water System Assistance Authority with 1 2 the power and authority hereinafter provided, by proceeding according to the provisions of this chapter. The Alabama Housing Trust 24 Fund Advisory Committee.

25 "(2)(1) ALABAMA DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC AND COMMUNITY
 26 AFFAIRS (ADECA). As established by Section 41-23-1.

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"(3)(2) ALABAMA HOUSING TRUST FUND. The trust fund

3 "(4)-(3) SIXTY PERCENT OF MEDIAN FAMILY INCOME. A
4 person or persons living together whose annual income or
5 incomes do not exceed 60 percent of the median family income
6 of a geographic area, as determined by the U.S. Department of
7 Housing and Urban Development, with adjustments for smaller
8 and larger families.

10 "The Alabama Affordable Housing Trust Fund is 11 created in the State Treasury for the collection and 12 distribution of designated funds for the purpose of increasing 13 the production of housing units, rehabilitating existing housing units, and maintaining such housing so that it can be 14 made affordable to individuals and families whose incomes are 15 16 at or below 60 percent of the median family income. The Alabama Housing Trust Fund shall be administered by ADECA 17 18 which shall appoint an advisory committee as prescribed in 19 Section 24-10-8 to advise the Director of ADECA as to program 20 components and operations.

"§24-10-5.

"(a) The Alabama Housing Trust Fund shall be
 maintained and administered by ADECA. ADECA is authorized and
 directed to do all the following:

"(1) Invest and reinvest all money held in the trust
fund in investments under ADECA's investment policies, pending
its use for the purposes described in Section 24-10-6.

1 "(2) Keep books and records relating to the
2 investment, interest earnings, and uses of monies deposited
3 into the trust fund.

4 "(3) Establish procedures for the withdrawal,
5 allocation, and use of the monies held in the trust fund for
6 the purposes described in Section 24-10-6.

7 "(4) Publish, on an annual basis, criteria for
8 determining the distribution of funds.

"(6) Prepare, in collaboration with the advisory committee, an annual performance report, which shall be provided to the Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, outlining the use of the trust fund monies, including, but not limited to, the trust fund's success in meeting its intended purposes.

18 "(7) Conduct, or hire an outside entity to conduct a 19 statewide housing needs assessment, once every five years to 20 inform ADECA, its director, and the advisory committee of the affordable housing needs in Alabama. The assessment should 21 22 include the housing needs for individuals with disabilities, 23 those living with HIV/AIDS, intellectual disability, 24 individuals experiencing homelessness, victims of domestic 25 violence, veterans, and the elderly.

"(8) Enter into contracts and agreements in
connection with the operation of the trust fund, including

1 contracts and agreements with federal agencies, local 2 governmental entities, community developers, and other 3 not-for-profit groups. This provision shall not authorize 4 contracts and agreements with for-profit entities.

5 "(9) Engage in ongoing efforts to increase funding 6 sources for the trust fund, including any additional ongoing 7 state-dedicated funding source.

8 "(b) ADECA shall seek the input of the Alabama 9 Housing Trust Fund Advisory Committee, outlined in Section 10 24-10-8, but the The Director of ADECA has final 11 decision-making authority on all matters relating to the trust 12 fund and the programs administered under Section 24-10-4.

"(c) ADECA shall be periodically paid a reasonable fee from amounts deposited to the trust fund to reimburse ADECA for its services in administering the trust fund. On an annual basis, ADECA shall not be paid in excess of 10 percent of the total annual deposits to the trust fund.

19 "Selection of zones and the general guidelines for 20 implementation of the provisions of this article shall be as 21 follows:

"(1) The Alabama Department of Economic and
Community Affairs shall see that all applications are
processed as follows:

25 "a. The state or any governmental entity in the26 proposed area may submit an application for zone designation.

"b. Each application should provide a statement of incentives being offered by the governmental entities, such as:

4 "1. Regulatory relief or waiver;

5 "2. Services provided;

6 "3. Tax incentives;

7

"4. Other nontax incentives.

8 "c. It is contemplated that state, county and/or 9 municipal governments may devise an innovative package of 10 local incentives in their respective jurisdictions and 11 aggressively pursue zone designation.

"(2) Zones shall be selected by the department, with input from the advisory council, which shall have the responsibility for the general implementation of the law.

15 "(3) An Enterprise Zone Advisory Council consisting 16 of members of the Alabama Department of Commerce, Southern 17 Development Council, Department of Labor, Department of 18 Education, State Department of Transportation, Department of 19 Environmental Management, Department of Agriculture and 20 Industries, Department of Revenue and other qualified 21 individuals or organizations shall be appointed by the 22 Governor with provisions to insure geographic representation 23 of rural and urban areas. This council shall be limited to 11 24 representatives and shall serve at the pleasure of the 25 Governor.

26 "(4) A legislative oversight committee shall be
 27 appointed by the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker. Such

committee shall consist of three members from the House of
 Representatives and three members from the Senate appointed by
 the respective officers of each body."

Section 4. This act shall become effective on the
first day of the third month following its passage and
approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
