12	This bill would delete from the definitions
13	of funeral directing and funeral director the sale
14	of funeral merchandise or funeral supplies.

17	TO BE ENTITLED
18	AN ACT
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20	To amend Section 34-13-1, Code of Alabama 1975,
21	relating to the Alabama Board of Funeral Service; to delete
22	from the definitions of funeral directing and funeral director
23	the sale of funeral merchandise or funeral supplies.
24	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
25	Section 1. Section 34-13-1 of the Code of Alabama
26	1975, is amended to read as follows:
27	"§34-13-1.

"(a) For purposes of this chapter, the following
 terms shall have the following meanings:

3 "(1) ACCREDITED SCHOOL or COLLEGE OF MORTUARY
4 SCIENCE. A school or college approved by the Alabama Board of
5 Funeral Service and which maintains a course of instruction of
6 not less than 48 calendar weeks or four academic quarters or
7 college terms and which gives a course of instruction in the
8 fundamental subjects including, but not limited to, the
9 following:

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"a. Mortuary management and administration.

"b. Legal medicine and toxicology as it pertains tofuneral directing.

13 "c. Public health, hygiene, and sanitary science. "d. Mortuary science, to include embalming 14 15 technique, in all its aspects; chemistry of embalming, color 16 harmony; discoloration, its causes, effects, and treatment; 17 treatment of special cases; restorative art; funeral 18 management; and professional ethics. 19 "e. Anatomy and physiology. 20 "f. Chemistry, organic and inorganic. 21 "g. Pathology. 22 "h. Bacteriology. 23 "i. Sanitation and hygiene. 24 "j. Public health regulations. 25 "k. Other courses of instruction in fundamental

26 subjects as may be prescribed by the Alabama Board of Funeral 27 Service.

"(2) AMERICAN BOARD OF FUNERAL SERVICE EDUCATION. 1 2 That funeral service educational organization which is an agency granted official recognition by the United States 3 4 Secretary of Education and which is composed of members 5 representing the American Association of College of Mortuary Science, the Conference of Funeral Service Examining Board of 6 7 the United States, Inc., the National Association of Colleges of Mortuary Science, and the University Mortuary Science 8 Education Association and which has as its object the 9 10 furtherance of education in the field of funeral service and 11 in fields necessary to, or allied with, the field of funeral 12 service, and further to formulate standards of funeral service 13 education and to grant accreditation to qualified schools and colleges of mortuary science and to do all things incidental 14 15 to the foregoing.

16 "(3) APPRENTICE EMBALMER or EMBALMER'S APPRENTICE.
17 Any person engaged in the study of the art of embalming under
18 the instructions and supervision of a licensed embalmer
19 practicing in this state.

"(4) APPRENTICE FUNERAL DIRECTOR or FUNERAL
DIRECTOR'S APPRENTICE. Any person operating under or in
association with a funeral director for the purpose of
learning the business or profession of funeral director, to
the end that he or she may become licensed under this chapter.

25 "(5) AUTHORIZING AGENT. A person at least 18 years
26 of age, except in the case of a surviving spouse or parent,

who is legally entitled to order the cremation or final
 disposition of particular human remains.

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"(6) BOARD. The Alabama Board of Funeral Service.

"(7) CEMETERY. A place dedicated to and used or
intended to be used for the permanent interment of human
remains. It may be either land or earth interment; a mausoleum
for vault or crypt entombment; a structure or place used or
intended to be used for the interment of cremated remains;
cryogenic storage; or any combination of one or more thereof.

10 "(8) CEMETERY AUTHORITY. Any individual, person, 11 firm, profit or nonprofit corporation, trustee, partnership, 12 society, religious society, church, association or denomination, municipality, or other group or entity, however 13 organized, insofar as they or any of them may now or hereafter 14 establish, own, operate, lease, control, or manage one or more 15 16 cemeteries, burial parks, mausoleums, columbariums, or any 17 combination or variation thereof, or hold lands or structures 18 for burial grounds or burial purposes in this state and engage in the operation of a cemetery, including any one or more of 19 20 the following: The care and maintenance of a cemetery; the 21 interment, entombment, and memorialization of the human dead 22 in a cemetery; the sale, installation, care, maintenance, or 23 any combination thereof, with respect of monuments, markers, 24 foundations, memorials, burial vaults, urns, crypts, 25 mausoleums, columbariums, flower vases, floral arrangements, 26 and other cemetery accessories, for installation or use within 27 a cemetery; and the supervision and conduct of funeral and

burial services within the bounds of the cemetery. It is the legislative intent of this chapter that a cemetery authority, to the extent that it engages in any of the activities described in this subdivision, shall not be affected by this chapter and shall not be deemed to have entered into or engaged in the practice of funeral directing, embalming, or funeral establishment operation.

8 "(9) CONVICTION. The entry of a plea of guilty or a 9 guilty verdict rendered by any court of competent 10 jurisdiction, excluding traffic violations.

"(10) CREMATION. The technical process, using heat and flame, that reduces human remains to bone fragments. The reduction takes place through heat and evaporation. Cremation shall include the processing, and may include the pulverization, of the bone fragments.

16 "(11) CREMATIONIST. A person who performs the 17 procedure of cremation.

18 "(12) CREMATORY. A building or portion of a building 19 that houses a retort and that may house a holding facility for 20 purposes of cremation and as part of a funeral establishment.

"(13) EMBALMER. Any person engaged or holding himself or herself out as engaged in the business, practice, science, or profession of embalming, whether on his or her own behalf or in the employ of a registered and licensed funeral director.

"(14) EMBALMING. The practice, science, or
 profession, as commonly practiced, of preserving,

disinfecting, and preparing by application of chemicals or
 other effectual methods, human dead for burial, cremation, or
 transportation.

4 "(15) FUNERAL. A ceremony for celebrating,
5 sanctifying, or remembering the life of a person who has died.
6 A funeral may be divided into the following two parts:

7 "a. The funeral service, which may take place at a8 funeral home, church, or other place.

9 "b. The disposition, which may take place by the 10 grave, tomb, mausoleum, or crematory where the body of the 11 decedent is to be buried or cremated.

12 "(16) FUNERAL DIRECTING. The practice of directing 13 or supervising funerals, the practice of preparing dead human bodies for burial by means other than embalming, or the 14 15 preparation for the disposition of dead human bodies; the making of arrangements or providing for funeral services or 16 17 the making of financial arrangements for the rendering of 18 these services or the sale of this merchandise or supplies; 19 the provision or maintenance of a place for the preparation 20 for disposition of dead human bodies; or the use of the terms funeral director, undertaker, mortician, funeral parlor, or 21 22 any other term from which can be implied the practice of 23 funeral directing; or the holding out to the public that one 24 is a funeral director or engaged in a practice described in 25 this subdivision.

26 "(17) FUNERAL DIRECTOR. A person required to be27 licensed to practice the profession of funeral directing under

the laws of this state, who meets the public, who plans 1 2 details of funeral services with members of the family and minister or any other person responsible for such planning, or 3 who directs, is in charge, or apparent charge of, and 4 5 supervises funeral service in a funeral home, church, or other place; who enters into the making, negotiation, or completion 6 7 of financial arrangements for funerals funeral services, including, but not limited to, the sale and selection of 8 funeral supplies, or who uses in connection with the 9 10 profession of funeral directing the terms funeral director, 11 undertaker, funeral counselor, mortician, or any other term or 12 picture or combination thereof when considered in context in 13 which used, from which can be implied the practicing of the profession of funeral directing or that the person using such 14 15 term or picture can be implied to be holding himself or herself out to the public as being engaged in the profession 16 17 of funeral directing; and for all purposes under Alabama law, 18 a funeral director is considered a professional. For the 19 purposes of this chapter, the term does not include any 20 cemetery authority.

"(18) FUNERAL ESTABLISHMENTS. The term includes any funeral home or mortuary service located at a specific street address where the profession of funeral directing, embalming, or cremation is practiced in the care, planning, and preparation for burial or cremation or transportation of human dead. The term does not include any cemetery or land or structure owned, operated, leased, controlled, or managed by

any cemetery authority as a cemetery. A funeral establishment
 shall consist of and maintain all of the following facilities:

"a. A preparation room equipped with sanitary
nonporous floor and walls, necessary drainage and ventilation,
and containing operating embalming equipment, necessary
approved tables, instruments, hot and cold running water,
containers or receptacles for soiled linen or clothing, and
supplies for the preparation and embalming of dead human
bodies for burial, cremation, and transportation.

10 "b. A display room containing a stock of adult 11 caskets and funeral supplies displayed in full size, cuts, 12 photographs, or electronic images. At no time shall less than 13 eight different adult size caskets be on the premises.

14 "c. At least one operating funeral coach or hearse 15 properly licensed and equipped for transporting human remains 16 in a casket or urn.

17 "d. If engaged in the practice of cremation, at
18 least one operable retort for cremation and an adequate supply
19 of urns for display and sale.

20 "e. A room suitable for public viewing or other
21 funeral services that is able to accommodate a minimum of 100
22 people.

23 "f. An office for holding arrangement conferences24 with relatives or authorizing agents.

"(19) FUNERAL SUPPLIES or FUNERAL MERCHANDISE.
Caskets made of any material for use in the burial or
transportation of human dead; outer receptacles, when sold by

a funeral director, including burial vaults and urns, for
cremated human remains; clothing used to dress human dead when
sold by a funeral director; and all equipment and
accouterments normally required for the preparation for burial
or funeral and other disposition of human dead.

6 "(20) GROSS IMMORALITY. Willful, flagrant, or 7 shameful immorality or showing a moral indifference to the 8 opinions of the good and respectable members of the community 9 and to the just obligations of the position held by the 10 offender.

11 "(21) MANAGING EMBALMER. A licensed embalmer who has 12 full charge, control, and supervision of all activities 13 involving the preparation room and embalming.

14 "(22) MANAGING FUNERAL DIRECTOR. A licensed funeral 15 director who has full charge, control, and supervision of all 16 activities involving funeral directing at a funeral 17 establishment.

"(23) MORAL TURPITUDE. Any unlawful sexual or
violent act, or any act involving theft, theft of services,
extortion, receiving stolen property, identity theft, forgery,
fraud, tampering with records, bribery, perjury, or any
similar act in any jurisdiction.

"(24) MORTUARY SCIENCE. The scientific,
professional, and practical aspects, with due consideration
given to accepted practices, covering the care, preparation
for burial, or transportation of dead human bodies, which
shall include the preservation and sanitation of the bodies

and restorative art and those aspects related to public
 health, jurisprudence, and good business administration.

3 "(25) MORTUARY SERVICE. A location with a specific 4 street address where embalming or cremation, or both, is 5 practiced for a licensed funeral establishment and where no 6 services or merchandise are sold directly or at retail to the 7 public. A mortuary service shall consist of and maintain all 8 of the following facilities:

9 "a. A preparation room equipped with sanitary 10 nonporous floor and walls, operating embalming equipment, and 11 necessary drainage and ventilation and containing necessary 12 approved tables, instruments, hot and cold running water, 13 containers or receptacles for soiled linen or clothing, and 14 supplies for the preparation and embalming of dead human 15 bodies for burial, cremation, and transportation.

16 "b. At least one operating motor vehicle properly 17 licensed and equipped for transporting human remains in a 18 casket or urn.

19 "c. If engaged in the practice of cremation, at20 least one operable retort for cremation.

21 "(26) OPERATOR. A person, corporation, firm, legal 22 representative, or other organization owning or operating a 23 funeral establishment.

"(27) PRACTICAL EMBALMERS. Any person who has been
actively and continuously engaged or employed in the practice
of embalming under the supervision of a licensed embalmer for
four consecutive years immediately preceding May 1, 1975, and

has been issued a license as a practical embalmer under the
 grandfather provisions of this chapter.

"(28) PROCESSING or PULVERIZATION. The reduction of
identifiable bone fragments after the completion of the
cremation process to unidentifiable bone fragments or
granulated particles by manual or mechanical means.

7 "(29) RETORT. An enclosed space within which the8 cremation process takes place.

9 "(30) TEMPORARY CONTAINER. A receptacle for cremated 10 remains, usually composed of cardboard, plastic, or similar 11 material, that can be closed in a manner that prevents the 12 leakage or spillage of the cremated remains or the entrance of 13 foreign material, and is a single container of sufficient size 14 to hold the cremated remains until an urn is acquired or the 15 cremated remains are scattered or buried.

16 "(31) URN. A receptacle designed to encase cremated 17 remains.

18 "(b) Nothing in this chapter shall require a funeral 19 director or funeral establishment to have or provide a chapel 20 or to restrict the conduct of funeral services from a church 21 or chapel.

"(c) Nothing contained in the definition of funeral directing, or in any other provision of this chapter, shall be applicable to or regulate or restrict cemetery authorities in the conduct of activities of a cemetery authority; or be applicable to or regulate or restrict the carrying on by any cemetery authority of any activities, functions, practices, and services which may now or hereafter (1) constitute any part of the operation or management of a cemetery or of the property of a cemetery or (2) otherwise consist of the interment or entombment of the human dead or memorialization of the human dead in any manner within a cemetery property." Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and

approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
