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2 ENROLLED, An Act,

3 Relating to religious expression; to create the Alabama Student Religious Liberties Act of 2015; to prohibit 4 5 local boards of education from discriminating against a student or parent on the basis of a religious viewpoint or 6 religious expression in public schools; to require local 7 8 boards of education to allow religious expression in class assignments, coursework, and artwork; to require local boards 9 10 of education to provide students with the freedom to organize 11 religious groups and activities; and to require local boards 12 of education to adopt and implement a policy regarding 13 voluntary student expression of religious viewpoints. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 14

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited
as the "Alabama Student Religious Liberties Act of 2015."

17 Section 2. A public school district local board of 18 education may not discriminate against students or parents on 19 the basis of a religious viewpoint or religious expression. A school district local board of education shall treat a 20 21 student's voluntary expression of a religious viewpoint, if 22 any, on an otherwise permissible subject in the same manner 23 the district local board of education treats a student's voluntary expression of a secular or other viewpoint on an 24 otherwise permissible subject and may not discriminate against 25

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the student based on a religious viewpoint expressed by the student on an otherwise permissible subject.

3 Section 3. Students may express their beliefs about religion in homework, artwork, and other written and oral 4 5 assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of their submissions. Homework and classroom 6 assignments shall be judged by ordinary academic standards of 7 8 substance and relevance and against other legitimate 9 pedagogical concerns identified by the school district local 10 board of education. Students may not be penalized or rewarded on account of the religious content of their work. If an 11 assignment requires a student's viewpoint to be expressed in 12 13 coursework, artwork, or other written or oral assignments, a 14 public school may not penalize or reward a student on the 15 basis of religious content or a religious viewpoint. In such 16 an assignment, a student's academic work that expresses a 17 religious viewpoint shall be evaluated based on ordinary 18 academic standards of substance and relevance to the course 19 curriculum or requirements of the coursework or assignment.

Section 4. (a) Students in public schools may pray or engage in religious activities or religious expression before, during, and after the school day in the same manner and to the same extent that students may engage in nonreligious activities or expression. Students may organize prayer groups, religious clubs, "see you at the pole"

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gatherings, or other religious gatherings before, during, and 1 after school to the same extent that students are permitted to 2 3 organize other noncurricular student activities and groups. Religious groups shall be given the same access to school 4 5 facilities for assembling as is given to other noncurricular groups without discrimination based on the religious content 6 of the students' expression. If student groups that meet for 7 8 nonreligious activities are permitted to advertise or announce 9 meetings of the groups, the school district local board of 10 education may not discriminate against groups that meet for 11 prayer or other religious speech. A school district local 12 board of education may disclaim school sponsorship of 13 noncurricular groups and events in a manner that neither 14 favors nor disfavors groups that meet to engage in prayer or 15 religious speech.

(b) Students in public schools may wear clothing,
accessories and jewelry that display religious messages or
religious symbols in the same manner and to the same extent
that other types of clothing, accessories and jewelry that
display messages or symbols are permitted.

21 Section 5. In order to ensure that a school district 22 <u>local board of education</u> does not discriminate against a 23 student's publicly stated voluntary expression of a religious 24 viewpoint, if any, and to eliminate any actual or perceived 25 affirmative school sponsorship or attribution to the school

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district local board of education of a student's expression of 1 a religious viewpoint, if any, each school district local 2 3 board of education shall adopt a policy governing voluntary religious expression in its schools. 4 5 Section 6. This act shall not be construed to authorize this state or any of its political subdivisions to 6 do either of the following: 7 8 (1) Require any person to participate in prayer or in any other religious activity. 9 10 (2) Violate the constitutional rights of any person. 11 Section 7. This act shall not be construed to limit 12 the authority of any public school to do any of the following: 13 (1) Maintain order and discipline on the campus of 14 the public school in a content and viewpoint neutral manner. 15 (2) Protect the safety of students, employees, and 16 visitors of the public school. 17 (3) Adopt and enforce policies and procedures 18 regarding student speech at school provided that the policies 19 and procedures do not violate the rights of students as guaranteed by the United States and Alabama constitutions and 20 laws. 21 22 Section 8. This act shall apply to all religions. It shall not be construed as establishing a particular religion 23 nor as prohibiting the free exercise of a particular religion. 24

Section 9. This act shall apply beginning with the
 2015-16 school year.

3 Section 10. This act shall become effective on the
4 first day of the third month following its passage and
5 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
