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23	To amend Section 16-40A-2, Code of Alabama 1975,
24	relating to the minimum contents that are included in a sex
25	education program or curriculum; to remove from the minimum
26	contents the emphasis that homosexuality is not an acceptable
27	lifestyle and the emphasis that homosexual conduct is a

1 criminal act; and to require that all material taught be done 2 in a culturally sensitive manner.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Section 16-40A-2, Code of Alabama 1975,
is amended to read as follows:

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"§16-40A-2.

"(a) Any program or curriculum in the public schools
in Alabama that includes sex education or the human
reproductive process shall, as a minimum, include and
emphasize the following:

"(1) Abstinence from sexual intercourse sex is the only completely effective protection against unwanted pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) when transmitted sexually.

"(2) Abstinence from sexual intercourse sex outside
 of lawful marriage is the expected social standard for
 unmarried school-age persons.

18 "(b) Course materials and instruction that relate to 19 sexual education or sexually transmitted diseases should be 20 age-appropriate <u>and culturally sensitive</u>.

21 "(c) Course materials and instruction that relate to 22 sexual education or sexually transmitted diseases should 23 include all of the following elements:

"(1) An emphasis on sexual abstinence as the only
 completely reliable method of avoiding unwanted teenage
 pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases.

"(2) An emphasis on the importance of self-control
 and ethical conduct pertaining to sexual behavior.

3 "(3) Statistics based on the latest medical
4 information that indicate the degree of reliability and
5 unreliability of various forms of contraception, while also
6 emphasizing the increase in protection against pregnancy and
7 protection against sexually transmitted diseases, including
8 HIV and AIDS infection, which is afforded by the use of
9 various contraceptive measures.

10 "(4) Information concerning the laws relating to the 11 financial responsibilities associated with pregnancy, 12 childbirth, and child rearing.

"(5) Information concerning the laws prohibiting
sexual abuse, the need to report such abuse, and the legal
options available to victims of sexual abuse.

16 "(6) Information on how to cope with and rebuff 17 unwanted physical and verbal sexual exploitation by other 18 persons.

19 "(7) Psychologically sound methods of resisting20 unwanted peer pressure.

"(8) An emphasis, in a factual manner and from a
public health perspective, that homosexuality is not a
lifestyle acceptable to the general public and that homosexual
conduct is a criminal offense under the laws of the state.

"(9) (8) Comprehensive instruction in parenting
 skills and responsibilities, including the responsibility to
 pay child support by non-custodial parents, the penalties for

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non-payment of child support, and the legal and ethical responsibilities of child care and child rearing." Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
