25	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
26	Section 1. (a) For the purposes of this section,
27	"long-term antibiotic therapy" means the administration of

oral, intramuscular, or intravenous antibiotics singly or in combination, for periods of time in excess of four weeks.

- (b) A licensed physician may prescribe, administer, or dispense long-term antibiotic therapy for a therapeutic purpose to eliminate infection or to control a patient's symptoms upon making a clinical diagnosis that the patient has a tick borne disease or displays symptoms consistent with a clinical diagnosis of a tick borne disease, if the clinical diagnosis and treatment are documented in the patient's medical record by the prescribing licensed physician.
- (c) A diagnosis under subsection (b) shall be based on knowledge obtained through medical history and physical examination only or in conjunction with testing that provides supportive data for the clinical diagnosis.

Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
