SB157 1 2 3 4 ENROLLED, An Act, 5 To establish the Fostering Hope Scholarship Act of 2015, relating to a tuition scholarship program for current or 6 7 former foster children in Alabama; to impose requirements for 8 participation; to direct the Department of Human Resources to 9 adopt and administer the program; to authorize the department 10 to develop rules to administer the program; to establish a 11 support system for participants in the program; and to repeal 12 Section 3 of Act 2014-413, now appearing as Section 40-18-362, 13 Code of Alabama 1975. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 14 15 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited 16 as the Fostering Hope Scholarship Act of 2015. 17 Section 2. (a) The State Department of Human 18 Resources shall develop and administer Fostering Hope, a 19 scholarship program for designated persons currently or formerly in the state foster care program, including children 20 21 adopted from the program at the age of 14 or older. Commencing 22 with the 2016-2017 academic year, the program, on behalf of 23 participants, shall do either of the following:

(1) Pay for tuition and required fees at any public
 two-year or four-year institution of higher education in the state.

(2) Pay required fees for job training courses or
skill certifications that are offered by any public two-year
or four-year institution of higher education in the state or
other publicly funded training programs in the state, and not
considered an associate's degree, if the courses or
certifications are first approved by the department.

9 (b) Payments of tuition and required fees are10 considered program scholarships.

11 Section 3. The program shall include a mentor 12 service administered by the department as a support system for 13 participants of the college tuition scholarship program. This 14 service shall include mentors who shall be compensated by the 15 department, as employees or contractors, to help participants 16 adapt to independent living and to academics and other college 17 or university activities.

Section 4. Appropriations for the program shall be 18 19 used by the department on behalf of participants in each fiscal year to pay public two-year and four-year institutions 20 21 of higher education or other publicly funded training programs 22 in the state for benefits extended to participants by the Fostering Hope program. The department may also use not more 23 24 than 10 percent of the total state appropriation made to the 25 program in any fiscal year for costs associated with the

mentor service. The department may not spend appropriations 1 2 for the program for purposes other than those listed in this 3 section. Any monies appropriated to the department for Fostering Hope that are unspent at the end of a fiscal year 4 5 shall be carried over for use by the program in the next fiscal year. The department shall develop rules for ensuring 6 7 that expenses of the Fostering Hope program in a fiscal year 8 do not exceed funding for the program in that fiscal year. For that purpose, and any other provision of this act to the 9 10 contrary notwithstanding, the department may limit the acceptance of applications for Fostering Hope scholarships and 11 may limit the award of scholarships. 12

13 Section 5. The program shall pay tuition and 14 required fees for a participant as governed by rules 15 promulgated by the department. In no event shall tuition and 16 required fees be paid pursuant to this section for more than 17 72 academic hours toward an associate's degree or 144 academic 18 hours toward a bachelor's degree for each participant. The program shall only pay tuition and fees relating to an 19 20 undergraduate degree.

21 Section 6. (a) To be eligible to participate in the 22 program, a scholarship applicant shall satisfy all of the 23 following:

(1) Be in the legal custody of the foster care
 program of the department at the time of graduation from high

1 school or earning a General Educational Development (GED) high 2 school equivalency certification; or in the permanent legal 3 custody of the foster care program of the department when his 4 or her adoption is finalized, at 14 years of age or older, and 5 has graduated from high school or earned a GED certification.

6 (2) Have net personal assets worth less than thirty 7 thousand dollars (\$30,000), subject to adjustment by the 8 Commissioner of the Department of Human Resources to account 9 for inflation.

(3) Is younger than 26 years of age at the start of
the semester, training program, or certification program for
which tuition or fees are requested from the program.

(4) Is accepted for enrollment in a degree-granting, training, or certification program, or is enrolled and working toward a degree, certificate, or completion of a job training program, at a public two-year or four-year institution of higher education or publicly funded training program in the state.

(5) Is making adequate progress toward the
 completion of a degree, certification, or training program as
 determined by rule promulgated by the department.

(6) Has completed and submitted to the United States
Department of Education a Free Application for Federal Student
Aid (FAFSA), or the equivalent, before each year in which he
or she receives a Fostering Hope scholarship. He or she shall

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have applied for all federal student financial aid grants,
including Pell grants, Supplemental Education Opportunity
Grants, and Education and Training Vouchers, identified as
being available for the student's application by the
department or by Federal Student Aid, an office of the United
States Department of Education, or its successor agency.

7 (b) To be eligible to participate in the program
8 after the first year of participation, an applicant shall also
9 satisfy all of the following:

10 (1) Complete, after the first academic year in which
11 he or she receives a Fostering Hope scholarship, annual
12 volunteer service requirements or employment requirements
13 pursuant to rules promulgated by the department.

14 (2) Remain in good standing with the policies
15 established by the college, university, or other training or
16 certification program in the state in which he or she is
17 enrolled.

18 (c) Scholarship funds may be disbursed only if
19 sufficient funding for the Fostering Hope program is
20 available.

Section 7. A scholarship awarded pursuant to this act may not be reduced by the amount of any federal aid, scholarship funds, or grant funds otherwise received by the person or by the amount of any private donations made to assist the Fostering Hope program. Section 8. Fostering Hope scholarship funds shall be applied to tuition and mandatory fees before any other grant, loan, voucher, or scholarship the student may be awarded to attend a public two-year or four-year institution of higher education in the state or publicly funded state training program.

7 Section 9. Any other provision of this act to the 8 contrary notwithstanding, an otherwise eligible person who 9 earns grants, scholarships, or other awards, excluding loans, 10 sufficient to pay his or her tuition, room and board, and 11 other fees at a public two-year or four-year institution of higher education in the state or publicly funded state 12 13 training program, as governed by rules promulgated by the 14 department, may not participate in the Fostering Hope program.

Section 10. The commissioner of the department may promulgate rules as necessary to implement and administer this act.

18 Section 11. All laws or parts of laws which conflict 19 with this act are repealed. Specifically, Section 40-18-362, 20 Code of Alabama 1975, as added by Act 2014-413, 2014 Regular 21 Session, relating to postsecondary education assistance for 22 students in foster care, is repealed.

23 Section 12. This act shall become effective on 24 October 1, 2015, following its passage and approval by the 25 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
