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22	To amend Section 16-1-39, Code of Alabama 1975,
23	relating to the self-administration of medications by
24	students; to name the section the Kyle Graddy Act; and to
25	allow the possession and self-administration of
26	auto-injectable epinephrine.
27	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. This section shall be known and may be
 cited as the Kyle Graddy Act.

3 Section 2. Section 16-1-39 of the Code of Alabama
4 1975, is amended to read as follows:

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"§16-1-39.

"(a) Commencing with the 2007-2008 scholastic year, 6 7 each local board of education and the governing body of each nonpublic school in the state shall permit the 8 self-administration of medications by a student for chronic 9 10 conditions if conducted in compliance with the State Department of Education and State Board of Nursing Medication 11 12 Curriculum, as may be amended from time to time by the 13 department and board. Approved medications may be 14 self-administered if the parent or legal guardian of the 15 student provides all of the information outlined in the medication curriculum, including, but not limited to, all of 16 17 the following:

18 "(1) Written and signed authorization for the 19 self-administration to the chief executive officer of the 20 school.

"(2) Written and signed acknowledgement that the school shall incur no liability and that the parent or legal guardian shall indemnify and hold harmless the school and the employees and agents of the school against any claims that may arise relating to the self-administration of approved medications. 1 "(3) Written medical authorization that includes all
2 of the following:

3 "a. The signature of the attending physician, or his4 or her authorized agent.

5 "b. Confirmation that the student has been 6 instructed in the proper self-administration of the approved 7 medication.

8 "c. The name, purpose, and prescribed dosage of the 9 medications to be self-administered.

10 "d. The frequency with which the prescribed11 medications are to be administered.

12 "e. Any special instructions or circumstances under13 which the medications should be administered.

14 "f. The length of time for which the medications are15 prescribed.

16 "(b) All documents provided to a school pursuant to 17 subsection (a) shall be kept on file in the office of the 18 school nurse or chief executive officer of the school.

19 "(c) The local board of education or the governing 20 body of the nonpublic school shall incur no liability and is 21 immune from any liability exposure created by this section.

"(d) Permission for the self-administration of approved medications shall only be effective for the school year in which permission is granted. Permission for self-administration of approved medications may be granted in subsequent years provided all requirements of this section are satisfied.

1 "(e) Upon obtaining permission to self-administer 2 approved medications pursuant to this section, a student shall be permitted to possess and self-administer approved 3 4 medications, according to the orders of the prescriber, at any time while on school property or while attending a 5 school-sponsored event. 6 7 "(f) Nothing in this section shall be interpreted as permitting a student to possess a controlled substance, as 8 defined in the medication curriculum, on school property. 9 10 "(g) For the purposes of this section, 11 auto-injectable epinephrine is a disposable drug delivery 12 device that is easily transportable and contains a premeasured 13 single dose of epinephrine used to treat life-threatening 14 allergic reactions. Auto-injectable epinephrine is an approved medication that may be carried on the person of and 15 self-administered by a student." 16 17 Section 3. This act shall become effective 18 immediately following its passage and approval by the

Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
