- (b) Except as provided by subsection (c), a school district may display on school property scenes or symbols associated with traditional winter celebrations, including a menorah or a Christmas image such as a nativity scene or Christmas tree, if the display includes a scene or symbol of the following:
 - (1) More than one religion.
- 16 (2) One religion and at least one secular scene or symbol.
 - (c) A display relating to a traditional winter celebration may not include a message that encourages adherence to a particular religious belief.
- Section 2. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
