Neither the Alabama 4 Emergency Management Agency nor its director, officers, and employees shall be liable for any civil damages for personal 5 injury, property damage, or death resulting from a defect in 6 7 the equipment sold, loaned, donated, or otherwise made available to the local emergency management agency pursuant to 8 this section. 9

10 (b) Unless specifically provided otherwise at the 11 time of the sale, gift, grant, or loan, any local emergency 12 management agency receiving property from the Alabama 13 Emergency Management Agency through sale, gift, or grant may 14 dispose of such property as determined appropriate by the local governing body overseeing the local emergency management 15 agency. Any property loaned to the local emergency management 16 17 agency shall be returned to the Alabama Emergency Management Agency as directed by the Alabama Emergency Management Agency. 18

Section 2. This act shall become effective
immediately following its passage and approval by the
Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
