156300-2:n:01/14/2014:LLR/th LRS2013-4248R1 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 SYNOPSIS: Currently, Alabama does not have a state 8 9 minimum wage law. 10 This bill would propose a constitutional 11 amendment to increase the state minimum wage to 12 \$9.80 per hour in three steps ending January 1, 2016. 13 This bill would provide that tipped 14 15 employees' wages may not fall 30 percent of the minimum wage at any time. 16 17 The bill would provide for an increase 18 commencing on January 1, 2020, and every three 19 years thereafter based on the Consumer Price Index for the July 1st of the year preceding the year of 20 21 the increase. 22 The bill would require the State Finance 23 Director to notify the Alabama Department of Labor 24 in writing between October 1 and October 15 each 25 year preceding a wage adjustment of the percentage 26 to be used for the cost-of-living adjustment for 27 the next three calendar years.

12	wage and to provide for an increase based on the increase in

15	Index for the July 1st preceding the year of the increase; to
16	require the State Finance Director to notify the Alabama
17	Department of Labor in writing between October 1 and October
18	15 every three fiscal years of the percentage to be used for
19	the cost-of-living adjustment for the next three calendar
20	years; and to require the Alabama Department of Labor to post
21	any change in the state minimum wage on its website which
22	shall serve as notice to each employer of this state.
23	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
24	Section 1. The following amendment to the
25	Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, is proposed and
26	shall become valid as a part thereof when approved by a
27	majority of the qualified electors voting thereon and in

1 accordance with Sections 284, 285, and 287 of the Constitution 2 of Alabama of 1901, as amended:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

4 Section 1. The following words and phrases shall
5 have the following meanings:

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(1) EMPLOYEE. An individual employed by an employer.

7 (2) EMPLOYER. An individual, partnership,
8 association, corporation, business trust, legal
9 representative, or any organized group of persons, acting
10 directly or indirectly in the interest of an employer in
11 relation to an employee.

12 (3) WAGES. Compensation paid to an employee in the 13 form of legal tender of the United States or checks or drafts 14 on banks negotiable into cash on demand or upon acceptance at 15 full value. Wages does not include tips or gratuities of any 16 kind.

17 (4) TIPPED EMPLOYEE. Any worker who customarily and
18 regularly receives more than thirty dollars (\$30) per month in
19 income from gratuities or voluntary monetary contributions
20 received by an employee from a guest, patron, or customer for
21 services rendered to that guest, patron, or customer and that
22 the employee reports to the employer.

23 Section 2. (a) Each employer shall pay to each 24 employee wages at a rate that is no less than nine dollars and 25 eighty cents (\$9.80) per hour or the federal minimum wage, 26 whichever is larger. (b) The wage increase to nine dollars and eighty
cents (\$9.80) shall occur in three eighty-five cent (\$0.85)
per hour increments: The first increase on January 1, 2015, to
eight dollars and 10 cents (\$8.10) per hour, the second
increase on July 1, 2015, to eight dollars and 95 cents
(\$8.95) per hour and the last increase on January 1, 2016, to
nine dollars and 80 cents (\$9.80) per hour.

(c) The wages paid to tipped employees may not fall 8 below 30 percent of the federal or the state minimum wage 9 10 rate, whichever is greater, at any time, provided that the employee receives at least 70 percent of the current minimum 11 12 wage rate in gratuities. If an employee's gratuities combined 13 with the employer's direct wages do not equal the applicable minimum wage rate, the employer must pay the difference in the 14 15 form of a tip credit.

16 Section 3. An employer may not displace an employee 17 to hire an individual at the hourly wage authorized under this 18 amendment. As used in this section, displace includes 19 termination of employment or any reduction of hours, wages, or 20 employment benefits.

Section 4. Each employer subject to this amendment shall keep a summary of this amendment and any applicable wage orders and regulations posted in a conspicuous and accessible place in or about the premises or place of business of the employer.

26 Section 5. An employer who violates the minimum wage 27 requirements of this amendment shall be liable to the employee for the amount of unpaid minimum wages plus interest. The court, in addition to any judgment awarded to an employee, shall require the defendant to pay court costs and reasonable attorney's fees incurred by the employee. An action under this section must be instituted within three years from the date the wages should have been paid.

Section 6. Nothing in this amendment shall be deemed to interfere with, impede, or in any way diminish the right of employees to bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing in order to establish wages in excess of the applicable minimum wage provided for by this amendment.

12 Section 7. Beginning January 1, 2020, and every 13 subsequent three years, the minimum wage provided in Section 2 14 shall be increased by the same amount as the increase in the 15 Consumer Price Index for Alabama as reported by the United States Department of Labor for the previous July 1, or any 16 17 subsequent equivalent index. The State Finance Director shall notify the Alabama Department of Labor in writing between 18 October 1 and October 15 of each fiscal year of the percentage 19 to be used for the cost-of-living adjustment for the next 20 21 three calendar years. The Alabama Department of Labor shall 22 post any change in the minimum wage on its website which shall 23 serve as notice to each employer of this state.

Section 2. An election upon the proposed amendment shall be held in accordance with Sections 284 and 285 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now appearing as Sections 284 and 285 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of

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Alabama of 1901, as amended, and the election laws of this
 state.

3 Section 3. The appropriate election official shall
4 assign a ballot number for the proposed constitutional
5 amendment on the election ballot and shall set forth the
6 following description of the substance or subject matter of
7 the proposed constitutional amendment:

"Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of 8 Alabama of 1901, to establish a state minimum wage at nine 9 10 dollars and eighty cents (\$9.80) per hour, increase from the 11 current rate in three increments by January 1, 2016, and to 12 provide for an increase in the state minimum wage every 13 subsequent three years based on the increase in the Consumer 14 Price Index for Alabama as reported by the United States Department of Labor. 15

17 This description shall be followed by the following18 language:

19 "Yes ( ) No ( )."
