SB147 1 2 3 ENROLLED, An Act, 4 To amend Section 34-1A-1 of the Code of Alabama 5 1975, as last amended by Act 2013-221 of the 2013 Regular 6 Session, and to add Section 34-1A-11 to the Code of Alabama 7 8 1975, relating to the Electronic Security Board of Licensure; to require an alarm monitoring company to make certain 9 10 reasonable attempts to verify that an alarm signal is valid 11 and to provide for implementation and enforcement by the 12 board; and to exempt certain persons from the definition of 13 locksmith under certain conditions. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 14 Section 1. Section 34-1A-1 of the Code of Alabama 15 16 1975, as last amended by Act 2013-221 of the 2013 Regular 17 Session, is further amended to read as follows: 18 "§34-1A-1. 19 "For the purpose of this chapter, the following terms shall have the following meanings unless the context 20 clearly indicates otherwise: 21 22 "(1) ALARM MONITORING COMPANY. Any person, company, 23 corporation, partnership, or business, or a representative or agency thereof, authorized to provide alarm monitoring 24 services for alarm systems or other similar electronic 25

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1	security systems whether the systems are maintained on
2	commercial business property, public property, or individual
3	residential property.
4	" <del>(1)<u>(</u>2)</del> ALARM SYSTEM. Burglar alarms, security
5	cameras, or other electrical or electronic device used to
6	prevent or detect burglary, theft, shoplifting, pilferage, and
7	other similar losses. The term does not include any fire
8	detection, fire alarm, or fire communication system.
9	" <del>(2)</del> (3) ALARM SYSTEM INSTALLER. A person or business
10	entity that offers to undertake, represents itself as being
11	able to undertake, or does undertake the installation,
12	service, or monitoring, of alarm systems for the public for
13	any type of compensation.
14	"(4) ALARM VERIFICATION. A reasonable attempt by an
15	alarm monitoring company to contact the alarm site or alarm
16	user by telephone or other electronic means to determine
17	whether an alarm signal is valid prior to requesting law
18	enforcement to be dispatched to the location and, if the
19	initial attempted contact is not made, a second reasonable
20	attempt to make a contact utilizing a different telephone
21	number or electronic address or number.
22	" <del>(3)<u>(5)</u> BURGLAR ALARM. An assembly of equipment and</del>
23	devices, or a single device such as a solid-state unit which
24	plugs directly into an AC line, designed to detect an
25	unauthorized intrusion or an attempted robbery at a protected

premises or signal public police or private guards to respond, or both.

3 "(5)(6) CLOSED CIRCUIT TELEVISION SYSTEM (CCTV). A
4 combination of electronic equipment and devices designed and
5 arranged for the viewing, monitoring, or recording of video
6 signals transmitted from transmitters, such as cameras, to
7 receivers, such as monitors, digital video recorders, and
8 network video recorders (NVR) through a closed cable or other
9 video signal transmission method.

10 "(6)(7) ELECTRONIC ACCESS CONTROL SYSTEM. A system 11 that is powered by the building's primary power source and is 12 used as a process to grant or deny an individual access to a 13 specific area or object based upon his or her possession of an 14 item, a code, or physical characteristic.

15 "(7)(8) INSTALLATION. The initial placement of 16 equipment or the extension, modification, or alteration of 17 equipment after initial placement.

18 "(8)(9) LOCKSMITH. A person or business entity that 19 offers to undertake, represents itself as being able to 20 undertake, or does undertake the installation or service of 21 locks for motor vehicles or for residential or commercial use. 22 The term does not include a person whose financial 23 compensation from services as a locksmith for the installation 24 or service of locks for residential use does not exceed five

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1	hundred dollars (\$500) annually and who does not advertise for
2	his or her services as a locksmith.
3	" <del>(4) CENTRAL</del> <u>(10) MONITORING</u> STATION. A location
4	where alarm signals are received as a part of an alarm system
5	and then relayed via operator to law enforcement officials.
6	" <del>(9)<u>(</u>11)</del> SERVICE. Necessary repair in order to
7	return the system to operational condition."
8	Section 2. Section 34-1A-11 is added to the Code of
9	Alabama 1975, to read as follows:
10	\$34-1A-11.
11	(a) The board shall require an alarm monitoring
12	company to utilize a system providing for alarm verification
13	of all alarm signals, except alarm verification shall not be
14	required in the case of a fire alarm or a panic or
15	robbery-in-progress alarm or in cases where a crime in
16	progress has been verified to be true by video or audio means,
17	when no alarm signal has been received from the alarm site
18	within the preceding 12 months, or when the contract between
19	the alarm user and the monitoring company specifies the use of
20	a different calling protocol.
21	(b) The board shall provide by rule for the
22	implementation and enforcement of this section.
23	Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
24	first day of the third month following its passage and
25	approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
