22		Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama
23		of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the
24		Official Recompilation of the Constitution of
25		Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general
26		law whose purpose or effect would be to require a
27		new or increased expenditure of local funds from

becoming effective with regard to a local governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote unless: it comes within one of a number of specified exceptions; it is approved by the affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, the bill does not require approval of a local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to become effective because it comes within one of the specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

To amend Section 3-8-1, Code of Alabama 1975; to prohibit a person from owning, possessing, maintaining, selling, or trading a nonhuman primate for which there is no licensed rabies vaccine; to provide for the seizure of such animals; to provide criminal penalties for violations; and in connection therewith would have as its purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of Amendment 621 of the Constitution of

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Section 2. Although this bill would have as its

expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further requirements and application under Amendment 621 because the bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and

approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
