159663-1:n:03/04/2014:DSM/tan LRS2014-671 1 2 3 4 5 6 7 SYNOPSIS: Under existing law, there is no recognized 8 uniform process for licensing an animal control 9 10 officer hired by a municipality or county within 11 the state. 12 This bill would provide for uniform state 13 training and certification of county or municipal animal control officers by the Alabama Animal 14 Control Association and provide for continuing 15 16 education. 17 18 A BTLL TO BE ENTITLED 19 20 AN ACT 21 22 Relating to animal control officers; to establish a state procedure for training and certifying a county or 23 24 municipal animal control officer; and to provide for minimum standards and continuing education requirements. 25 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA: 26

Section 1. The following words shall have the
 following meanings:

(1) ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER. A person employed by a 3 4 county or municipality who performs animal control functions, who may be authorized to issue citations for civil infractions 5 such as animals at large, no rabies tags, dangerous dogs, and 6 7 improper housing or care of an animal. Animal control officers may not bear arms or make arrests unless they are certified by 8 the Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission 9 10 (APOST). Certified animal control officers may wear a distinctive uniform and a badge that states Animal Control 11 12 Officer and the county or city of employment. Certified animal 13 control officers may be authorized to carry bite sticks, 14 pepper spray, or to use chemical immobilization devices.

(2) CITATION. A written notice, issued to a person by a certified animal control officer, that the officer has probable cause to believe that the person has committed a civil infraction and that the county or city court will hear the charge. Citations may be issued for no rabies tags, animals at large, animal cruelty/neglect, and any other offense as deemed appropriate by a county or city.

(3) CERTIFICATION. County and municipally employed
animal control officers who successfully complete a minimum
standards training course that includes, but is not limited
to, training regarding issuing civil citations, search and
seizure, animal handling, animal cruelty investigations,
courtroom demeanor, and officer safety may be licensed as an

animal control officer by the Alabama Animal Control
 Association. Additional courses may be required for bite
 stick, pepper spray, or chemical immobilization certification.
 Advanced certification by APOST is required for an animal
 control officer to make arrests or carry a firearm.

Section 2. In accordance with industry standards 6 7 within the United States, the Alabama Animal Control Association (AACA) shall develop and implement a uniform 8 training and certification curriculum for animal control 9 10 officers within two years of the effective date of this act which shall also include a specific program for continuing 11 12 education. The AACA may seek advice, participation, and 13 counsel in developing this program from the Alabama Humane 14 Federation, American Humane Association, Humane Society of the 15 United States, Alabama Veterinary Medical Association, National Animal Control Association, Alabama Sheriff's 16 17 Association, Alabama Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission (APOST), the Alabama Attorney General, Alabama 18 Office of Prosecution Services, Alabama League of 19 20 Municipalities, Alabama Department of Public Health, 21 Department of Agriculture and Industries, and others 22 recognized in the industry or government involved or impacted 23 by animal control issues. The curriculum and certification 24 process shall be implemented no later than two years after the effective date of this act and continuing education 25 26 requirements and programs shall be implemented within one year 27 thereafter.

1 Section 3. (a) For minimum state certification, the 2 animal control officer curriculum shall include mandatory training and proficiency qualifications for the following: 3 4 (1) State and local laws governing animal control, 5 protection, and animal cruelty. (2) Animal health and disease recognition, control, 6 7 and prevention. (3) The humane care and treatment of animals, 8 including standards for care and control of animals in an 9 animal shelter. 10 (4) Standards and procedures for the transportation 11 12 of animals. 13 (5) Principles and procedures for capturing and 14 handling stray domestic animals and wildlife, including 15 principles and procedures to be followed with respect to instruments used specifically for deterring the bite of an 16 17 animal. (6) Basic first aid for injured animals. 18 (7) The documentation of animal cruelty evidence and 19 20 courtroom procedures. 21 (8) Civil and criminal investigation procedures on 22 private or public property. 23 (9) Report writing and courtroom testimony. 24 (10) Communications and public relations. 25 (11) Crisis intervention and safety in animal 26 control.

1 (12) State and federal laws regarding the possession 2 of controlled substances and other medications involved in 3 animal care.

4 (13) Violations relating to animal control or
5 cruelty and issuing citations for such.

6 (14) Use of specific devices to subdue an animal,
7 including pepper spray or chemical immobilization.

8 (15) Safety for the officer, community, citizens,
9 and animals as it relates to animal control.

10

(16) Any other topics pertinent to animal control.

(b) The AACA, in conjunction with APOST, may develop an advanced certification for animal control officers who may be authorized to carry a weapon only for the purpose of animal control issues and who may be authorized to make arrests for specific violations.

16 Section 4. The AACA shall report to the Legislature 17 no later than the tenth day of the 2015 Regular Session 18 regarding the progress of developing and implementing this 19 training curriculum and certification with suggested 20 legislation for mandatory compliance.

21 Section 5. This act shall become effective on the 22 first day of the third month following its passage and 23 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
