3	To amend Sections 34-25A-3, 34-25A-4, 34-25A-5,		
4	34-25A-7, and 34-25A-11 of the Code of Alabama 1975, relating		
5	to the State Board of Prosthetists and Orthotists; to further		
6	provide for definitions; to specify that the law applies to		
7	licensed therapeutic shoe fitters; and to conform the		
8	abbreviated licensure titles in the law.		
9	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:		
10	Section 1. This act is named and shall be known as		
11	the "Colonel Mike Sullivan Act."		
12	Section 2. Sections 34-25A-3, 34-25A-4, 34-25A-5,		
13	34-25A-7, and 34-25A-11 of the Code of Alabama 1975, are		
14	amended to read as follows:		
15	"§34-25A-3.		
16	"As used in this chapter, the following terms shall		
17	have the following meanings:		
18	"(1) ACCREDITED FACILITY. A facility where		
19	prosthetic, orthotic, prosthetic and orthotic, or pedorthic		
20	care is provided to patients needing such care and has met the		
21	requirements of the board for such designation. The board		
22	shall require that all accredited facilities meet the		
23	requirements of a national certifying board, recognized by the		
24	state board in prosthetics, orthotics, and pedorthics		
25	accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies		

(NCCA) in the discipline or disciplines for which the
 application is made <u>and meet any other requirements of the</u>
 <u>board. The requirements may include custom and non-custom</u>
 <u>items the board may determine are necessary to perform quality</u>
 care and are typical in the course of business.

"(2) ACCREDITED PEDORTHIC FACILITY. A facility where 6 pedorthic care may be provided that has met the requirements 7 8 of the board for such designation. An accredited pedorthic facility shall contain a site that includes at least the 9 10 following equipment: Sanding/grinding equipment suitable for use, an oven for plastics and foams used in the fabrication of 11 12 pedorthic devices, and a vacuum device for forming pedorthic 13 devices.

14 "(3) AUTHORIZED HEALTH CARE PRACTITIONER. A 15 physician licensed to practice medicine or a person licensed 16 or authorized to practice podiatry pursuant to Article 6 17 (commencing with Section 34-24-230) of Chapter 24.

18 "(4) BOARD. The Alabama State Board of Prosthetists19 and Orthotists.

"(5) CHIROPRACTOR. A person licensed and acting
within the definition as found in Section 34-24-120.

"(6) MASTECTOMY FITTER. A health care professional who is specifically educated and trained in the provision of breast prostheses and post-mastectomy services, including patient assessment, formulation of a treatment plan, implementation of the treatment plan, and follow-up and practice management, which is consistent with nationally recognized programs which are accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA).

5 "(7) OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST/OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST
6 ASSISTANT/OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST AIDE. A person who is
7 licensed as an occupational therapist, or occupational
8 therapist assistant, or occupational therapist aide as defined
9 in Section 34-39-3.

"(8) ORTHOSIS. A custom-fabricated, definitive brace 10 11 or support that is designed for long-term use. 12 Custom-fabricated orthoses, also known as custom-made 13 orthoses, are devices designed and made from raw materials or 14 commercially available components for a specific patient and require the generation of an image, form, or mold that 15 16 replicates the patient's body or body segment and involves the 17 rectification of dimensions, contours, and volumes to achieve 18 proper fit, comfort, and function for that specific patient. 19 Except for the treatment of scoliosis, orthosis does not include prefabricated or direct-formed orthotic devices, as 20 21 defined in this subdivision and does not include any of the 22 following items: Commercially available knee orthoses used 23 following injury or surgery; upper extremity adaptive 24 equipment; finger splints; leather wrist gauntlets; face masks 25 used following burns; wheelchair seating that is an integral

part of the wheelchair and not worn by the patient independent 1 2 of the wheelchair; fabric or elastic supports; corsets; arch 3 supports, also known as non-custom or prefabricated orthotics; low-temperature formed plastic splints; trusses; elastic hose; 4 5 canes; crutches; cervical collars; dental appliances, and 6 other similar devices as determined by the board, such as those commonly carried in stock by a pharmacy, hospital, 7 8 rehabilitation facility, department store, corset shop, or surgical supply facility. Prefabricated orthoses, also known 9 10 as custom-fitted or off-the-shelf, are devices that are manufactured as commercially available items for no particular 11 12 patient, but those devices that can be formed or shaped by a 13 person licensed under this chapter are considered custom made. 14 Direct-formed orthoses are devices formed or shaped during the 15 molding process directly on the patient's body or body 16 segment.

"(9) ORTHOTIC FITTER. A health care practitioner,
 licensed with the board, who is specifically educated and
 trained in the provision of certain orthoses, including
 patient assessment, formulation of a treatment plan,
 follow-up, and practice management, consistent with nationally
 recognized programs accredited by the National Commission for
 Certifying Agencies (NCCA).

24 "(9) (10) ORTHOTICS. The science and practice of
 25 evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling,

fitting, adjusting, or servicing, as well as providing the 1 2 initial training necessary to accomplish the fitting of, an 3 orthosis for the support, correction, or alleviation of 4 neuromuscular or musculoskeletal dysfunction, disease, injury, 5 or deformity. The practice of orthotics encompasses 6 evaluations and consultation and continuing care, with basic observational gait and posture analysis. Orthotists assess the 7 8 need for and measure, design, manufacture, and fit orthoses to maximize function and provide not only the support but the 9 10 alignment necessary to either prevent or correct deformity or to improve the safety and efficiency of mobility or 11 locomotion, or both. Orthotic practice includes periodic 12 13 evaluation and consultation to assess its effect on the 14 patient's tissue and assure proper fit and function of the 15 orthotic device.

16 "(10) (11) ORTHOTIC SUPPLIER. A person licensed
17 registered with the board who is employed by or has a
18 contractual relationship with a manufacturer of orthoses or
19 orthosis components and who has complied with the registration
20 requirements of the board.

21 "(11) (12) ORTHOTIST. A person licensed to practice
 22 orthotics under this chapter.

"(12) (13) ORTHOTIST ASSISTANT. A person licensed
 under terms to be defined by the board and employed by the
 same agency as his or her licensed referring evaluator.

1	" (13) <u>(14)</u> PEDORTHIC DEVICE. Custom therapeutic			
2	shoes, diabetic shoes if prescribed by an authorized health			
3	care practitioner for the treatment of partial or complete			
4	amputation of the foot, foot ulceration, pre-ulcerative			
5	callous, or foot deformity, shoe modifications made for			
6	therapeutic purposes, partial foot prostheses, and foot			
7	orthoses and orthoses for use from the knee and below used for			
8	the treatment or alleviation, or both, of a condition that has			
9	its origin in the foot. A pedorthic device <u>, custom or</u>			
10	non-custom, addresses a medical condition of the foot below			
11	the ankle and is prescribed by an authorized health care			
12	practitioner.			
13	" (14) (15) PEDORTHICS. The design, manufacture,			
14	modification, or fit of custom shoes, orthoses, and pedorthic			
15	devices to prevent or alleviate foot problems caused by			
16	disease, congenital defect, overuse, or injury.			
17	" (15) (16) PEDORTHIST. A person who is licensed to			
18	practice pedorthics under this chapter.			
19	" (16) (17) PHYSICAL THERAPIST/PHYSICAL THERAPIST			
20	ASSISTANT/PHYSICAL THERAPIST TECHNICIAN. A person who is			
21	licensed to practice as defined in Section 34-24-191.			
22	" (17) (18) PHYSICIAN. A person who is a doctor of			
23	medicine or a doctor of osteopathy licensed to practice.			

"(18) (19) PODIATRIST. A person licensed or
 authorized to practice podiatry pursuant to Article 6 of
 Chapter 24.

"(19) (20) PROSTHESIS. A definitive artificial limb 4 5 that is alignable or articulated or, in lower extremity applications, capable of bearing weight. Prosthesis means an 6 artificial medical device that is not surgically implanted and 7 8 that is used to replace a missing limb, appendage, or other 9 external human body part and that includes an artificial limb, 10 hand, or foot. The term does not include artificial eyes, ears, dental appliances, ostomy products, devices such as 11 artificial breasts or eyelashes, wigs, or other devices as 12 13 determined by the board that do not have a significant impact 14 on the musculoskeletal functions of the body.

15 "(20) (21) PROSTHETICS. The science and practice of 16 evaluating, measuring, designing, fabricating, assembling, 17 fitting, aligning, adjusting, or servicing, as well as providing the initial education necessary to accomplish the 18 19 wearing and use of a prosthesis, through the replacement of 20 external parts of a human body lost due to amputation or 21 congenital deformities or absences. The practice of 22 prosthetics also includes the generation of an image, form, or 23 mold that replicates the patient's body or body segment and 24 that requires rectification of dimensions, contours, and 25 volumes for use in the design and fabrication of a socket to

accept a residual limb to create an artificial appendage that 1 2 is designed either to support body weight or to improve or 3 restore function or cosmesis, or both. Involved in the practice of prosthetics is observational gait analysis and 4 5 clinical assessment of the requirements necessary to refine and mechanically fix the relative position of various parts of 6 the prosthesis to maximize the function, stability, and safety 7 8 of the patient. The practice of prosthetics includes 9 evaluation, consultation, and providing continuing patient 10 care in order to assess the effect of the prosthetic device on the patient's tissues and to assure proper fit and function of 11 12 the prosthetic device.

"(21) (22) PROSTHETIST. A person who is licensed to
 practice prosthetics under this chapter.

"(22) (23) PROSTHETIST ASSISTANT. A person licensed
under terms to be defined by the board and employed by the
same agency as his or her licensed referring evaluator.

18 "(23) (24) PROSTHETIST/ORTHOTIST. A person licensed
 19 to practice prosthetics and orthotics under this chapter.

"(24) (25) THERAPEUTIC SHOE FITTER. A health care
professional who is <u>licensed by the board and who is</u>
specifically educated and trained to provide non-custom
therapeutic shoes and non-custom multi-density inserts. This
includes patient assessment, formulation of a plan,

1 implementation of the treatment plan, follow-up, and practice 2 management.

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"§34-25A-4.

"(a) A licensed prosthetist, licensed orthotist, or 4 5 licensed prosthetist/orthotist may provide services utilizing new prostheses or orthoses for which he or she is licensed and 6 7 only under a written order from an authorized health care 8 practitioner. A consultation with and periodic review by an 9 authorized health care practitioner is not required for the 10 evaluation, repair, adjusting, or servicing of a prosthesis by a licensed prosthetist, or licensed prosthetist/orthotist and 11 for the evaluation, repair, adjusting, or servicing of an 12 13 orthosis by a licensed orthotist, or licensed 14 prosthetist/orthotist; nor is an order from an authorized 15 health care practitioner required for maintenance or 16 replacement of an orthosis or prosthesis to the level of its 17 original prescription for an indefinite period of time if the 18 original order remains appropriate for the patient's medical 19 needs.

"(b) Prosthetists and orthotists must refer persons receiving service to authorized health care practitioners if they have reasonable cause to believe symptoms or conditions are present that require services beyond the scope of their practice or for which the prescribed prosthetic or orthotic service is contraindicated.

"(c) An orthotic supplier may engage in one or more 1 2 of the following: Evaluating, measuring, designing, 3 fabricating, assembling, fitting, adjusting, servicing, repairing, replacing, or delivering non-custom orthoses. An 4 5 orthotic supplier may provide non-custom orthoses in hospitals, rehabilitation facilities, physician's offices, 6 physician's clinics, or other sites as required. An orthotic 7 8 supplier shall provide non-custom orthoses based on a written prescription from an authorized health care practitioner and 9 10 under the supervision of such authorized health care 11 practitioner. 12 "(d) No person licensed under this chapter shall 13 provide services to a patient without being in the physical 14 presence of the patient. "§34-25A-5. 15 16 "(a) Except as provided in subsection (h) or (i), no 17 person shall administer prosthetic, orthotic, or pedorthic 18 care in this state unless licensed or registered to do so in 19 accordance with this chapter. The board shall issue approved 20 forms for application prior to January 1, 2003. "(b) In order to obtain a license as a prosthetist, 21 22 orthotist, or prosthetist/orthotist in this state, an 23 applicant shall be a citizen of the United States or, if not a 24 citizen of the United States, a person who is legally present

in the United States with appropriate documentation from the federal government, and shall do the following:

3 "(1) File a written application on forms to be 4 developed and approved by the board. The applicant shall meet 5 at least one of the following requirements after a one-year 6 grandfather period:

"a. The applicant shall possess a baccalaureate 7 8 degree in orthotics and prosthetics from a college or university accredited by a regional accrediting agency and 9 10 complete 1,900 hours per discipline sought of directed 11 employment under the supervision of a certified/licensed prosthetist, a certified/licensed orthotist or a 12 13 certified/licensed prosthetist/orthotist in an accredited 14 facility, and be certified as a prosthetist, orthotist, or 15 prosthetist/orthotist by a nationally recognized certifying 16 board in orthotics and prosthetics accredited by the National 17 Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), or such other 18 national agency as approved by the board, in the discipline or 19 disciplines for which the application is made.

"b. The applicant shall possess a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited college or university and have successfully completed a post-baccalaureate certificate course approved by the board and completed 1,900 hours of directed employment per discipline in which license is sought under the supervision of a certified/licensed prosthetist, a

certified/licensed orthotist, or a certified/licensed prosthetist/orthotist in an accredited facility, and be certified by a nationally recognized certifying board in prosthetics or orthotics accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), or such other national agency as approved by the board, in the discipline or disciplines for which application is made.

8 "c. The applicant shall possess an associate's 9 degree from a regionally accredited college or university, 10 junior college, or community college and have successfully 11 completed postsecondary coursework in anatomy, physiology, physics, biology, chemistry, algebra, and calculus and have 12 13 worked under the supervision of a certified/licensed 14 prosthetist, a certified/licensed orthotist, or a 15 certified/licensed prosthetist/orthotist for not less than 16 four consecutive years of the past six years in an accredited 17 facility, and be certified by a nationally recognized 18 certifying board in prosthetics or orthotics accredited by the 19 National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), or such 20 other national agency as may be approved by the board.

21 "d. The applicant shall have successfully completed 22 postsecondary coursework in anatomy, physiology, physics, 23 biology, chemistry, algebra, and calculus and have worked 24 under the supervision of a certified/licensed prosthetist, a 25 certified/licensed orthotist, or a certified/licensed

prosthetist/orthotist for not less than eight years of the last 12 years and be certified as a prosthetist, orthotist, or prosthetist/orthotist by a nationally recognized board accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), or such national agency as may be approved by the board, in the discipline or disciplines for which application is made.

8 "(2) Any applicant after the first year following 9 the board's issuance of applications shall meet the 10 requirements of paragraph a., b., or d. of subdivision (1) of 11 subsection (b) prior to receiving a license as a prosthetist, 12 an orthotist, or a prosthetist/orthotist.

13 "(c) In order to obtain a license as a pedorthist in 14 this state, an applicant shall be a citizen of the United 15 States or, if not a citizen of the United States, a person who 16 is legally present in the United States with appropriate 17 documentation from the federal government, and shall file a written application on forms to be developed and approved by 18 19 the board. Applicants shall be in good standing as a certified pedorthist with an entity accredited by the National 20 21 Commission for Certifying Agencies.

"(d) In order to obtain <u>registration</u> a license as an
orthotic supplier, an applicant shall be a citizen of the
United States or, if not a citizen of the United States, a
person who is legally present in the United States with

1 appropriate documentation from the federal government, and 2 shall do the following:

"(1) File a written application on forms to be
developed and approved by the board. Such forms shall require
personal information such as full name, current address,
educational status and history, and work history for the last
five years of employment.

8 "(2) The application forms shall be accompanied, 9 when submitted, by attestation of employment by or contractual 10 relationship with a manufacturer of orthoses or orthosis 11 components whether registered with the United States Food and 12 Drug Administration or not. Attestation shall be by notarized 13 statement signed by the president, chief operating officer, or 14 other designated corporate official of the employing company.

15 "(e) The board shall grant a license without an 16 examination for those qualified applicants who apply within 17 one year of the issuance of application forms by the board. 18 For purposes of this subsection, qualified applicants are 19 those who possess current credentials as a Certified Prosthetist, Certified Orthotist, or Certified 20 21 Prosthetist/Orthotist issued by the American Board for 22 Certification in Orthotics and Prosthetics, Incorporated, or 23 the Board for Orthotist/Prosthetist Certification as a 24 prosthetist, orthotist, or prosthetist/orthotist.

"(f) The board may issue a 12-month temporary
license as a prosthetist, an orthotist, a pedorthist, or a
prosthetist/orthotist to persons who have applied for
licensure and are awaiting examination. The temporary license
is renewable once for a six-month period if the applicant
fails to pass the examination at the first sitting.

"(q) The board shall grant a license as a 7 8 prosthetist, an orthotist, a prosthetist/orthotist, or 9 pedorthist to an applicant in possession of a current license 10 as a prosthetist, orthotist, prosthetist/orthotist, or 11 pedorthist in another state or territory of the United States 12 without examination if the board determines that the 13 credentialing standards set by the other state or territory 14 are substantially equivalent to the standards set by the board for this state. 15

16 "(h) No person may represent himself or herself as a 17 licensed prosthetist, licensed orthotist, licensed 18 prosthetist/orthotist, or licensed pedorthist, use a title or 19 description of services, or engage in the practice of prosthetics, orthotics, or pedorthics without applying for 20 21 licensure, meeting the required qualifications, and being 22 licensed by the board unless otherwise exempted by this chapter. A person not licensed with the board may not 23 24 represent himself or herself as being so licensed and may not 25 use, in connection with his or her name, the words licensed

orthotist, orthotist, licensed prosthetist, prosthetist, 1 2 licensed prosthetist/orthotist, prosthetist/orthotist, 3 licensed pedorthist, pedorthist, licensed orthotic fitter, orthotic fitter, licensed mastectomy fitter, mastectomy 4 fitter, licensed therapeutic shoe fitter, therapeutic shoe 5 fitter, or letters "L.O.," "L.P.," "L.P.O.," "L.O.A.," "LPed," 6 "L.P.A.," "L.P.O.A.," "L.M.F.," "L.O.F.," "L.T.S.F." or other 7 8 letters, words, signs, numbers, or insignia indicating or 9 implying that he or she is either a licensed prosthetist, a 10 licensed orthotist, a licensed prosthetist/orthotist, a 11 licensed pedorthist, a licensed mastectomy fitter, a licensed therapeutic shoe fitter, or a licensed orthotic fitter in the 12 State of Alabama without first having a valid license. The 13 14 license shall be posted in a conspicuous location at the 15 person's work site.

16 "(i) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to 17 prohibit or restrict the following:

18 "(1) The practice of prosthetics, orthotics, or 19 pedorthics by individuals authorized and performing services 20 within their authorized scopes of practice as adopted by the 21 State of Alabama Legislature including, but not limited to, 22 authorized health care practitioners, doctors of podiatry, 23 chiropractors, physical therapists, and occupational 24 therapists licensed in this state.

1 "(2) The practice of prosthetics, orthotics, or 2 pedorthics by an individual employed by, or in the service of 3 the government of the United States of America while engaged 4 in the performance of duties prescribed by the laws of the 5 United States of America.

"(3) The practice of prosthetics, orthotics, or 6 pedorthics by any person not licensed as a prosthetist, 7 8 orthotist, prosthetist/orthotist, orthotic fitter, therapeutic 9 shoe fitter, or pedorthist in accordance with this chapter who 10 is employed in a diagnostic laboratory, hospital, rehabilitation facility, or authorized health care 11 practitioner's office or as a medical lab technician or 12 13 technologist whose function is to administer treatment or 14 perform diagnostic procedures confined to that laboratory or 15 office under the direction of an authorized health care 16 practitioner.

17 "(4) The practice of prosthetics, orthotics, or 18 pedorthics by a person who is a regular or full-time student 19 in a prosthetic or orthotic educational program approved by 20 the board, and whose designated status is student or trainee.

"(5) A person fulfilling the supervised residency or internship experience requirements described in this chapter. "(6) A person who meets the qualifications listed in paragraphs a, b, c, and d of subdivision (1) of subsection (b)

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from performing prosthetic, orthotic, or pedorthic services in

this state, provided the services are not performed for more than 60 days per 12-month period, after notification to the board.

4 "(7) The practice of pharmacy by an individual
5 subject to Chapter 23 of this title.

"(8) Assistance to a physician or a person employed 6 in a diagnostic laboratory, hospital, rehabilitation facility, 7 8 or authorized health care practitioner's office or as a 9 medical lab technician or technologist whose function is to 10 administer treatment or perform diagnostic procedures confined to that laboratory, hospital, rehabilitation facility, or 11 authorized healthcare practitioner's office under the 12 13 direction of an authorized health care practitioner by a 14 representative, employee, or agent of a manufacturer or 15 supplier of orthoses, orthosis components, or pedorthic 16 devices in the provision, fitting, wearing, or use by a 17 patient of any type of orthotic or pedorthic device. "§34-25A-7. 18

19 "The board shall perform all the following duties:
20 "(1) Establish and publish continuing education
21 requirements <u>for persons licensed</u> by the board <u>in this act</u>
22 such that a licensed orthotist or a licensed prosthetist or a
23 licensed pedorthist is required to complete a minimum of hours
24 of continuing education and a licensed prosthetist/orthotist
25 is required to complete a minimum of hours of continuing

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education in each year of a license renewal period. The minimum hours provided in this subdivision shall be established by a national recognized certifying board accredited by the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), or such other national agency as approved by the board.

"(2) Examine for, approve, deny, revoke, suspend,
reinstate, and renew licensure accreditation or registration
of duly qualified applicants and develop, promulgate, and
establish fines, penalties, and requirements for reinstatement
of licensure, accreditation, or registration.

"(3) Receive applications, issue licenses, accreditations, or registrations to applicants who have met the requirements for licensure, accreditation, or registration, and deny licenses, accreditations, or registrations to applicants who do not meet the minimum qualifications.

18 "(4) Hire administrative, clerical, investigative, 19 and other staff as needed to implement this chapter and hire 20 individuals licensed under this chapter to serve as examiners 21 for any practical examinations required by the board either 22 within the state classified service or not within it.

"(5) Promulgate and publish rules and regulations in
 accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act to administer
 this chapter. Any rule or regulation defining the scope of

practice or permissible activities of a licensed orthotist, 1 2 licensed prosthetist, or a licensed prosthetist/orthotist or a 3 registered orthotic supplier shall be published jointly with the State Board of Medical Examiners. 4 "(6) Develop and promulgate requirements and 5 establish fees for the licensure of mastectomy fitters, 6 orthotic fitters, therapeutic shoe fitters, orthotic 7 8 assistants, prosthetic assistants, or prosthetic/orthotic assistants. Such licenses shall be regulated and issued by the 9 10 board. "(7) Prepare and administer, or approve the 11 preparation and administration of, examinations for applicants 12 13 for licensure. "§34-25A-11. 14 15 "(a) The board shall issue an orthotic, prosthetic, 16 or prosthetic/orthotic license or an orthotic supplier 17 registration license or any other license authorized by the board to any person who meets the qualifications required by 18 19 this chapter and who pays the respective fees fixed by the board. 20 21 "(a) The board shall issue an orthotic, prosthetic, 22 or prosthetic/orthotic <u>a license or</u> and orthotic supplier 23 registration to any person who meets the gualifications required by this chapter and who pays the respective fees 24 25 fixed by the board.

"(b) Any person who is issued a license as an 1 orthotic, prosthetic, or prosthetic/orthotic practitioner or 2 3 orthotic assistant, prosthetic assistant, or prosthetic/orthotic assistant under this chapter may use the 4 5 words licensed orthotist, licensed prosthetist, licensed prosthetist/orthotist, licensed orthotist assistant, licensed 6 prosthetist assistant, or licensed prosthetist/orthotist 7 8 assistant, or the letters "L.O.," "L.P.," "L.P.O.," "L.O.A.," "LPed," "L.P.A.," or "L.P.O.A., " "L.M.F.," "L.O.F.," 9 "C.M.F.," "L.C.M.F," or "L.T.S.F." in connection with his or 10 her name to denote his or her licensure. Any person issued 11 registration a license as an orthotic supplier under this 12 13 chapter may use the words registered licensed orthotic supplier or the letters "R.O.S." "L.O.S." in connection with 14 15 his or her name to denote his or her registration license. 16 "(c) A license or registration issued under this 17 chapter shall be subject to annual or semiannual renewal as 18 prescribed by rule or regulation duly promulgated and published by the board". 19 "(d) If the board determines that another ancillary 20 21 classification of license is needed in order to carry out the 22 purposes of this chapter, the board may by rule establish an additional license classification and set a reasonable fee for 23 the issuance of the license." 24

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
 first day of the third month following its passage and
 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
