7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. (a) Notwithstanding any provision of law, 8 a person who has lost his or her civil rights including the 9 10 right to bear arms by reason of conviction in a state or federal court, except convictions for impeachment or treason, 11 12 who has fulfilled the terms of his or her sentence relating to 13 imprisonment or has been granted a full and unconditional 14 pardon shall automatically be restored to all of his or her 15 civil rights including, without limitation, the right to bear 16 arms.

(b) A pardon granted by the board shall be deemed to be a full, unconditional pardon unless the official document explicitly limits the restoration of the civil rights of the person or does not relieve the person of all disabilities incurred upon conviction.

(c) The board shall issue a document to the person
on a form prepared by the board which shall state that the
rights of the person have been fully restored.

25 Section 2. All laws or parts of laws which conflict26 with this act are repealed.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
 first day of the third month following its passage and
 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
