- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
- Section 1. Section 34-19-8, Code of Alabama 1975, is amended to read as follows:
- 6 "\$34-19-8.

"It shall be unlawful for any person holding a license as a nurse midwife to attend any cases except cases of normal childbirth, as defined in Section 34-19-2, or to perform manipulations of any kind. In all cases in which the child is not delivered spontaneously within a reasonable time, the nurse midwife shall notify a qualified physician immediately and make no effort to deliver the child except under the authorization and supervision of such physician.

"All deliveries must be planned to take place in the hospital. Deliveries may be planned to take place in a hospital, a birthing center, or a location chosen by the pregnant woman."

Section 2. (a) A pregnant woman may choose a method of childbirth to involve a physician delivery or delivery by a nurse midwife pursuant to Chapter 19 of Title 34, Code of Alabama 1975.

(b) Any person, physician, nurse, midwife, or a nurse midwife, or other health care provider or their agents or employees, who, in good faith, participates, advises, or provides aid or treatment to a pregnant woman, regarding her personal choice of the location and method of childbirth shall

be immune from any lawsuit or legal proceeding for any and all
claims arising out of or related to his or her official duties
with respect to the woman's choice of childbirth method or
location.

Section 3. This act shall become effective on the
first day of the third month following its passage and

approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.

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
