21	relating to the annual sales tax holiday; to include band
22	instruments purchased for use in a school band within the
23	exemption from the sales and use tax during the annual sales
24	tax holiday.
25	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
26	Section 1. Section 40-23-210, Code of Alabama 1975,
27	is amended to read as follows:

1 "\$40-23-210. "As used in this article, the term "covered items" 2 means the following: 3 "(1) Articles of clothing with a sales price of one hundred dollars (\$100), or less, per article of clothing. 5 "a. "Clothing" means all human wearing apparel 6 7 suitable for general use including sandals, shoes, and sneakers. Clothing shall not include: 8 "1. Belt buckles sold separately. 9 10 "2. Costume masks sold separately. "3. Patches and emblems sold separately. 11 12 "4. Sewing equipment and supplies including, but not 13 limited to, knitting needles, patterns, pins, scissors, sewing 14 machines, sewing needles, tape measures, and thimbles. 15 "5. Sewing materials that become part of "clothing" including, but not limited to, buttons, fabric, lace, thread, 16 17 yarn, and zippers. "b. In addition, clothing shall not include clothing 18 accessories or equipment, protective equipment, or sport or 19 recreational equipment; as defined herein. 20 21 "1. "Clothing accessories or equipment" means 22 incidental items worn on the person or in conjunction with 23 "clothing." The following list contains examples and is not intended to be an all-inclusive list. "Clothing accessories or 24 25 equipment" shall include: 26 "(i) Briefcases.

"(iii) Hair notions, including, but not limited to, 1 2 barrettes, hair bows, and hair nets. The 15 following list contains examples and is not intended to be an all-inclusive list. "Protective equipment" shall include: 16 17 "(i) Breathing masks. 18 "(ii) Clean room apparel and equipment. 19 "(iii) Ear and hearing protectors. "(iv) Face shields. 20 "(v) Hard hats. 21 22 "(vi) Helmets. 23 "(vii) Paint or dust respirators. 24 "(viii) Protective gloves. "(ix) Safety glasses and goggles. 25 "(x) Safety belts. 26

"Sport or recreational equipment" means items 2 designed for human use and worn in conjunction with an 3 4 athletic or recreational activity that are not suitable for general use. The following list contains examples and is not 5 intended to be an all-inclusive list. "Sport or recreational 6 7 equipment" shall include: "(i) Ballet and tap shoes. 8 "(ii) Cleated or spiked athletic shoes. 9 10 "(iii) Gloves, including, but not limited to, baseball, bowling, boxing, hockey, and golf. 11 12 "(iv) Goggles. 13 "(v) Hand and elbow quards. "(vi) Life preservers and vests. 14 15 "(vii) Mouth guards. "(viii) Roller and ice skates. 16 17 "(ix) Shin guards. 18 "(x) Shoulder pads. 19 "(xi) Ski boots. "(xii) Waders. 20 21 "(xiii) Wetsuits and fins. 22 "(2) A single purchase, with a sales price of seven hundred fifty dollars (\$750), or less, of computers, computer 23 24 software, and school computer supplies. "a. A "computer" means an electronic device that 25 26 accepts information in digital or similar form and manipulates 27 it for a result based on a sequence of instructions.

- "b. "Computer software" means a set of coded

  instructions designed to cause a "computer" or automatic data

  processing equipment to perform a task.
- "c. A "school computer supply" means an item

  commonly used by a student in a course of study in which a

  computer is used. The following is an all-inclusive list of

  school computer supplies:
- 8 "1. Computer storage media; diskettes, compact disks.
- "2. Handheld electronic schedulers, except devicesthat are cellular phones.
- "3. Personal digital assistants, except devices thatare cellular phones.
- "4. Computer printers.
- "5. Printer supplies for computers; printer paper,printer ink.
- "d. "Computer," "computer software," and "school

  computer supplies" shall not include furniture and any

  systems, devices, software, peripherals designed or intended

  primarily for recreational use, or video games of a

  noneducational nature.
- "(3) Noncommercial purchases of school supplies, school art supplies, and school instructional material, up to a sales price of fifty dollars (\$50) per item.

- 17 "2. Required textbooks on an official school book list with a sales price of more than thirty dollars (\$30) and 18 less than fifty dollars (\$50). 19
  - "(4) Noncommercial purchases of books with a sales price of not more than thirty dollars (\$30) per book. The term book shall mean a set of printed sheets bound together and published in a volume with an ISBN number, but does not include magazines, newspapers, periodicals, or any other document printed or offered for sale in a non-bound form.
