17	TO BE ENTITLED
18	AN ACT

20	Prohibiting the outsourcing of work to be performed
21	on certain public contracts.
22	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
23	Section 1. The Legislature finds all of the
24	following:
25	(1) State agencies and subdivisions procure services
26	in part through contracts with private vendors.

(2) Increasingly, private vendors carry out these
 services, or subcontract or otherwise procure these services,
 from a location outside the United States.

4 (3) Such international outsourcing exacerbates
5 unemployment and workforce dislocation and deprives Alabama
6 residents of job opportunities, including industries and jobs
7 this state has expended resources to attract.

8 (4) International outsourcing erodes state and local
9 revenues by drawing jobs and income away from the state.

10 (5) International outsourcing additionally may
11 provide less privacy protections for state residents whose
12 personal information may, in the course of service delivery,
13 be transmitted to locations outside the United States.

14 Section 2. All of the following provisions shall 15 apply to all contracts of cities and counties that receive 16 state funding for the contracts or the departments or agencies 17 thereof and all state contracts except contracts for where it 18 would be inconsistent with current state law:

(1) All state agencies and departments, other than
the Alabama State Docks, and all counties and cities that
receive state funding for a contract or the departments and
agencies thereof, are prohibited from awarding a contract to a
contractor or subcontractor who performs the work at a site
outside of the United States.

(2) Each vendor submitting a bid or contract to
provide services for the state or a city or county receiving
state funding for the contract shall certify that the services

covered by the bid or contract will be performed in the United
 States.

(3) If, during the life of a contract with a state 3 4 agency or department or with a city or county that receives state funding for the contract, the contractor or 5 6 subcontractor shifts work overseas, then the state agency or 7 department or a city or county that receives state funding for the contract shall require the contractor or subcontractor to 8 pay damages in an amount equal to the amount paid by the 9 10 agency for the percentage of outsourced work. The agency shall 11 also terminate the contract for noncompliance with the 12 outsourcing prohibition.

(4) The state agency or department or a city or county receiving state funding for a contract shall be entitled to bring a civil action in state or federal court to compel enforcement under this act. The court shall award reasonable attorney's fees and costs to the agency or department or a city or county receiving state funding for a contract.

20 Section 3. This act shall become effective on the 21 first day of the third month following its passage and 22 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
