8	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:
9	Section 1. This act shall be known as the "Federal
10	Abortion Mandate Opt Out Act."
11	Section 2. (a) The Legislature of the State of
12	Alabama finds all of the following:
13	(1) Under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care
14	Act, P.L. 111-148, federal tax dollars, via affordability
15	credits, subsidies provided to individuals between 150-400
16	percent of the federal poverty level, are routed to exchange
17	participating health insurance plans, including plans that
18	provide coverage for abortions.
19	(2) Federal funding of insurance plans that provide
20	abortions is an unprecedented change in federal abortion
21	funding policy. The Hyde Amendment, as passed each year in the
22	Labor Health and Human Services Appropriations bill, and the
23	Federal Employee Health Benefits Program, FEHBP, prohibit
24	federal funds from subsidizing health insurance plans that

provide abortions. Under this new law, however, exchange

participating health insurance plans that provide abortions
can receive federal funds.

- (3) The provision of federal funding for health insurance plans that provide abortion coverage is nothing short of taxpayer funded and government endorsed abortion.
- (4) However, P.L. 111-148 allows a state to "opt out" of permitting health insurance plans that cover abortions to participate in the exchanges within that state and thereby prohibit taxpayer money from subsidizing plans that cover abortions within that state.
- (5) The decision not to fund abortions places no governmental obstacle in the path of a woman who chooses to terminate her pregnancy.
- (6) Moreover, it is permissible for a state to engage in unequal subsidization of abortions and other medical services to encourage alternative activity deemed in the public interest.
- (7) Citizens of the State of Alabama, like other Americans, oppose the use of public funds, both federal and state, to pay for abortions. For example, a January 2010 Quinnipiac poll showed that 7 in 10 Americans were opposed to provisions in federal health care reform that use federal funds to pay for abortions and abortion coverage.
- (8) The Guttmacher Institute, which advocates for unfettered and taxpayer-funded access to abortion, confirms

- (b) Based on the findings in subsection (a), it is the purpose of this act to affirmatively opt out of allowing qualified health plans that cover abortions to participate in exchanges within the State of Alabama.
- Section 3. (a) No abortion coverage may be provided by a qualified health plan offered through an exchange created pursuant to P.L. 111-148 within the State of Alabama.
- (b) This prohibition shall not apply to an abortion performed when the life of the mother is endangered by a physical disorder, physical illness, or physical injury, including a life-endangering physical condition caused by or arising from the pregnancy itself, or when the pregnancy is the result of an act of rape or incest or any procedure to terminate an ectopic pregnancy.
- Section 4. (a) Nothing in this act shall be construed as creating or recognizing a right to abortion.
- (b) It is not the intention of this act to make lawful an abortion that is currently unlawful.
- Section 5. This act shall become effective on the first day of the third month following its passage and approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
