SYNOPSIS: This bill would relate to the Alabama 8 Criminal Justice Information Center Commission and 9 10 the Alabama Criminal Justice Information Center and 11 would further provide for the members of the commission and the operation of the commission and 12 center, including the providing of information 13 14 relating to homeland security. The bill would 15 authorize the commission to charge fees for information related to noncriminal background 16 17 checks, establish the crime of misuse of ACJIC 18 information, authorize the commission to establish 19 the Alabama Statistical Analysis Center and 20 authorize research and development.

The bill would also ratify and provide for the implementation of the National Crime Prevention and Privacy Act relating to the authorized interstate exchange of criminal information for noncriminal purposes and would authorize any licensing agency or board to require a criminal background check as a part of its licensing requirements.

Amendment 621 of the Constitution of Alabama 3 4 of 1901, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of the Constitution of 5 Alabama of 1901, as amended, prohibits a general 6 7 law whose purpose or effect would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds from 8 becoming effective with regard to a local 9 10 governmental entity without enactment by a 2/3 vote 11 unless: it comes within one of a number of 12 specified exceptions; it is approved by the 13 affected entity; or the Legislature appropriates 14 funds, or provides a local source of revenue, to 15 the entity for the purpose.

The purpose or effect of this bill would be to require a new or increased expenditure of local funds within the meaning of the amendment. However, the bill does not require approval of a local governmental entity or enactment by a 2/3 vote to become effective because it comes within one of the specified exceptions contained in the amendment.

13 "All persons in this state in charge of law 14 enforcement and correction agencies shall obtain or cause to be obtained the fingerprints according to the fingerprint 15 system of identification established by the commission, full 16 17 face and profile photographs, if photo equipment is available, and other identifying data of each person arrested for an 18 offense of a type designated in Section 41-9-622, of all 19 persons arrested or taken into custody as fugitives from 20 21 justice and of all unidentified human corpses in their 22 jurisdictions, but photographs need not be taken if it is 23 known that photographs of the type listed taken within the 24 previous year are on file. Fingerprints and other identifying data of persons arrested for offenses other than those 25 26 designated in this article may be taken at the discretion of 27 the agency concerned.

I "If any person arrested or taken into custody is subsequently released without charge or cleared of the offense through criminal justice proceedings, such disposition shall be reported by all state, county and municipal criminal justice agencies to ACJIC within 30 days of such action, and all such information shall be eliminated and removed.

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8 "<u>(a)</u> All persons in charge of criminal justice 9 agencies in this state shall furnish the ACJIC with any other 10 identifying data required in accordance with guidelines 11 established by the <u>ACJIC</u> <u>commission</u>.

12 "(b) All criminal justice agencies in this state 13 having criminal identification files shall cooperate in 14 providing to ACJIC information in such the files as will aid 15 in establishing the nucleus of the state criminal 16 identification file."

Section 2. (a) In order to facilitate the authorized 17 interstate exchange of criminal history information for 18 noncriminal justice purposes, including, but not limited to, 19 background checks for the licensing and screening of employees 20 21 and volunteers under the National Child Protection Act of 1993, as amended, and to implement the National Crime 22 23 Prevention and Privacy Compact, 42 U.S.C. §14616, the 24 Legislature approves and ratifies the compact. The director 25 shall execute the compact on behalf of the state.

(b) The center is the repository of criminal history
 records for purposes of the compact and shall do all things
 necessary or incidental to carry out the compact.

4 (c) The director, or the director's designee, is the
5 state's compact officer and shall administer the compact
6 within the state. The commission may adopt rules and establish
7 procedures for the cooperative exchange of criminal history
8 records between the state and federal government for use in
9 noncriminal justice cases.

10 (d) The state's ratification of the compact remains 11 in effect until legislation is enacted which specifically 12 renounces the compact.

(e) This compact and this section do not affect or
abridge the obligations and responsibilities of the center
under other provisions of this article and does not alter or
amend the manner, direct or otherwise, in which the public is
afforded access to criminal history records under state law.

18 Section 3. In addition to any other requirements, 19 any licensing or permitting agency, board, or commission in 20 this state may by rule require a criminal background check as 21 part of its licensing or permitting requirements.

22 Section 4. <u>ACJIC may provide criminal history</u> 23 <u>information to a judge of probate for the purpose of name</u> 24 <u>changes, adoption hearings, determining the eligibility of</u> 25 <u>administrators or executors of estates, and for any other</u> 26 <u>lawful purpose.</u>

Section 5. Although this bill would have as its 1 2 purpose or effect the requirement of a new or increased expenditure of local funds, the bill is excluded from further 3 4 requirements and application under Amendment 621, now appearing as Section 111.05 of the Official Recompilation of 5 the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended, because the 6 7 bill defines a new crime or amends the definition of an existing crime. 8

9 Section 6. This act shall become effective 10 immediately following its passage and approval by the 11 Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
