Assistant Basketball Coach; and

WHEREAS, Coach Fitzpatrick and Madis welcomed their daughter, Dana Alecia Fitzpatrick, into the world in 1986; the following year, he became Assistant Coach at The University of Wyoming in Laramie, Wyoming; under his leadership, The University of Wyoming's basketball team finished 26-6 and advanced to the NCAA tournament in one of the most successful eras in the college's history; he also coached several future NBA superstars; and

WHEREAS, in 1990, he and Madis had their second child, Thaddeus Stanford Fitzpatrick, II; for the next four years, Coach Fitzpatrick served as Assistant Coach at The University of Miami; the basketball team that he coached made its debut in the Big East Conference in 1991; two of his players, Constantine Popa and Joe Wylie, were drafted by the NBA; and

WHEREAS, in 1994, Coach Fitzpatrick left Miami and returned to Alabama to become The University of Alabama's Assistant Coach; the basketball team that he coached advanced to the 1995 NCAA Tournament and finished the season ranked 20th in the nation; during his tenure, his basketball team averaged 19 wins per season and sent four players, Antonio McDyess, Jason Caffey, Roy Rogers, and Eric Washington, to the NBA; and

WHEREAS, he then spent six years as Assistant

Principal and Head Varsity Basketball Coach at Hillcrest High
