17 Relating to Butler County; repealing Act No. 97-594,
18 (H. 977, 1997 Regular Session); providing an increase in the
19 fee for a pistol permit and providing further for the
20 distribution of the fee.

21 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

22 Section 1. In Butler County, the fee for issuance of
23 a permit to carry a pistol in vehicle or concealed on or about
24 the person as provided in Section 13A-11-75, Code of Alabama,
25 1975, as amended, shall be twenty dollars (\$20) per year,
26 which shall be collected by the Sheriff.

27 Section 2. Five dollars (\$5) of each fee collected
28 under this act shall be paid to the county treasury and the
29 remaining fifteen dollars (\$15) of each fee shall be deposited
30 by the Sheriff of Butler County or agents of the Sheriff in

1 any bank located in Butler County selected by the Sheriff,
2 into the fund known as the "Sheriff's Fund."

3 Section 3. The Sheriff's Fund provided for by this
4 act shall be drawn upon by the Sheriff of Butler County or
5 appointed agent and shall be used exclusively for law
6 enforcement purposes and in the discharge of the Sheriff's
7 Office as the Sheriff sees fit.

8 Section 4. The establishment of the Sheriff's Fund
9 as provided in this act and the use of funds shall not
10 diminish or take the place of any other reimbursement or other
11 source of income established for the Sheriff or the operation
12 of the Office of the Sheriff.

13 Section 5. The provisions of this act are severable.
14 If any part of this act is declared invalid or
15 unconstitutional, that declaration shall not affect the part
16 which remains.

17 Section 6. Act 97-594, H. 977 of the 1997 Regular
18 Session and all laws or parts of laws which conflict with this
19 act are repealed.

20 Section 7. This act shall become effective
21 immediately upon its passage and approval by the Governor, or
22 its otherwise becoming law.
