A BILL  
TO BE ENTITLED  
AN ACT

Relating to Shelby County; to authorize the county commission to adopt ordinances or resolutions providing rules and regulations relating to the use of public property owned or leased by the county; and to provide criminal penalties for violations of the ordinances.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. (a) The Shelby County Commission may adopt ordinances or resolutions providing rules and regulations relating to the use of its properties, including, but not limited to, its public parks, recreational areas, public buildings and facilities, and real property owned or leased by Shelby County, or properties over which Shelby County has the right of possession. The applicable law enforcement entities located within the county and/or the county manager are hereby directed to implement and enforce

2 commission.

3 (b) Any person who violates any ordinances or  
4 resolutions by violating any rule or regulation adopted by the  
5 Shelby County Commission pursuant to subsection (a) shall be  
6 guilty of a Class C misdemeanor punishable as provided by law.

7 (c) No ordinance or resolution adopted pursuant to  
8 this act may conflict with state law.

9 (d) An ordinance or resolution may provide that a  
10 person charged with a violation may be issued a non-traffic  
11 citation and complaint to appear in the district court of the  
12 county.

13 (e) The county commission shall keep a copy of all  
14 ordinances or resolutions adopted pursuant to this act  
15 available for public inspection at the offices of the county  
16 manager.

17 (f) This act is adopted pursuant to Section 6 of  
18 Amendment No. 707 of the Constitution of Alabama of 1901, now  
19 appearing as Section 3 of the Official ReCompilation of the  
20 Constitution of Alabama of 1901, as amended.

21 Section 2. This act shall become effective on the  
22 first day of the third month following its passage and  
23 approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
