27	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

1	Section 1. Section 16-56-5 of the Code of Alabama
2	1975, is amended to read as follows:
3	" §16-56-5.
4	"(a) A majority of the members of the board of
5	trustees shall constitute a quorum, but a smaller number may
6	adjourn from day to day until a quorum is present. A quorum
7	may be assembled in person or through electronic
8	communications that permit complete auditory access to the
9	proceedings of the board. During each meeting of the board, no
10	more than two members may participate through electronic
11	communications.
12	"(b) Standing committees of the board, excluding the
13	executive committee, may meet by means of telephone
14	conference, video conference, or other electronic means by
15	which all persons participating in the meeting, and members of
16	the public, may hear each other simultaneously, if the
17	committee has no authority other than to make recommendations
18	to the full board. Meetings conducted pursuant to this
19	subsection shall be properly noticed and shall comply with the
20	Alabama Open Meetings Act."
21	Section 2. This act shall become effective
22	immediately following its passage and approval by the

Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
