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8	SYNOPSIS:	Under existing law, the Alabama Board of
9		Optometry licenses and regulates optometrists in
10		the state.
11		This bill would provide further for the
12		scope of practice of optometry and for the
13		exclusive authority of the board to regulate the
14		practice.
15		This bill would authorize the board to issue
16		advisory opinions and declaratory rulings related
17		to this chapter and the administrative rules
18		adopted under this chapter.
19		This bill would also clarify the existing
20		status of the board as a certifying board for
21		purposes of the Alabama Uniform Controlled
22		Substances Act, with certain exceptions.

25		TO BE ENTITLED
26		AN ACT
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To amend Section 34-22-1, Code of Alabama 1975, 1 2 relating to the Alabama Board of Optometry, to provide further for the scope of practice of an optometrist and the exclusive 3 authority of the board to regulate the practice; to amend 4 5 Section 34-22-42, Code of Alabama 1975, to authorize the board 6 to issue advisory opinions and declaratory rulings related to 7 this chapter and the administrative rules adopted under this chapter; and to amend Section 20-2-2, Code of Alabama 1975, 8 9 relating to the Alabama Uniform Controlled Substances Act, to 10 clarify the existing status of the board as a certifying board, with certain exceptions. 11

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

Section 1. Sections 34-22-1, 34-22-42, and 20-2-2, Code of Alabama 1975, are amended to read as follows:

"§34-22-1.

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"For the purposes of this chapter, the following terms shall have the respective meanings ascribed by this section:

- "(1) BOARD. The Alabama Board of Optometry.
- "(2) HUMAN EYE AND ITS ADJACENT STRUCTURES. The eye and all structures situated within the orbit, including the conjunctiva, lids, lashes, and <del>lachrymal</del> lacrimal system.
- "(3) PHARMACEUTICAL AGENTS. Any diagnostic and therapeutic drug or combination of drugs that has the property of assisting in the diagnosis, prevention, treatment, or mitigation of abnormal conditions or symptoms of the human eye and its adjacent structures.

## "(4) PRACTICE OF OPTOMETRY.

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"a. The practice of optometry is a learned profession involving the examination, measurement by objective and subjective means, diagnosis, treatment, and prevention of any departure from the normal of the human eyes, their adjacent structures, and visual system. The practice of optometry includes, but is not limited to: The adapting and fitting of all types of lenses or devices, including, contact lenses; the determination of refractive error and shape of the eye and visual, muscular, or anatomical anomalies of the eye through the use of any means including the use of any self testing devices and the use of any computerized or automatic refracting device; the determination and prescribing of spectacle or contact lens parameters; the administering and prescription of pharmaceutical agents rational to the diagnosis and treatment of disease of the human eye and its adjacent structures; the removal of superficial foreign bodies from the human eye and its adjacent structures; the providing of developmental and perceptual therapy for the vision system; the utilization of any method or means to diagnose and treat diseases of the human eye and its adjacent structures as determined and approved by the board, subject to the limitations of this chapter; the performance of primary eye care procedures or ordering of laboratory tests rational to the diagnosis and treatment of conditions or disease of the human eye and its adjacent structures as determined and approved by the board, subject to the limitations of this

1	chapter. The practice of optometry shall include the
2	prescribing and administering of narcotic analgesics pursuant
3	to the Alabama Uniform Controlled Substances Act, except for
4	narcotic analgesics classified under Schedule I and II, and
5	any Schedule III pharmaceutical agents that contain
6	Dihydrocodeinone, ("Hydrocodone"). The prescribing or
7	administering of any other Schedule III pharmaceutical agent
8	shall be limited to a prescription, the duration of which does
9	not exceed 96 hours.
10	"b. Notwithstanding any provision of this chapter to
11	the contrary, the practice of optometry shall include the
12	prescribing and administering of pharmaceutical agents which
13	are commonly known as steroids.
14	"c. The practice of optometry includes the following
15	procedures:
16	"1. Injections, excluding injections into the
17	posterior chamber of the eye, to treat any macular or retinal
18	disease.
19	"2. Incision and removal of a chalazion.
20	"3. Removal and biopsy of skin lesions involving the
21	<u>lid and adnexa.</u>
22	"4. Laser capsulotomy.
23	"5. Laser trabeculoplasty.
24	"6. Laser peripheral iridotomy.
25	"7. Corneal crosslinking.
26	"d. Optometrists are prohibited from performing
27	injections into the eyeball, cataract surgery, muscle surgery,

retinal surgery, radial keratotomy, <u>refractive</u> laser surgery, cryosurgery, or any other <u>invasive</u> <u>ophthalmic</u> surgery requiring general anesthesia.

"e. The Alabama Board of Optometry shall be a certifying board as defined in Section 20-2-2, except as limited by this chapter. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed as allowing any agency, board, or other entity of this state, other than the board, to determine what constitutes the practice of optometry. The board shall have the sole authority to determine what constitutes the practice of optometry and sole jurisdiction to exercise any other powers and duties under this chapter.

"f. The practice of optometry shall include the authority to administer benedryl benadryl, epinephrine, or other medication to counteract anaphylaxis or anaphylactic reaction. The use and prescribing of pharmaceutical agents for the treatment of the human eye and its adjacent structures shall be limited to those optometrists approved by the board.

"\$34-22-42.

"The board shall exercise and perform, subject to this chapter, each of the following powers and duties:

- "(1) Conduct examinations at least once each year to ascertain the qualifications and fitness of applicants for licenses to practice optometry.
- "(2) Prescribe rules and regulations for conducting and administering an examination of applicants for licensing as optometrists and to effectuate this chapter.

- "(3) Institute, upon a complaint or petition,

  hearings of charges against licensed optometrists or other

  persons as provided in this chapter.
- "(4) Institute legal proceedings for violations of this chapter.

- "(5) Grant and deny licenses in conformity with this chapter, including applications for approval to use pharmaceutical agents.
- "(6) Formulate rules and regulations by which the board shall determine which optometry schools and colleges in or out of the State of Alabama have been duly accredited by a recognized and properly authorized accrediting agency and which accredited schools or colleges shall be approved by the board.
- "(7) Establish standards of continuing education which shall be deemed a requisite to the renewal of licenses of applicants who are otherwise qualified to practice optometry in the State of Alabama.
- "(8) Keep a register of optometrists containing the names and addresses of all persons to whom license certificates, temporary licenses, approvals for use of pharmaceutical agents, and limited licenses have been issued in the State of Alabama, the date of the issuance, the place or places of business in which each optometrist is engaged, and all renewals, revocations, and suspensions of licenses and certification.

"(9) Administer oaths and affirmations of witnesses, issue subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of all necessary papers, books, records, documentary evidence, and materials in any hearing,

investigation, or other proceeding before the board.

- "(10) Employ or appoint an executive director, clerical personnel, and legal advisors or counsel to assist in implementing this chapter when there is a need for those services and when funds are available for those purposes. The executive director may be a licensed optometrist in this state, but may not, while serving as the executive director, also serve as a member of the Board of Optometry. The executive director shall not be subject to the state Merit System.
- "(11) Prescribe rules and regulations establishing a program of internship as a requisite to application for license, if the board deems such a program advisable.
- (12) Prescribe rules and regulations establishing circumstances and conditions upon which temporary licenses may be issued by the board and the terms and conditions of the temporary licenses.
- "(13) Prescribe rules and regulations subject to the limitations of this chapter for the utilization of methods or means of treatment recognized as being within the scope of the practice of optometry.
- "(14) Prescribe rules and regulations subject to the limitations of this chapter necessary for the performance of

eye care procedures reasonably necessary to the treatment of conditions or diseases of the human eye and its adjacent structures.

"(15) Issue advisory opinions and declaratory
rulings related to this chapter and the administrative rules
adopted under this chapter.

"\$20-2-2.

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"When used in this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings, respectively, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

- "(1) ADMINISTER. The direct application of a controlled substance, whether by injection, inhalation, ingestion, or any other means, to the body of a patient or research subject by:
- "a. A practitioner or, in his or her presence, hisor her authorized agent.
  - "b. The patient or research subject at the direction and in the presence of the practitioner.
  - "(2) AGENT. An authorized person who acts on behalf of or at the direction of a manufacturer, distributor, or dispenser. The term does not include a common or contract carrier, public warehouseman, or employee of the carrier or warehouseman.
  - "(3) CERTIFYING BOARDS. The State Board of Medical Examiners, the State Board of Health, the State Board of Pharmacy, the State Board of Dental Examiners, the State Board of Podiatry, and the State Board of Veterinary Medical

- 1 Examiners, and the Alabama Board of Optometry, except as 2 limited by Chapter 22 of Title 34. "(4) CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE. A drug, substance, or 3 immediate precursor in Schedules I through V of Article 2 of 4 5 this chapter. "(5) COUNTERFEIT SUBSTANCE. Substances which, or the 6 7 container or labeling of which, without authorization, bears 8 the trademark, trade name, or other identifying mark, imprint, 9 number, or device or any likeness thereof of a manufacturer, 10 distributor, or dispenser other than the person who in fact manufactured, distributed, or dispensed the substance. 11 "(6) DELIVER or DELIVERY. The actual, constructive, 12 13 or attempted transfer from one person to another of a 14 controlled substance, whether or not there is an agency 15 relationship. "(7) DISPENSE. To deliver a controlled substance to 16 17 an ultimate user or research subject by or pursuant to the 18 lawful order of a practitioner, including the prescribing, administering, packaging, labeling, or compounding necessary 19 2.0 to prepare the substance for that delivery. 21 "(8) DISPENSER. A practitioner who dispenses. 22 "(9) DISTRIBUTE. To deliver other than by 23 administering or dispensing a controlled substance. 24 "(10) DISTRIBUTOR. A person who distributes. 25 "(11) DRUG.

United States pharmacopoeia, official homeopathic

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"a. Substances recognized as drugs in the official

pharmacopoeia of the United States, or official national
formulary or any supplement to any of them.

"b. Substances intended for use in the diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease in man or animals.

"c. Substances (other than food) intended to affect the structure or any function of the body of man or animals.

"d. Substances intended for use as a component of any article specified in paragraphs a., b., or c. Such term does not include devices or their components, parts, or accessories.

"(12) IMMEDIATE PRECURSOR. A substance that the State Board of Pharmacy has found to be and by rule designates as being the principal compound commonly used or produced primarily for use and that is an immediate chemical intermediary used or likely to be used in the manufacture of a controlled substance, the control of which is necessary to prevent, curtail, or limit manufacture.

"(13) MANUFACTURE. The production, preparation, propagation, compounding, conversion, or processing of a controlled substance, either directly or indirectly, by extraction from substances of natural origin or independently by means of chemical synthesis or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis, and includes any packaging or repackaging of the substance or labeling or relabeling of its container; except, that this term does not include the

preparation, compounding, packaging, or labeling of a controlled substance by either of the following:

- "a. A practitioner as an incident to his or her administering or dispensing of a controlled substance in the course of his or her professional practice.
  - "b. A practitioner or by his or her authorized agent under his or her supervision for the purpose of or as an incident to research, teaching, or chemical analysis and not for sale.
  - "(14) MARIJUANA. All parts of the plant Cannabis sativa L., whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds or resin. The term does not include the mature stalks of the plant, fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the mature stalks (except the resin extracted therefrom), fiber, oil or cake, or the sterilized seed of the plant which is incapable of germination. Marijuana does not include hemp as defined in Section 2-8-381.
  - "(15) NARCOTIC DRUG. Any of the following, whether produced directly or indirectly by extraction from substances of vegetable origin or independently by means of chemical synthesis or by a combination of extraction and chemical synthesis:

- "a. Opium and opiate and any salt, compound,
  derivative, or preparation of opium or opiate."
- "b. Any salt, compound, isomer, derivative, or

  preparation thereof which is chemically equivalent or

  identical with any of the substances referred to in paragraph

  a., but not including the isoguinoline alkaloids of opium.

"c. Opium poppy and poppy straw.

"d. Coca leaves and any salt, compound, derivative, or preparation of coca leaves and any salt, compound, isomer, derivative, or preparation thereof which is chemically equivalent or identical with any of these substances, but not including decocainized coca leaves or extractions of coca leaves that do not contain cocaine or ecgonine.

"(16) OPIATE. Any substance having an addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability similar to morphine or being capable of conversion into a drug having addiction-forming or addiction-sustaining liability. The term does not include, unless specifically designated as controlled under this section, the dextrorotatory isomer of 3-methoxy-n-methylmorphinan and its salts (dextromethorphan). Such term does include its racemic and levorotatory forms.

- "(17) OPIUM POPPY. The plant of the species Papaver somniferum L., except its seeds.
- "(18) PERSON. Individual, corporation, government or governmental subdivision or agency, business trust, estate, trust, partnership, or association or any other legal entity.

1	"(19) POPPY STRAW. All parts, except the seeds, of
2	the opium poppy, after mowing.
3	"(20) PRACTITIONER.
4	"a. A physician, dentist, veterinarian, scientific
5	investigator, or other person licensed, registered, or
6	otherwise permitted to distribute, dispense, conduct research
7	with respect to, or to administer a controlled substance in
8	the course of professional practice or research in this state.
9	"b. A pharmacy, hospital, or other institution
10	licensed, registered, or otherwise permitted to distribute,
11	dispense, conduct research with respect to, or to administer a
12	controlled substance in the course of professional practice or
13	research in this state.
14	"(21) PRODUCTION. The manufacture, planting,
15	cultivation, growing, or harvesting of a controlled substance.
16	"(22) STATE. When applied to a part of the United
17	States, the term includes any state, district, commonwealth,
18	territory, insular possession thereof, and any area subject to
19	the legal authority of the United States of America.
20	"(23) ULTIMATE USER. A person who lawfully possesses
21	a controlled substance for his or her own use or for the use
22	of a member of his or her household or for administering to an
23	animal owned by him or her or by a member of his or her
24	household."
25	Section 2. This act shall become effective on the
26	first day of the third month following its passage and

approval by the Governor, or its otherwise becoming law.
